ONE DEAD IN 1050 MAJOR MONDAY FEBRUARY 9 - According to a report filed by DPS officer Kevin Gray, forty-four year old Kenneth Lee Bryant of Bogata was killed when the 1996 Dodge Ram he was driving left US 271 on the Sulphur River bridge and plummeted to the river bank below. The call was received by the Red River County Sheriff's Department at 7:15 am. Rescue personnel from the Talco, the Bogata Volunteer Fire Departments and Clarksville Fire Department assisted in the rescue efforts. Judge Lewis of Clarksville Pronounced Bryant dead at the scene. The cause of the accident was undetermined at press time.



Happy Valentine's Day! A day for sweethearts and lovers and romance. So add a little romance to your life. . .fix your "sweetie" some scones for brunch on Valentine's Day. Scones are like biscuits.... but added with a little butter or your favorite jelly or marmalade, can be an extra special

"treat" for you and yours! Scones are a combina tion of flour, fat, baking powder, salt and milk. The difference comes from the fat used....scones are made with butter, instead of vegetable shortening with the addition of eggs and sugar. Dried fruit, chocolate, spices and sugary glazes add that extra little zing.

Always use all-purpose flour for best results. If using wheat flour add 2 tablespoons additional flour to each cup used.

Use very cold butter. Cut into dry ingredients until the mixture forms lumps the size of large peas.

Handle dough as little as possible for tender scones. Gently roll or pat dough into a large circle before cutting.

Like biscuits, scones tastes best right out of the oven piping hot. They also freeze well. Warm thawed scones in a 400 degree oven for 5-7 minutes.

If you don't believe me about scones, pick up any novel and they will have the main characters munching on hot scones as they laze about

their vast, hugh empires. . . or just ask Nanalee or Thomas, they rave about them and enjoy them on their trips to England

Hope you enjoy your valentine treat with your loved one! Have a great weekend and as usual it is always back to the kitchen!

Scottish Scones use the milk and sprinkle sugar on tops before baking to get that little extra glaze.

Lemon-Poppy Seed Scones use the Scottish Scones recipe, but used grated lemon peel and poppy seed with powdered sugar and lemon juice glaze drizzled over the tops while still warm

Cream Scones-Served in Britain at High Tea in the afternoon with jam and clotted cream, this version uses preserves and whipped cream instead.

Double-Orange Scones with Orange Butter can be found with bits of Mandarin oranges in them and topped with a mixture of marmalade and softened butter to make the Orange Butter.

Cranberry-Orange Scones combines dried cranberries and grated orange rind for this light, fluffy combination

Mocha-Pecan Scones . Add a small amount of dried espresso powder and chopped pecans and drizzle over the tops some melted chocolate morsels.

Brush with milk and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon sugar. Bake at 425 degrees inch circle on a lightly greased baking sheet. Cut circle into 8 wedges; separate wedges slightly. Add 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind and I teaspoon poppy seeds to flour mixture. Omit milk and sugar topping. Combine I-I/2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice and I cup sifted powdered sugar; and drizzle evenly over warm scones. **Cream Scones** 2 cups flour tablespoon baking powder

/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 sup sugar 1/3 cup butter-cut up cup whipping cream Combine first 4 ingredients; cut in outter with pastry blender until crumoly. Add whipping cream to flour mixture, stirring until just moistened. Turn dough out onto lightly floured surface; cnead 5 or 6 times. Roll to 1/2 inch thickness; cut with a 2-inch round cutter and place on lightly greased muffin tins or 2 inches apart on greased baking sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 15 minutes or until golden. Serve with preserves and shipped cream.


In 1987 A law was passed enabling a county judge to establish a County Industrial Commission.
