A friend of mine was talking with me, and she recalled a recent visit to her parents up in Iowa.

"My brother and dad and I got to recalling a trip we took" she smiled, "and what my brother and I remembered is definitely not the same story my dad recalls!"

She went on to say that her father is notorious in the family for taking those shortcuts that are never short....he is one of those folks who always ends up lost, or the shortcut road is too bad to save time on.

The kids in the family remember going through a wheat field, climbing a mountain, and finally discovering the road was blocked and there was nothing to do but turn around and go back down the way they had come, then taking the road that they should have taken to begin with.

Their dad only remembers taking a shortcut through the wheat, he doesn't recall anything more!

In talking about my mother and dad with my brothers I have been struck that with the large age differences between us, we have entirely different sets of memories. We remember things we were all there for pretty much the same, but we were all raised at different

times in our parents' lives. My brother Marshal has many memories of living in Houston while my brother Hugh has only a few. I wasn't even born then, so of course don't recall that segment of life at all.

Again, my oldest brother remembers a lot about living in Tulsa for two years, and my brother Hugh has many memories of there I have memories too, but they just aren't the same, they are the recollections of a four and five year

old, not a school age child. Another friend says she and her sister see the world through entirely different eyes. Her sister tended to terrorize her with spooky stories. Her sister recalls these as silly stories, but to my friend they were deadly serious, nightmare inducing episodes!

Go to a class reunion sometime, I think you will discover that incidents one person treasures as dear memories are completely forgotten by oth-

I suppose our memories are affected by our ages, our interests and our personalities.

Probably our personalities are the most important part of it all. What may have been a real thrill for one child may not have impressed another at all. What frightened one kid may have been nothing at all to another.

But, one thing I do know is that each of our memories is personal, real and important. The truth, I suppose, lies somewhere in between.




