





Texas Businesses and Homeowners file property tax renditions

State Comptroller John Sharp has reminded businesses and property owners of the April 125 deadline to file their annual property tax renditions to ensure that the value of their property is fairly assessed for their local

'State law requires business owners and operators to submit an annual report to their county appraisal district listing any taxable property that the businesses owned or managed as of January 1, 1998," Sharp said.

"While the law requires businesses to render or report a list of their property with the option to give their opinion of their properties' value, this can also be advantageous to homeowners who want to give their opinion of their homes' values," Sharp said.

Property owners who had property damaged by a storm, flood or fire during the past year, such as the tornado that touched down in Jarrell, may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax bills. "If improvements haven't been made to the damaged property by January 1, 1998, you should let the county appraisal district know to do an inspection of the property to note its current condition," Sharp said.

"Property owners who render are in a better position to exercise their right as taxpayers. They ensure that the appraisal district has their correct address so they receive any notices of any actions that affect their property

If the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect or old address, the property owner is not only responsible for paying the taxes, but also for any late payment penalties that may be due, Sharp added. If someone other than a property owner, owner's employee, or owner's

affiliated entity files a rendition, the rendition must be notarized. Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property as of January 1 is required by state law to render with their local appraisal district. An exception is a business that receives the freeport exemption for

managing cotton stored in a warehouse. "Business must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, and other tangible personal property by filing this annual report," Sharp said. "Appraisal districts use the reports to set property values. If a property owner doesn't submit a report, the chief

appraiser estimates the value." A property owner may request additional time to file a rendition or eport from the chief appraiser who may grant an extension through April 30. The owner must demonstrate good cause for an extension to be granted. The chief appraiser must grant owners of property regulated by the Public Utility Commission or the Railroad Commission an extension to April 30 to file reports and may extend the deadline another 15 days if the owners

request it in writing and show good cause. On the renditions, property owners can record their opinions of their property's value on January 1, 1998. By stating their opinion, property owners make sure the appraisal district sends them a notice, usually in April or May, before placing a higher value on their property. This notice allows property owners the time to gather information to protest the

appraisal if they believe the appraisal district's value is too high. If more than one appraisal district appraises a property, the property owner should render in each appraisal district office. One appraisal district may appraise a property for county tax purposes, while a neighboring appraisal district may appraise the same property for school taxes if the school district is in both counties.

Taxpayers may contact the county appraisal district office for the rendition forms, or they may call Comptroller's property tax hot line at 1-800-



> Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office...or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must fill a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income--such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you? The advantages of filing a rendition are:

*You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

*You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

*You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1997. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1998.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 1998 renditions is April 15. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 15 deadline.



I don't know about most folks, but I feel sure they are the same way we were and that in an emergency any first aid or CPR training that they have had is immediately forgotten. All I could do was yell at my husband to wake up. I shook him and punched him a couple of times, but those procedures are probably not in any instructions manual for what to do in an

I was amazed that in a matter of three or four minutes the Bogata Volunteer Fire Department Rescue Squad was knocking on our back door. They came right on in and took care of business. They were professional and kind. They were polite and well trained. It didn't seem to matter to them that they were working in a narrow hallway with poor lighting. I was astonished to see what all they can do before the ambulance arrives. I, for one am grateful to know that such a well trained group of young people makes up our Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad.

During the brief period of time they were caring for my husband they used several types of medical equipment and supplies. These supplies and the equipment they use are very expensive. They must have training to use all of the equipment. Some of the classes they attend to learn how to better take care of patients and victims of accidents are many miles from home. The classes are not free and neither is their transportation. These people are a very necessary part of our community. We are so fortunate to have them. Please don't wait for an organized fund raiser to help them keep this work going. When you go to the bank to cash your check, donate what you can to The Bogata Volunteer Fire Department Rescue Squad. The ladies at the bank will know which account to put the money in. If you don't like to go inside the bank, use the drive-through. If you know some of the people on the squad, I'm sure they would be happy if you just hand them a check. A big donation is not necessary. Just do the best you can. You won't regret it. It could be your husband or child they are seeing about next time. Please help make sure they have all the training and equipment they need.



From Your Red River County Attorney



Hot checks continue to be a problem in our county. My office makes every effort to collect hot checks. The procedures to follow are set out in laws as given to me by the legislature and they are as follows:

The check must be presented to the bank of payment, even if you know it will not be honored, and stamped by the bank as to the reason for dishonorment. You must send written notification to the check writer informing him or her of the reason the check was not honored. The written notice must be sent certified return receipt requested. The following sample letter sets out the information which must be included:

Your check #0000 dated February 28, 1998, in the amount of \$000.00 given for the toaster you purchased on the same date has been returned by the State Bank marked "insufficient funds" (or account closed).

You have ten (10) days from today's date to bring payment in cash, cashier's check or money order for the amount of the check plus a \$00.0 charge for handing, or this matter will be turned over the Prosecutor's Office.

Dear Mr. Doe:

Be sure to keep a copy of this letter. If after 10 days from receipt, the check has not been paid, you must personally bring it to this office with the following:

1. The original check with bank flag or notation showing the reason it was not

2. The signed return receipt from the certified letter or the letter (unopened) marked refused or unclaimed.

3. The name of the person who accepted the check and who can identify the

4. Specific identification of maker, such as driver's license number, date of birth, and physical description, such as race and gender.






