At noon, I went home for lunch, and raised the garage door. Grayson had been pinned down by his neck for four hours. I thought he was dead, which was horrible enough, but he was not. When I sat down beside him and stroked him, this animal ,whose claws were broken off from trying to escape this horrible situation, began purring. I rushed him to the vet, and we thought he would survive, he was getting better. However, when the swelling in his neck went down, there was apparently blood vessel damage, and he must have had an aneurysm and bled to death internally.

I have shed uncountable tears over this. I betrayed my little pet's trust through carelessness.

You see, our garage door opener is one of the older models. It is supposed to reverse if it bumps anything, but it did not.

I had seen it reverse when it bumped our big dog, but it didn't on a small animal.

Since then I have learned that to test your garage door opener you place a roll of paper towels under it. If it does not reverse when it hits the towels...it can kill a cat, a small dog...or, worst of all, a child! Our door crushes the paper towel roll. We are ordering the electric beam that can be added to it. New openers have to have this electric beam by law. This is because children have been killed by the old style.

What I am trying to tell people is...please, test your garage door if it does not have the beam already on it. Don't take a chance on killing a child, or a pet.

Although it was an accident, the ultimate fact is that I tortured and killed an animal I loved very much. How infinitely worse things would have been had the victim been one of my great-nieces or nephews! Perhaps, if someone reads this and makes their door safe for children and pets, I can forgive myself a little. If I think I may have helped someone else prevent an accident, perhaps I can raise the garage door when I go home without crying!



2 cups back-eyed peas-drained cup cornmeal

1/2 cup flour

10 ounces grated cheddar cheese

1/2 pound sausage-brown and crumble I large onion-chopped fine

2 eggs-beaten

Southern-Skillet Chicken Creole 1/3 cup shortening I large onion-chopped I large green pepper-chopped l cup sliced mushroom l clove garlic-mashed 2 cups cooked chicken-cut in chunks

can whole tomatoes 2 teaspoons Worchestershire l teaspoon sugar l teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper

In a large skillet, saute onion, pepper and mushrooms into shortening heated to 375 degrees until onion is soft. Add remaining ingredients except rice.

Simmer 5-10 minutes. Pastry for 2-crust Pie 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour l teaspoon salt

2/3 cup shortening

2-4 tablespoons ice water Sift flour and salt together. Cut in shortening to the size of small peas. Sprinkle in water, I table spoon at a time, mixing lightly with fork until all flour i moistened (3-4 tablespoons water may be added as needed). Firmly press dough into ball and divide into half. On floured surface, roll bottom crust in circle l-inch larger than pie crust.

Computers and video games mean more children stay inside when they could be outside burning off calories.

"When children sit in front of a computer or TV screen they tend to eat more which might cause them to gain weight." said Gorham. Here are some exercise tips for parents to re-

*Encourage kids to walk to and from school if it is safe.

*Basketball, volleyball, swimming and biking are all good forms of ex-

* Keep exercise equipment in the

*Encourage kids to play during

*Look for churches or other organizations that offer activities for chil-

Parents should stress exercise and not diets, which are not healthy for growing children. The best programs for overweight children are those that incorporate lifetime habits of healthy eating and consistent exercise..

Parents can help by modeling these behaviors and exercising and eating right themselves. Encourage healthier snacks from the USDA's Food Guide Pyramid for when children get home from school, keep the junk food out of the house or at least limit it to occasional treats.

"Teaching children the importance of good nutrition and exercise early on will help them choose the right path to a healthy life-style when they become adults," said Gorham.

Why? Well, health officials point out hands and fingernails should get a vigorous scrub with soap and the warmest water possible for 20 seconds which just happens to be the exact

length of "The Alphabet Song." And that just goes to prove safe food handling can be as easy as A-B-C.



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





Texas has more than 800,000 ponds

By Mike Morrow County Extension Agent-Ag. Lamar County

Texas has more than 800,000 private ponds. Properly managed ponds provide excellent recreational opportunities. A good fishing pond must be managed like a vegetable garden. It must be seeded properly, limed and fertilized correctly, weeded now and then, and harvested in the correct numbers and on an appropriate timetable. The basic guidelines for good pond management include pond construction and watershed management, species selection and stocking, liming and fertilization, pond balance

management and weed control.

Pond banks should slope rapidly to a depth of 2.5 feet or more. Aquatic plants do not easily establish themselves at this depth, especially if a

good algae bloom is maintained. Several herbicides are labeled for use in ponds for aquatic weed control. Check with the Extension office for your local farm supply dealer to determine which herbicides will best target your weed problem. Always read and follow label instructions.

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
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
