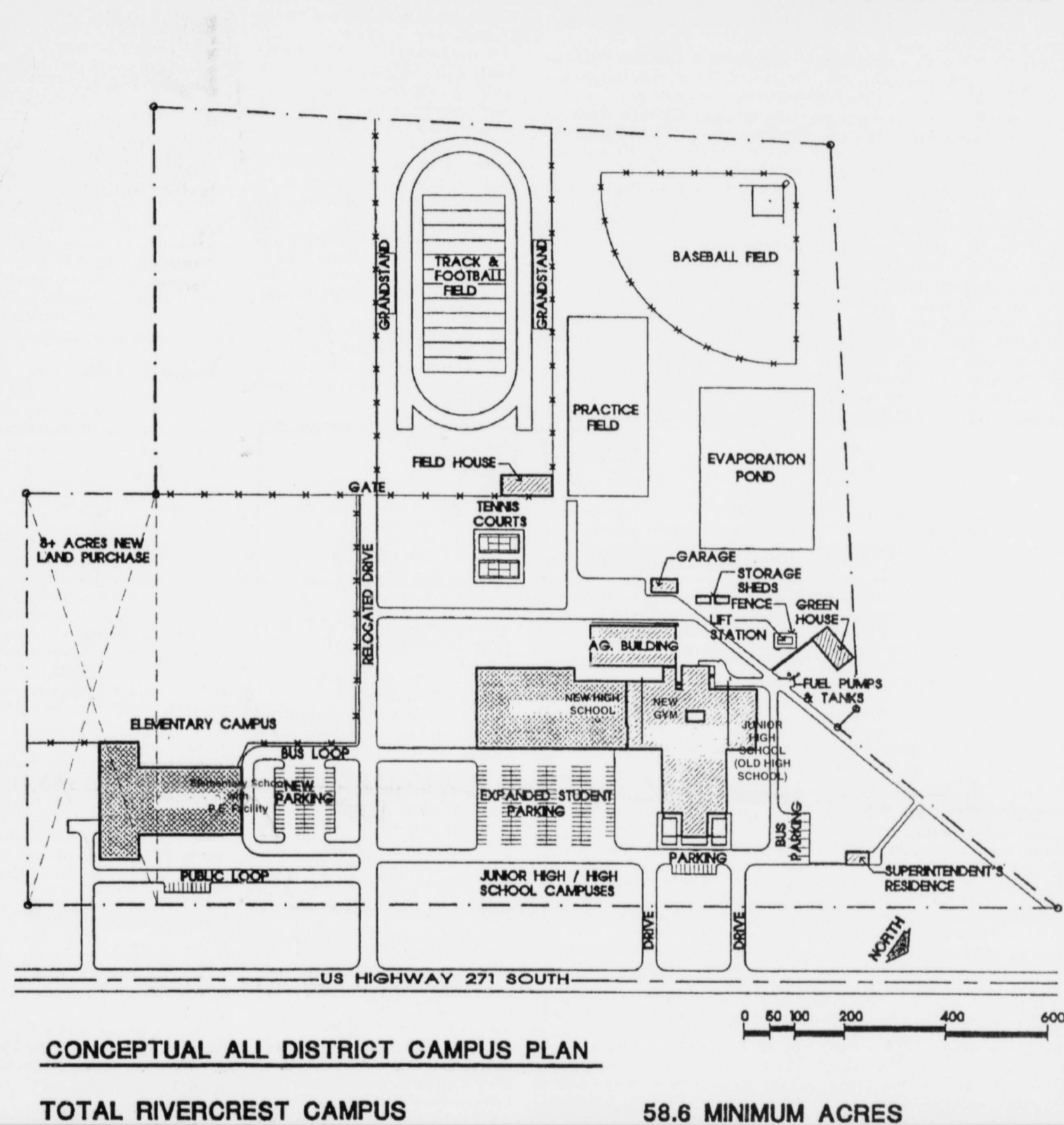

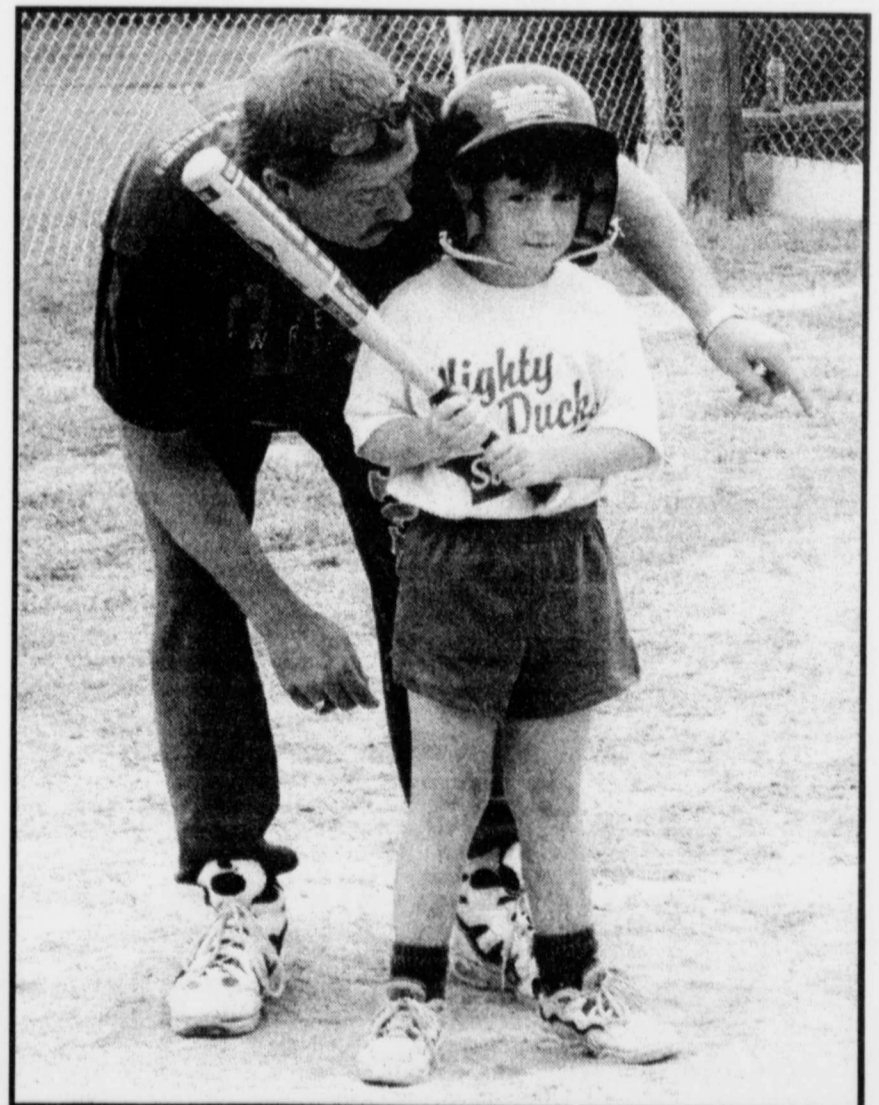

Kristi Hines named finalist

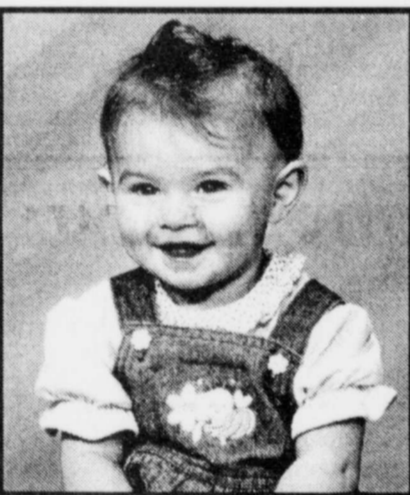

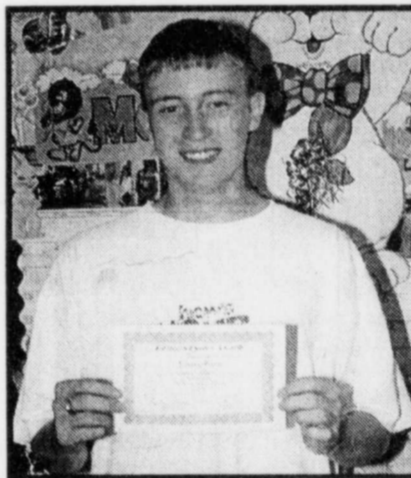
The final judging took place on April 20, 1998 at Love Civic Center in Paris at which time Kristi and the

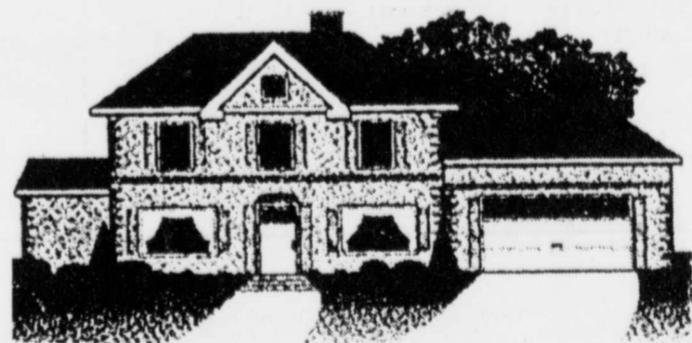

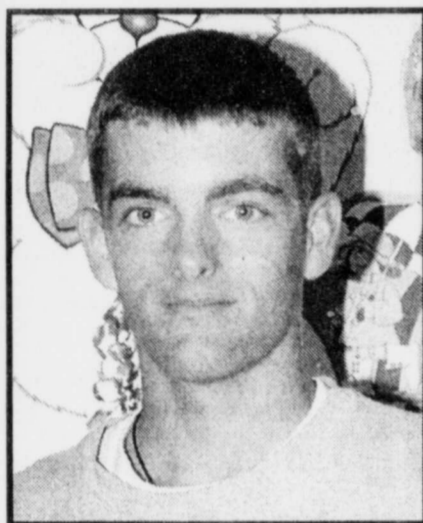

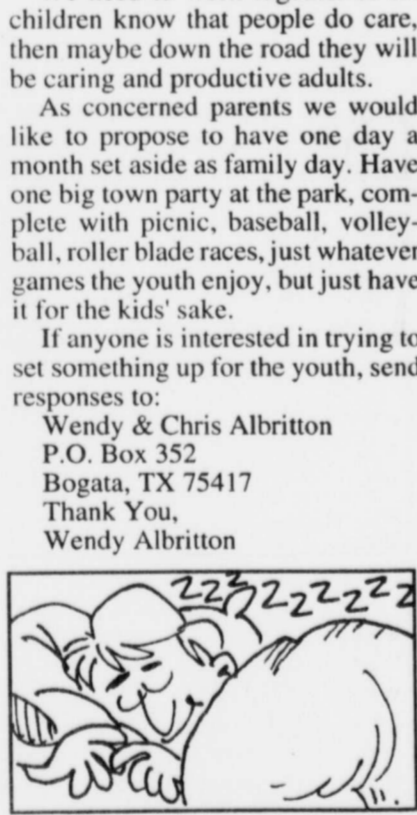

The following is a letter that was sent in by Mr. Wright after he discussed the upcoming bond election at Talco-Bogata CISD with a Talco-Bogata board member

Alba-Golden ISD was established in 1956 by the consolidation of the Golden and Alba School districts. I was a sophomore at Alba High School at that time. There were some people in both school districts opposed to the consolidation, but most now do not regret the merger. For the first twenty two years of the Alba-Golden ISD existence, elementary students (grades 1-6) received their education in the old school at Golden, while students in grades 7-12 attended school in the old Alba School facilities. This meant busing Alba children to Golden and Golden children to Alba, supporting two cafeterias, unimaintaining two very old facilities and employing two custodial staffs. Children attended schools that were cold in winter months, hot in spring and fall months and tolerated leaky roofs.

In 1977, voters passed a bond issue to build new facilities at one location to house Alba-Golden students in all grades. The facilities are located half way between Golden and Alba on highway 69. Some people said that the towns would die without their schools. Since both towns have enjoyed growth in new business and population, fears expressed by those concerned have been proven wrong. We now have nice, clean attractive facilities that give all students an equal opportunity for a good education and success in life. Students take pride in their classrooms, campuses and playgrounds. The new facilities house students in pre-kindergarten through grade 6 on the elementary campus and grades 7-12 at the high school campus. The two campuses are separated by a driveway.

After moving into the new school facilities, students' attitudes improved, academic achievement increased, and student self-esteem improved. Because of the quality facilities, more people moved into the district and school enrollment increased. Alba-Golden grew in size from a small class A to a medium size class 2A school. Other advantages resulting from moving all students to localized campuses are realized in less expense due to maintaining only one cafeteria, maintenance and custodial personnel work together, less expense in maintaining new facilities and buses loading and unloading without students

having to wait. The cost of maintaining new facilities is far less than maintenance of the old buildings in two different locations. But more important is the fact that students, staff and community members take pride in this school and work to support and improve the quality of education for all.

I hope your school can experience the positive atmosphere ours enjoys.

Dear Editor:
 All the attention recently on both sides of the school bond elections has caused rumors and innuendoes that are rapidly growing. In order to satisfy my curiosity, I visited with Superintendent Dr. Gary VanDeaver and he showed the two proposals made by someone as to how the nine plus million dollars in Bonds were to be allocated. I urge anyone interested to review the drawings of the proposal is one and two. I would hope that these drawings would be published in the local papers before the June 6 elections.

Since I am not a native citizen of Talco or Bogata, I feel the one campus concept has some financial merit. I also feel a serious loss to our communities if our K-8 kids are bussed to Rivercrest each day. However, I am now not convinced that the real purpose of this bond proposal is solely for the deplorable buildings that are outdated, and condemned, and for the financial strain in maintaining three separate campuses.

Upon examination of the proposed drawings, I noticed a new modern 1200 seat High School Gym and state of the art High School. The present 30-year old building being given to the Junior High. Less than five years ago, we spent thousands of dollars for enlargement of our current gymnasium to 800 and I assure that it is adequate for a school the size of Rivercrest. Surely, a practice gym would suffice instead of the new million dollar complex proposal. Since Dr. VanDeaver admitted to

me, that wiring and outfitting the present high school for new computer and science laboratories was possible. It seems to me the new school, if indeed it is to be built, should be for the Junior High. Benefits could also be realized to our students for items such as a new music lab, medical technical lab, Fine Arts Department, etc., but as much as we would like to have it, the cost, like some of the items in the current proposals are more than cost prohibitive for a school our size.

To the opponents of this bond issue and to the Talco-Bogata CISD board, give us another option such as a planning stage before we just give you 9 million plus to enhance the High School. I personally am against spending any more money on the Talco or Bogata School structures. I would at least like to see figures of what it would take to rebuild schools in each town, either elementary solely, or elementary and junior high together to help me make my choice.

This proposal has not only been hushed, but rushed as well, and I for one need more time to decide how I would like to see our board spend 9 million of our tax dollars. Dr. VanDeaver stated that we could not get proper bond funding for two more years. That is good. This would give us time to rethink our priorities. This would give time for town meetings and input from those that count, the taxpayer.
