Letter from Nigeria asking businesses to be used for transfer of funds....sounds too good to be true!

After reporting that there are several telephone "scams" going on, it has been brought to our attention that there is a letter going out to some area businesses that is almost certainly a scam, and probably an extremely dangerous one!

These letters are from Nigeria, and say that "you have been recommended by an association" for help in what is supposedly a perfectly legal transaction. The letter claims to be from top officials in the Nigerian government, who, due to actions taken through the last interim regime need help in unfreezing millions of dollars.

They actually ask that the businesses account number, bank name and address, etc. be faxed to them so that they can transfer amounts of money (one letter says \$21,320,000.00 in U.S. dollars) into the American business bank account. Then, within a week it will be transferred out. They agree to leave between 30 and 40 percent of this money in the account as compensation.

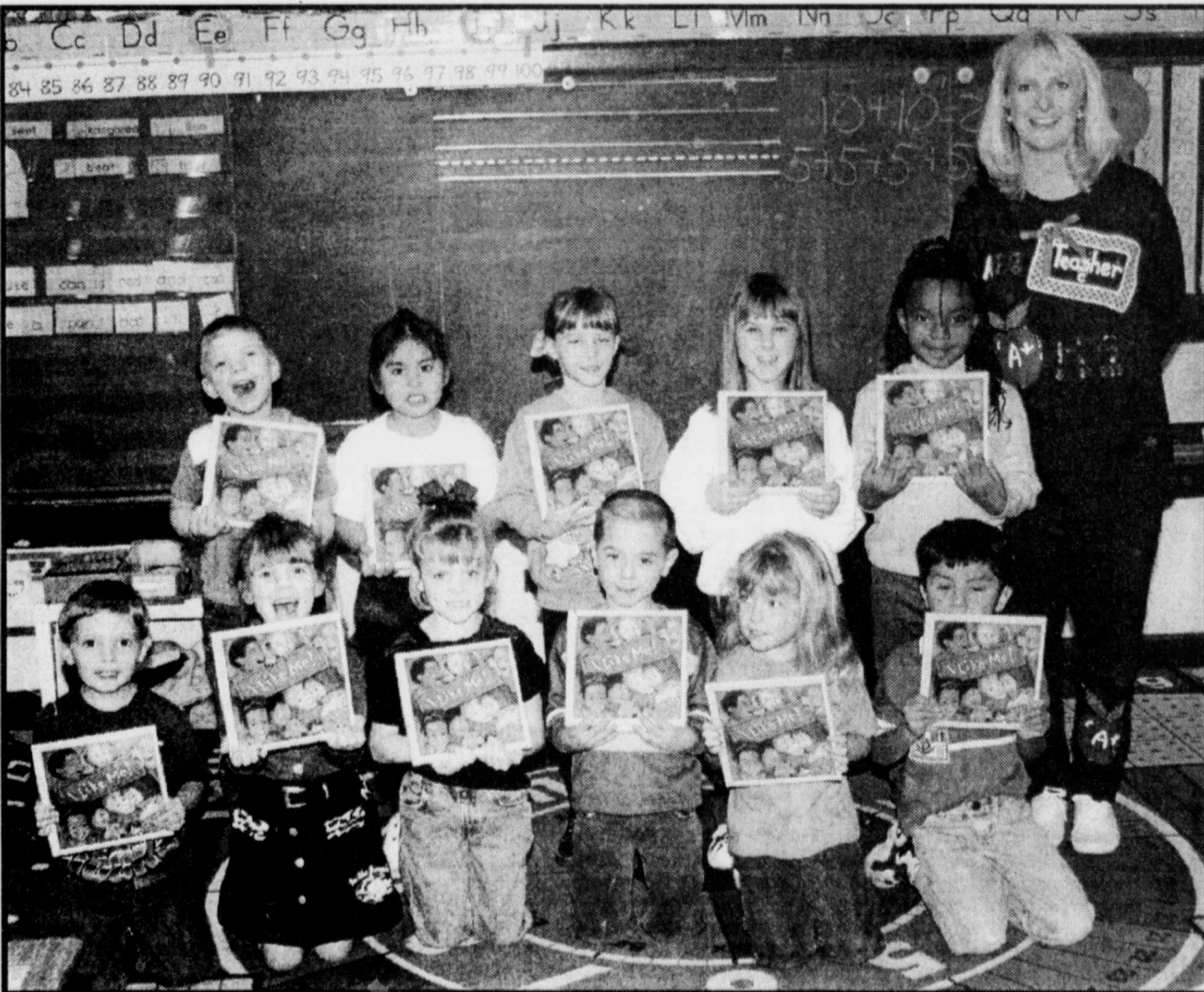
While this claims to be totally legal and on the "up and up", it seems almost certain that this is a form of scam.

Obviously, no one should ever send account numbers and names and bank names and addresses on the strength of a letter such as this!

The State Attorney General's Citizens Assistance Center can be notified at 517-463-2007 if anyone would like to report this activity for further investigation.

Dave came back to the Deport area in 1983. He spends his spare time collecting and restoring antiques and collectibles, and never misses a chance to browse around for these.

Dave has submitted several recipes for us this week and they include:

Peanut Butter Pie which would be a peanut butter lover's dream!

Quick Gourmet Pizza is a store bought pizza embellished with all the favorites added to make this a super

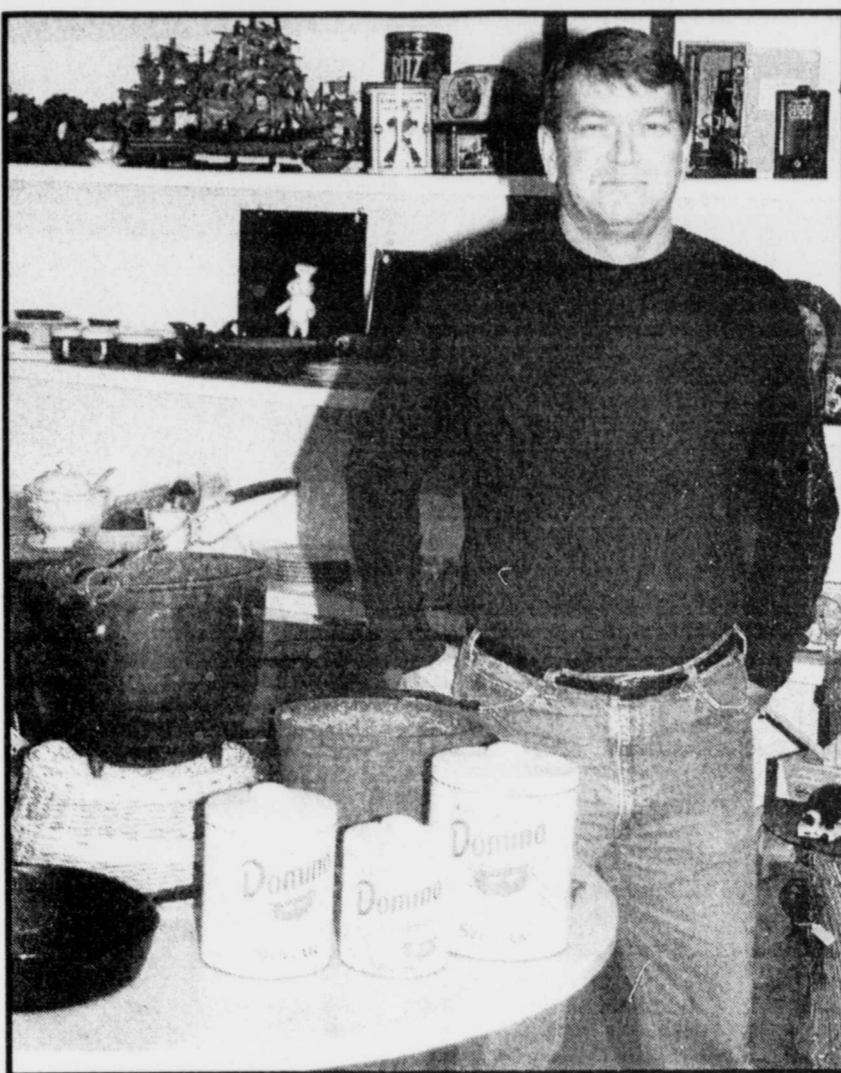
pizza! I have tasted this and it is great!

Fried Shrimp with the trick being the buttermilk and crushed "Ritz" crackers. Dave used only the "Ritz" - he says they have the best flavor.

Tartar Sauce and **Quick Cocktail Sauce** can be used with the fried shrimp.

Shrimp Curry sounds really good and can be accompanied with currant jelly, sweet or sour pickles, sliced avocado, pineapple chunks, salted almonds or peanuts, tomato wedges or chopped hard boiled eggs.

Peanut Butter Pie
1-8 ounce package cream cheese-softened
1-1/2 cup creamy peanut butter
1/4 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
1-16 ounce nondairy whipped topping
1-9 inch graham cracker crust
Mix cream cheese, peanut butter, milk and sugar with mixer until blended. Add 8 ounce whipped topping and mix until creamy. Spoon mixture into pie crust and top with remaining topping and chill.

Quick Gourmet Pizza
1 Tombstone Supreme Pizza
1/2 pound Owens Hot sausage
1 small can sliced black olives
1 large package shredded mozzarella onions
Cook and crumble sausage in skillet. Remove, leaving drippings and add onions, mushrooms and any other ingredients you like on pizza. Cook until soft. Add a light layer of cheese to pizza and then add sausage, onion and mushroom. Add another light layer of cheese and top with black olives. Add remainder of cheese and bake at 350 degrees for about 20-25 minutes until done.

Fried Shrimp
1 pound raw jumbo shrimp-peeled-leave tail
1 cup buttermilk
1 egg
1 teaspoon garlic-powdered
1 teaspoon salt
dash red pepper
2 cups crushed Ritz reduced fat crackers (crush on newspaper with pastry roller) corn oil
Mix buttermilk, egg, garlic powder, salt and pepper. Hold shrimp by tail and dip in batter. Lay shrimp flat in cracker crumbs. Cover with crumbs and press to flatten shrimp and get crumbs to stick. Fry in corn oil until light brown. Drain on paper towels and serve with tartar sauce and cocktail sauce.


Tartar Sauce
1 cup Hellman's mayonnaise
1/4 cup chopped black olives
1/4 cup dill pickle relish
2 teaspoons lemon juice
1/2 cup finely chopped green onions
Mix ingredients and chill for 24 hours before serving.

Quick Shrimp Cocktail Sauce
1 cup Ketchup
2 teaspoons lemon juice
2 teaspoons (more or less) horseradish
Mix ingredients and chill 24 hours before serving.

Shrimp Curry
3 cups cooked rice
1 chicken-bouillon cube
1 cup boiling water
5 tablespoon butter
1/2 cup minced onions
6 tablespoon flour
2-1/2 teaspoon curry powder
1-1/4 teaspoon salt
1-1/2 teaspoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
2 cups milk
4 cups shrimp-shelled, deveined, cooked
1 teaspoon lemon juice
Dissolve bouillon cube in boiling water. In double boiler top, over direct heat, melt butter. Add onions, simmer till soft. Stir in flour, curry, salt, sugar, ginger. Slowly stir in bouillon and milk. Cook over boiling water, stirring until thick. Add shrimp and lemon juice. Reheat. Serve ring of hot rice with curry in center.

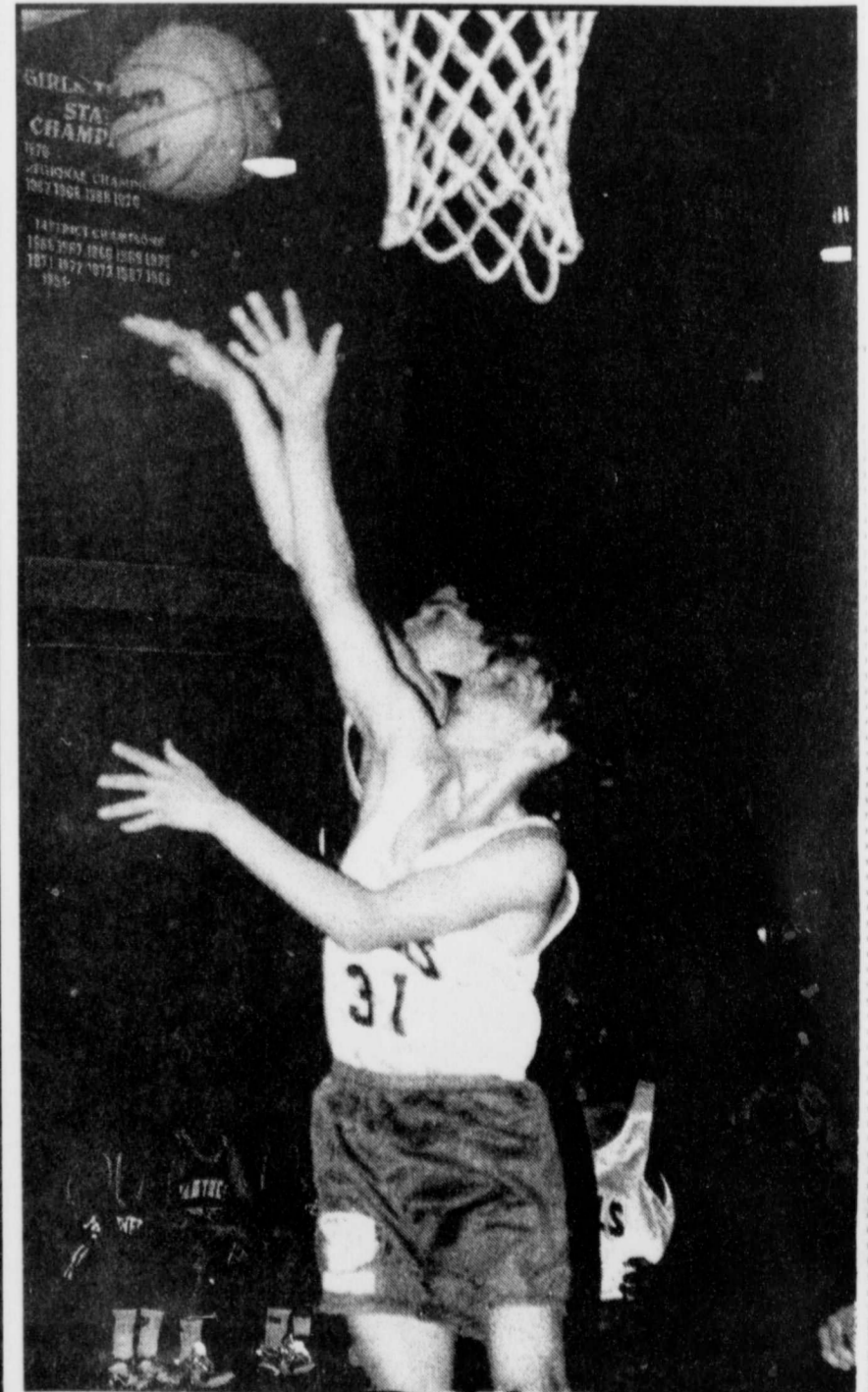

Archaeologists search for Civil War supply ship

COLLEGE STATION - Researchers from the Institute of Nautical Archaeology at Texas A&M University are wading into history in search of one of the most successful blockade runners of the Civil War.

A team of nautical archaeologists from the Texas A&M-based INA is trying to locate the wreck of the blockade runner Denbigh, destroyed by Union naval vessels off Bolivar Point in 1865.

The scouting trip is the first of what INA officials hope will be a series of shipwreck investigations in Texas rivers and in Texas waters in the Gulf of Mexico. As many as 2,200 shipwrecks can be found in Texas rivers and coastal waters, says J. Barto Arnold, INA director of Texas operations.

"There are Texas Navy ships from the Republic period, river steamboats and three big Civil War blockade runners," Arnold says. "One of the ships from the 1554 Spanish treasure fleet is near Point Mansfield Pass."

"Very little work has been done on any of these wrecks," he notes.

The Denbigh, a 182-foot-long converted merchant vessel, was one of the most successful blockade runners of the war. It made 33 successful runs from Havana, Cuba, to Mobile, Ala., and Galveston before it ran aground near Bolivar Point the night of May 23, 1865, while trying to enter Galveston Bay. Union naval vessels blockading Galveston shelled and destroyed the Denbigh the next day, Arnold says.

"The odds of finding it are pretty good," Arnold says. "The map references are relatively recent and they were made by engineers who should have known what they were doing."

Even with satellites, radar and computers, Mother Nature still slips things by us - like El Niño. Some scientists who spend their careers tracking this type of elusive weather system admit they missed the early signs of El Niño. This has the climate research community taking a hard look at the models it uses to predict weather because some of the most reliable totally missed the event.

If there's indication an El Niño is on the way, then climatologists have the challenging task of predicting how it will affect global weather patterns. This is particularly difficult because scientists don't completely understand all the complex interactions between the ocean and the atmosphere that create climate in an El Niño year. To top it off, each year brings different interactions so each El Niño doesn't behave like the one before.

Scientists are confident that with better weather pattern observation and improving technology, their ability to predict the development and outcome of an El Niño will continue to improve. And because history - and weather - repeats itself, scientists will have a chance to prove that. An El Niño occurs about every seven years.

Of course even with better technology, folks in agriculture know it's best to remember the words of one very humble climatologist who admitted, "there are limits to prediction no matter how smart we are."

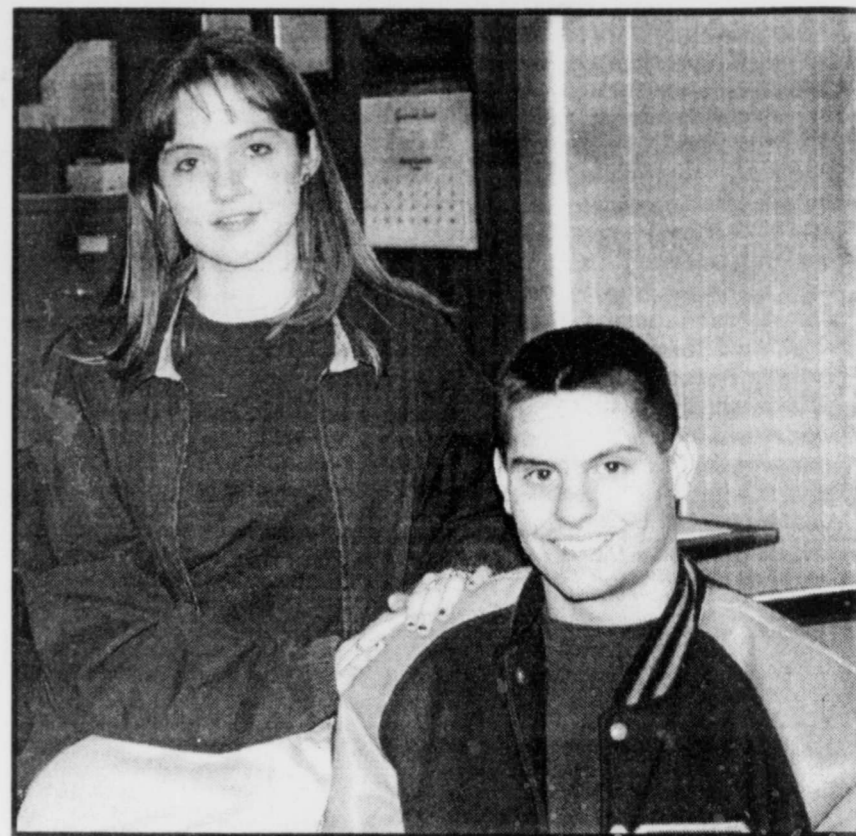

Junior High Rebels host Alba-Golden

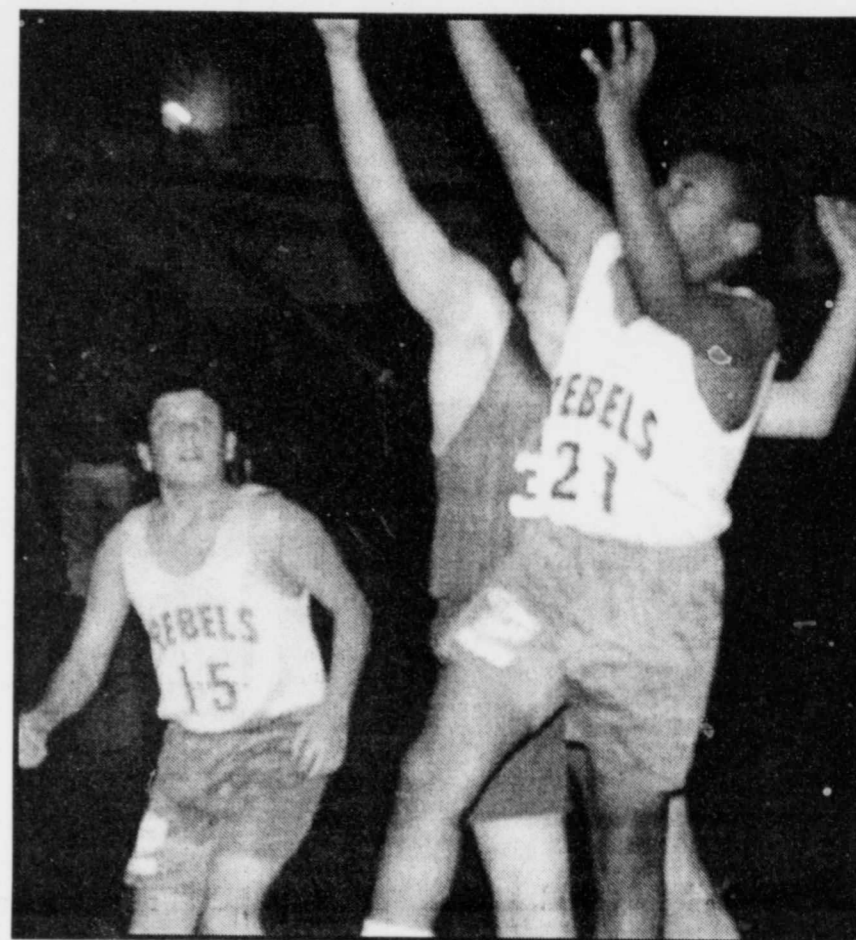

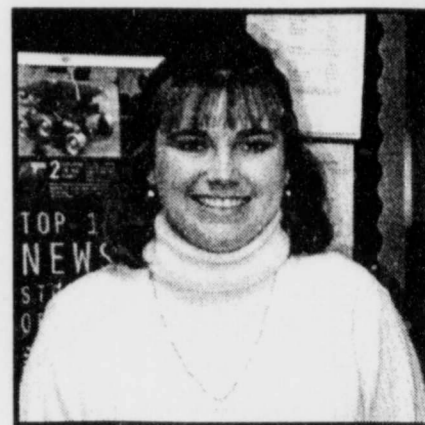
