Peggy Schmidt of Southwestern Bell Pioneers visits

Peggy Schmidt of St. Louis, MO., a representative of the Southwestern Bell Pioneers program visited the Talco School this past week. The Pioneer Partners program is an organization of Southwestern Bell active employees, retired employees and their family members who sponsor many activities. Mrs. Schmidt is a representative of the 5 state area which includes Arkansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas and Kansas and has 64,000 members.

Mrs. Schmidt delivered 1200 pieces which came from the Tulsa area Book Bank and included books, story cards and stickers for all grade levels of the school and a value of \$6000-\$7000. Most of the groups projects focus on education and literacy. Some of the projects are: 20x30 maps on playgrounds, the states bor-

ders are outlined in such a way that the teachers can have their students go and stand on a certain state or in the area of a city etc.. Mentoring groups and Tutoring are provided through the group, a special project is "Operation School Net" which helps school get the Internet and they help provide computers for school. The group's special mascot is "Wally Word Worth" and Mrs. Schmidt hopes to bring him to Talco School on her next visit.

The sponsor who helped the Talco School get into the program was Bill Carlisle, a retired Bell employee and father to Talco Kindergarten teacher, Kathy Brown. Mr. Carlisle helped begin the program by purchasing the "I Like Me" books for the Kindergarten students.

The Pioneer Partners is the largest

industry based community service organization in existence. Other activities the group serves are helping with wheelchair ramps, feeding and clothing those in need, building homes, providing Camp Blue Bird which served adult cancer patients and Beep Baseball and Easter Egg hunts for the blind.

Mrs. Schmidt said, "We of Southwestern Bell are fortunate to work or have worked for a company that has provided security for its employees and has allowed the Pioneer Program to exist and help in so many areas throughout the United States".

Mrs. Schmidt shared story time with the Talco Kindergarten classes before leaving. Her return visit will be awaited anxiously by the Talco staff and students.

The Talco-Bogata CISD Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday, February 9 at 8:00 p.m.

The meeting was held in the board room at Rivercrest High School. The consensus agenda, which consisted of the minutes of the January 15 meeting, the cafeteria report, financial report, tax report and payment of bills was approved.

The Board was then addressed by Demanda Gibson, a parent of an elementary student concerning the procedures for dealing with cases of head lice in the schools. No action was taken but the procedure will be reviewed to ensure that every effort is being made to address the problem and meet state health regulations.

The next item on the agenda was a report from Robert Brown, the school's architect from Tyler. He presented the results of a study of the Talco-Bogata facilities. Following his report, the board approved an agreement with Robert Y. Brown, Architect, Inc. for the facilities study. IN other action, the board approved a budget amendment and adopted a new tax sale bid procedure.

Happy Valentine's Day! A day for sweethearts and lovers and romance. So add a little romance to your life...

...fix your "sweetie" some scones for brunch on Valentine's Day. Scones are like biscuits... but added with a little butter or your favorite jelly or marmalade, can be an extra special "treat" for you and yours!

Scones are a combination of flour, fat, baking powder, salt and milk. The difference comes from the fat used...

Always use all-purpose flour for best results. If using wheat flour add 2 tablespoons additional flour to each cup used.

Use very cold butter. Cut into dry ingredients until the mixture forms lumps the size of large peas.

Handle dough as little as possible for tender scones. Gently roll or pat dough into a large circle before cutting.

Like biscuits, scones tastes best right out of the oven piping hot. They also freeze well. Warm thawed scones in a 400 degree oven for 5-7 minutes.

If you don't believe me about scones, pick up any novel and they will have the main characters munching on hot scones as they laze about

their vast, huge empires... or just ask Nanalee or Thomas, they rave about them and enjoy them on their trips to England.

Hope you enjoy your valentine treat with your loved one! Have a great weekend and as usual it is always back to the kitchen!

Scottish Scones use the milk and sprinkle sugar on tops before baking to get that little extra glaze.

Lemon-Poppy Seed Scones use the Scottish Scones recipe, but use grated lemon peel and poppy seed with powdered sugar and lemon juice glaze drizzled over the tops while still warm.

Cream Scones Served in Britain at High Tea in the afternoon with jam and clotted cream, this version uses preserves and whipped cream instead.

Double-Orange Scones with Orange Butter can be found with bits of Mandarin oranges in them and topped with a mixture of marmalade and softened butter to make the Orange Butter.

Cranberry-Orange Scones combines dried cranberries and grated orange rind for this light, fluffy combination.

Mocha-Pecan Scones. Add a small amount of dried espresso powder and chopped pecans and drizzle over the tops some melted chocolate morsels.

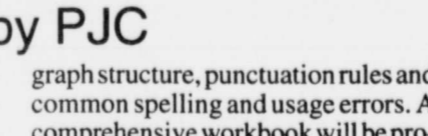

Scottish Scones
2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
1/3 cup butter-cut up
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 large egg-beaten
1 tablespoon milk
1 tablespoon sugar

Orange Butter
1/2 cup softened butter
2 tablespoons orange marmalade
Combine butter and marmalade, stirring until blended. Yield 1/2 cup.

Cranberry-Orange Scones
2 cups flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon grated orange rind
1/2 cup butter-cut up
2/3 cup buttermilk
1 cup dried cranberries
1 tablespoon milk
1 tablespoon sugar

Lemon-Poppy Seed Scones
Add 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind and 1 teaspoon poppy seeds to flour mixture. Omit milk and sugar topping. Combine 1-1/2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice and 1 cup sifted powdered sugar; and drizzle evenly over warm scones.

Cream Scones
2 cups flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup sugar
1/3 cup butter-cut up
1 cup whipping cream
Combine first 4 ingredients; cut in butter with pastry blender until crumbly. Add whipping cream to flour mixture, stirring until just moistened. Turn dough out onto lightly floured surface; knead 5-6 times. Roll to 1/2 inch thickness; cut with a 2-inch round cutter and place on lightly greased muffin tins or 2 inches apart on greased baking sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 15 minutes or until golden. Serve with preserves and shipped cream.

Double-Orange Scones with Orange Butter
1 can broken mandarin orange sections
1 cup flour
1 cup whole wheat flour
2-1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons sugar
2 teaspoons grated orange peel
1/3 cup butter-cut up
1/3 cup milk
1 large egg-beaten
1 tablespoon sugar

Mocha-Pecan Scones
2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoons baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup sugar
1/3 cup butter-cut up
1 large egg-lightly beaten
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon instant espresso powder
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup semi-sweet mini-morsels
1 tablespoon milk
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 cup semi-sweet mini -morsels
Combine first 5 ingredients; cut in butter with pastry blender until crumbly. Combine egg, buttermilk and espresso powder; stir until powder dissolves. Add buttermilk mixture, chopped pecans and if desired, 1/2 cup mini-morsels to flour mixture, stirring until just moistened. Turn dough out onto lightly floured board and knead 5-6 times. Divide dough in half; roll or pat each circle into 8 wedges and place wedges 1 inch apart on lightly greased baking sheets. Brush with milk and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon sugar. Bake at 425 degrees for 12-15 minutes or until lightly brown. Place 1/2 cup morsels in small heavy-duty, zip-loc bag; seal. Submerge in hot water until morsels melt; snip a tiny hole in one corner of bag and drizzle over warm scones.
