I've been accused of making

this story up. I promise...I didn't!

It began with my Bengal cat, who developed a serious kidney problem. I sat up with him late one Thursday night spooning medicine down him. I went to sleep about 1:00 a.m. when Gunter was feeling better. At 4:00 a.m. Thomas awoke, suffering from terrible pain. For the next two hours he suffered, but kept hoping things would get better and wouldn't go to emergency. At 6:00 a.m. the fire department beepers went off, and the address was for a medical emergency at his mother's home. Fearfully, we drove into town. I shot back to the hospital to discover my husband had an enormous kidney stone! I called faithful nephew Jeff and gave him detailed instructions on feeding the cows.

Thomas went into the hospital for large doses of painkiller. The next morning he was taken to surgery, where they put in a stint to keep his pain down until the truck that "blasts" kidney stones could come to Paris. They said the truck would arrive March 9, then they said the 13th, then the 17th! Confused at the uncertain schedule of the "mystery truck" we came home. The central heat didn't work. Good friend Dawne did return my cat from the vet's, much better, thank goodness.

I got on the four wheeler and went to check on the cows and newborn calves only to discover one was very ill. Ten years ago I could have caught the calf with one hand and poked pills down him with the other ... now I had to call on faithful friend Mike to come help. We doctored the calf, and I went back to take care of my husband, who was not the happiest person in the world.

We struggled through doctoring the calf again Sunday and putting out more hay, once more with the help of friends and nephew. We made it through getting out a paper, even though poor Thomas felt awful. Wednesday, they called and said the mysterious kidney stone truck would be there on Thursday, and for Thomas to come up for pre-op that afternoon. He did, and early the next day had his trophy sized kidney stone reduced to sand. The next morning we went back for his stint removal. Let's not talk about that...Thomas says he won't ever go though that again unless he is completely anesthesized! I drove him home, picked up the cat for his checkup, along with the dog, whose skin had erupted in one of her horrible allergy attacks and rushed back to the vet. I left them, came home again, then went back later for the 3rd time that day and picked them up. Guess what? I left my purse sitting on their counter!

To put a cap on this week long marathon of horror, my cousin called Saturday morning to tell us that my beloved Uncle Blake had died in his sleep.

Two good thing have come out of all this: I appreciate those faithful friends I mentioned, and I can now tell my husband that his claim that if pressed to choose between him and my cats I'd choose the cats is wrong. When the choice came I sent my friend with the cat and I stayed with my spouse at the hospital! Wish us well, folks, we need it!

Drug bust nets cash, vehicles, marijuana

On March 3, 1998 through Regional Controlled Substance Apprehension Program, working in concert with the Northeast Drug Interdiction Task Force and the DEA, executed two search warrants in the attempt to locate marijuana that was suspected of being stored at a residence near Leonard in Fannin County and a residence near Deport in Lamar County.

One hundred and sixty-eight pounds of marijuana was located at the residence in Fannin County. Nine thousand dollars cash was located at the residence in Lamar County. On 3-3-98, a search warrant was executed on a safety deposit box belonging to one of the suspect's at a local bank. Fifty-six thousand dollars was found in the deposit box, which the law

enforcement agencies believe is the proceeds of drug trafficking. Approximately \$65,000 U.S. Currency and three vehicles were seized. The suspects arrested were Dwight

Lynn Evans, White male, age 47 years of Leonard, Texas and James Stanley Armour, white male, age 57 years of Deport, Texas.

Suspects were charged with Possession of Marijuana Over 50 Lbs., under 2,000 lbs.

The suspects were arrested and booked in the Fannin County Jail on the bond set at \$75,000.00 each by Fannin County J.P. Joe Dale

Assisting agencies were Fannin County Sheriff's Office, Lamar County Sheriff's Office, I.N.S. and Texas Department of Public Safety.





If you are a young man between the ages of 18 and 25, it's time to think about your Uncle Sam, and the best way to stay on his good side is to register with Selective Service. Although most men register when they are 18, as required by law, some fail to do so until they are older.

If you are now 25, you have only the months remaining until your 26th birthday to register. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man

reaches his 26th birthday.

A man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain benefits, such as federal student aid, job training and most federal employment, in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon.

Over 13 million men age 18 through 25 are currently registered with Selective Service. Of those, 920,915 are from Texas.

Rebels end season


The Rivercrest Rebels traveled to Gilmer on Friday, Feb. 27 to compete in the bi-district playoff against

As your County Attorney, I have pledged to aggressively pursue the hot check writers that plague Red River County, and I intend to continue to do so.

It is vital that you stress to your employees the importance of being thorough when accepting a check. If your establishment has set a policy for all customers, then no one should have any reason to feel they are being treated unfairly. It is a good idea to have a "checklist" where a cashier can see it easily. It should include 1. Checks must be dated the same day they are given. We cannot file criminal

charges on a post-dated check. 2. Do not accept checks previously signed. Have them signed in your presence

and compare with Texas driver's license.

3. Require a permanent street address, not a P.O. Box number, if possible. 4. Every kind of I.D. can be forged. The most reliable are the ones with physical lescription, photos, etc. If you are suspicious, ask the writer to hand you the license

and while it is in your hand, ask his address and/or birth date. If it is not his license, he may be caught off guard and give wrong information. 5. Banks will not honor checks with discrepancies. 6. Record ont he check the Texas driver's license number, date of birth, race and

ender, as well as the initials of the check who takes the check. The following kinds of checks usually will not be prosecuted as "hot checks" 1. A check without a driver's license number for the writer.

2. A post-dated check.

3. A check on an out of state bank 4. A two-party check.

5. A check more than one year old. 6. A check for which partial payment had been received. 7. A check given in exchange for a returned check.

8. A check which does not identify who accepted it. 9. A check not passed within this county. 10. A check not presented to the bank within 30 days of issuance. 11. A check for which no 10-day notice was given, and an unsigned check.

The headline just about said it all, but the story went into greater detail, and Mr. Walter Bell, a cousin of Mrs. Faye Conine and Mrs. Cullen Benson, sent a clipping so she could share it with us and in turn we could share it with his relatives and acquaintances in the area. Mr. Bell is the son of the late Lee and Eva Bell of the Bogata-Ro-

According to the story Mabel and a hayride that ranged from two Albritton and Nelda Bell had a lesson in endurance back in December.

> The two elderly women were trapped in their vehicle for 16 hours after running off the road on Highway 21 in the Sand Hill area in Nacogdoches County

Ms. Bell and her 90 year old mother were en route from Broaddus to Nacogdoches to visit her husband, Walter, who was in the hospital with pneumonia. Ms. Bell said she had spent many late nights at the hospital, and after attending church early Sun-

day morning she was in need of a nap. Instead, she and Ms. Albritton left home about 1:00 p.m. for Nacogdoches Medical Center.

"I kept feeling myself doze off," she said. "I was fighting it, but I guess I finally fell asleep behind the wheel."

When she did, the Buick LeSabre she was driving ran across four lanes of traffic and over an embankment where it hit a tree and trapped the women inside. Ms. Bell said that's when she woke up.

"I couldn't move my leg. My mother said she was hurting. I couldn't see anything because the brush was covering the car," she said. "We were about 14 feet below the road."

That began the 16 hour crisis, which badly frightened the family and drove relatives and friends to form a search

"The map lights would come on Ms. Bell wore a red, all weather for a while, and then it would go off," Ms. Bell said." At least we could see coat, which she waved out the window of the car. Her right arm was what time it was while they were on.'


