Financial aid workshops held at RHS

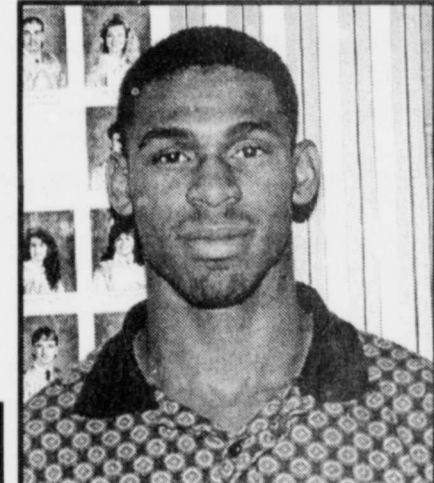

This week's cook is from Deport and is Mary Mantooth. She is retired from Kroger's and she lives in Deport with her two children Angel and Christopher.

Angel is a student at Deport Elementary and Christopher is a freshman at Prairiland High School.

Mary devotes much of her time to her children's activities and can be found at their ball games, with them swimming or skating and is an avid fan of the movies.

She also spends a lot of time caring for her mother, Mae Nichols who lives near by.

Mary is sharing three of her most popular and most requested recipes with us this week. They are Yankee Potatoes, Banana Pudding and Broccoli and Cheese. The other three recipes

Yankee Potatoes is a blend of hash browns, sour cream and mushroom soup with onions and peppers. A great side dish.

Banana Pudding is a traditional

recipe with a new flair by adding whipped topping and Eagle Brand milk.

Broccoli and Cheese a quick recipe using the microwave and can be placed in a slow cooker for added convenience.

Poppy Seed Cake - This recipe was given to us by one of our co-workers Pam Fenner of Talco. She prepares this and surprises us from time to time with a loaf or two!

Devil's Food Cake - this recipe was found in an old recipe book from the Bogata Garden Club from the 1960's. We came upon it in the newly opened "Relics" antique shop in downtown Deport. It came from Jane Swint.

The **Meat Loaf** recipe also came from the same book. No particular reason for it though. I like meatloaf and always look for different recipes.

Yankee Potatoes

4 cups hash brown potatoes
1 cup sour cream
1 medium chopped onion
1 medium bell peppers
1 small jar pimento-chopped
1 can cream of mushroom soup
salt and pepper

Mix together in casserole. Top with crushed potato chips. Melt 1 stick margarine and pour over topping. Cover with foil and bake 30-45 minutes.

Banana Pudding

1 large box instant banana cream pudding
1 can Eagle Brand milk
2-8 ounce tubs whipped cream
1 large box vanilla wafers
3-4 bananas

Prepare pudding mix using package directions. Add milk and one tub whipped topping. Mix well in a large dish. Add all of the vanilla wafers and cut up bananas; mix together. Top with remaining whipped topping and chill until served.

Broccoli and Cheese

1-16 ounce package cut-up broccoli
1-10 ounce can cream of chicken soup
1 cup rice
1 tablespoon butter
1-8 ounce jar Cheese Whiz

Microwave broccoli and butter for 16 minutes in a microwave dish with cover. Take out and put in a slow cooker. Add soup, salt and pepper to taste. Add cooked rice and cook about 30 minutes. Add cheese and cook for 20 more minutes.

Poppy Seed Bread

1 cup water
1/4-1/3 cup poppy seed
1 box lemon cake mix
4 eggs
3/4 cup oil
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 package instant lemon pudding

Soak poppy seeds in water for 10 minutes and add remaining ingredients. Place mixture in three-1 pound baking pans that are lightly greased. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

Devil's Food Cake

1/2 cup oil
1/2 cup butter
2 cups sugar
2 cups flour
2 eggs
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoon soda
1 cup buttermilk
2 teaspoon vanilla
4 tablespoons cocoa
1 cup boiling water

Boil butter, oil and water. Sift flour, sugar and cocoa. Add soda to buttermilk; combine mixture. Add vanilla. Add boiling water mixture last and bake about 30-35 minutes at 350 degrees.

Meat Loaf

1 pound ground meat
1/2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
1/2 cup Pet milk
1 canill can tomato sauce
2 tablespoon chopped onion
1 teaspoon salt
1 slightly beaten egg
1/2 teaspoon garlic
1/2 cup cracker crumbs

Combine all ingredients and form into loaf and pour sauce over top. Bake one hour at 350 degrees.

Thomas Ray Harvey dies January 13

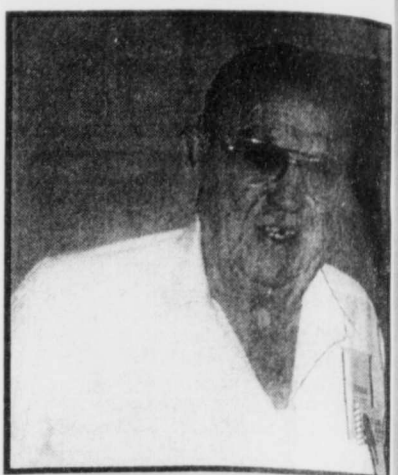
Thomas Ray Harvey of Port Neches died Tuesday, January 13 there.

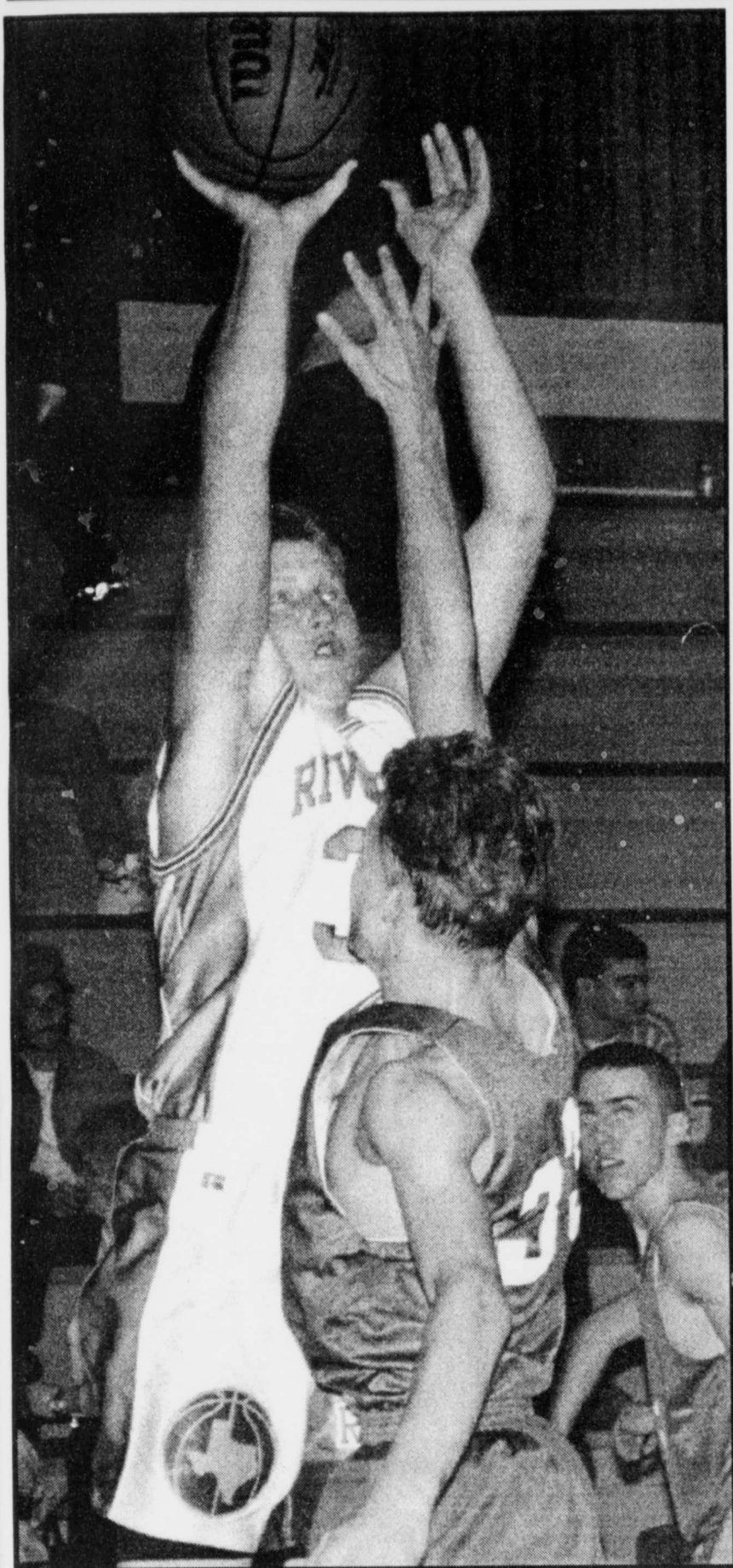



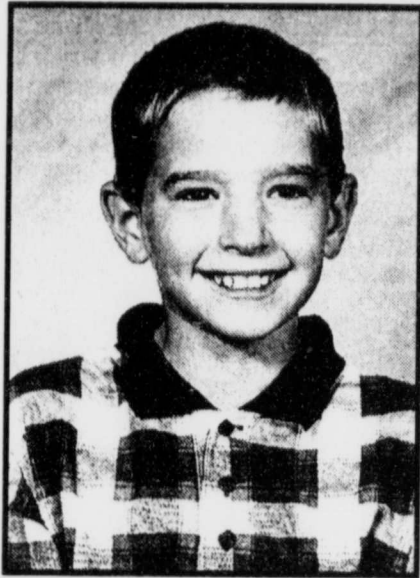
