Talco-Bogata CISD Public Forum well attended

The Talco-Bogata CISD School Board held a public forum Thursday, April 30, in the auditorium of Rivercrest High School. The purpose of the forum was for the board to answer the public's questions about the proposed new \$9 million dollar school. A bond election will take place June

Rivercrest High School Principal Price gave the invocation. Board President, Eddy Brown, and school superintendent, Dr. Gary VanDeaver welcomed the people and gave some reasons for the combining of the three schools, Bogata Elementary-Junior High, Talco Elementary-Junior High and Rivercrest High School, on one single campus at Johntown. They said the board had put aside their own feelings and done what they thought was best for the children's education. They asked the voters to do the same. They offered to sit down with anyone and show them the plans. The forum was video taped.

Speakers had been scheduled and their questions had been printed on a program which was handed out at the door. A 6 or 7 minute per speaker time limit was set.

The first speaker was Elmer Patton, Jr. He said both schools were 60 years old and that the board could have done what Mount Pleasant did and built a new school without consulting the citizens, but they did not. He reported that there was a citizen's committee with 6 from Bogata and 6 from Talco who helped with the decision and that 90% of the committee thought the combined schools would be better. He also mentioned the old friction between Talco and Bogata.

Alton Baker gave a different slant on the situation. He has granddaughters in the system. He said the rush wasn't necessary and that the school board got the cart before the horse. They should have been several meetings to inform the public before voting a bond election. He also advised that haste makes waste. He questioned the wisdom of 3 gyms and asked if sports was the main function of the school with academics taking

a backseat. He asked people to vote no and give more time for study.

Christine Hallford also is against the proposal. She will have to sell land to pay her taxes. She had a problem with busing the little children to Johntown and recommended redoing the existing buildings and not tearing the heart out of the communities.

Debbie Hare asked that each opinion be respected. She commented on the conditions of the school buildings. She had praise for the teachers and the students. She also commented on sentimental attachment to the old buildings. She wants to "Live in the present, plan for the future and appreciate the past.'

Dub Mowery, a Church of Christ Minister from Talco believes everybody is sincere whether they are for or against. He wants everyone to conduct themselves as mature adults since the children are watching us all. He said that whatever happens we should get behind the schools. He reminded the group that the people who have children in schools are not the only ones who will be responsible for paying taxes for the schools.

James Wood said the facilities at Bogata and Talco are unfair to the children. His problem is the size of the proposed gymnasium. He also would put the Junior High in a new building instead of building a new high school and putting the Jr. High in the old high school building. He says he will vote against the proposal, but hopes everyone will continue to be friends regardless of how

Anita Stubblefield, a retired teacher said that 30 years ago the school board agreed to leave the Bogata and Talco Elementary and Junior Highs in their own towns, but times have changed and that is not the best plan. She is for the proposal 100%.

Sara Stanley, a student, read a letter she had written. She was speaking to the idea that the older children would abuse the younger children on buses and on the combined campus. She said students are responsible and asked voters to vote for the proposal. She also questioned adults who would pay big taxes on snuff and cigarettes and gripe about more taxes for new schools.

Candias Nickerson, a student, had also written a letter. She had her daughter with her and said that unless things improved she would not allow her child to attend Bogata School. She said people should vote for the proposal and taxes will go down later.


Earl Hale is against the proposal. He says there are not enough specific answers to vote for the district to spend \$9 million dollars. He says the kids will have to stay on the buses too long. He is also proud of the Talco School building. He believes everything is moving too fast.

Randy Hollis questioned branch voting at the high school and Junior High graduations. He said that absentee ballots are for people who can't get to the polls to vote as sched-

Jim Carroll said he is the same age as the Talco and Bogata School. He encourage everyone to get the facts and not pay attention to rumors. He said it Tier II funding stops the schools will be bankrupt. He is for the proposal and wants Talco-Bogata to be

Darla Ottinger has problems with the plans. Wants to know why so much money is to be spent on a sports complex and none on the agriculture department. She says that few people make a living playing ball and that she is not worried about how comfortable people who go to ballgames are. (Referring to the 1200 seat gymnasium). She is not against renovating Bogata and Talco Schools.

In closing, Board President, Eddy Brown said the board has been talking about the move for a long time. He thanked Dr. VanDeaver for his hard work on the project and said he (Brown) had told the board, "If we are going to build something we need to build something we can be proud of or not build anything at all."

Marie Legate was in the hospital for several days and is now in Bogata Nursing Home.



The community meeting was held at the center Monday. A garage sale was voted to have on the 23rd of May at 7 a.m. for the benefit of the center, also a bake sale will be included.





Cookie Recipes

Peanut Butter Trail Mix Cookies cups uncooked oats

2 brown sugar /2 cup butter ormargarine

2 cup chunky peanut butter -1/2 teaspoon vanilla

3/4 cup flour /2 cup mashed banana

-1/2 teaspoon baking powder

/2 teaspoon salt cup trail mix

Heat oven to 350 degrees. In food processor or blender, process oats until coarsely ground. Set aside. In large mixing bowl, combine sugar, butter, peanut butter and vanilla. Beat until light and fluffy. Add oats, flour, banana, baking powder and salt. Beat until dough orms and stir in trail mix. Drop dough by heaping teaspoons 2 inches apart onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake for 8-10

ninutes or until set. Cool completely. Zucchini Raisin Cookies cup packed brown sugar cup butter or margarine

l teaspoon vanilla l teaspoon grated orange peel 2-1/2 cup crushed whole-grain wheat

1-1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1/2 cup wheat germ 2 teaspoon baking soda





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

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

the market or special appraised value placed on your property

the unequal appraisal of your property the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll

any exemptions that may apply to you the qualification for an agricultural or timber

the taxable status of your property the local governments which should be taxing

your property

the ownership of property the change of use of land receiving special

appraisal any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal

district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may If you appeal a have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other con-cerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review

The law gives property owners the right to protest the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 101 West Broadway, Clarksville, Texas.

> Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 101 West Broadway, Clarksville, Texas. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P.O. Box 13528, Austin, Texas 78711-3528.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some rea-son beyond your control like a medical emer-gency. The ARB decides whether you have good

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

For change of use (the appraisal district informed

you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land) the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARE decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls ona weekend or holiday.




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

Shifting sands provide clue to erosion causes

COLLEGE STATION - Shifting coastal and desert sands are helping one Texas A&M University geographer learn more about ancient

climates and the causes of erosion. Texas A&M geographer Vatche Tchakerian is looking at the effects of wind erosion on the deserts of the United States, Mexico and the Middle East.

In the United States' Mojave Desert, he's studying the history of wind erosion in hopes of learning more about ancient climates. The Mojave Desert was extremely

windy and sandy, he said. His research also suggests desert winds carried more sand around 10,000 years ago than they do now. Tchakerian said he has learned this by looking at wind-abraded grooves on rocks and sand dunes, which reveal a lot about the origin of the

The camp also benefits Texas schools by offering teachers the chance to serve as camp counselors while earning continuing education



To the Editor:

I address this to you with much sadness and concern regarding the plan to move Bogata Grammar and Junior High Schools to Rivercrest. I am sure those who are in favor of this have considered just what such a move will do to Bogata. I have been told that there should be no emotional or sentimental feelings regarding this. Wrong! Our family has paid city, county, state and school taxes since 1928, not only for our Bogata house, but Sulphur River bottom land as well, and we continue to do so. Therefore, I feel that we have a right to express our thoughts in regards to this matter.

It is true we have not resided in Bogata and contributed to the daily upkeep and economy of the town, as most of you have, but the town and people are near and dear to us.

We lost our high school when the consolidation occurred, and at the time I felt this was a mistake and I still do. It took a lot of heart out of the town. This next considered move will be even more detrimental, in my opin-

Having lived in the Dallas Ft. Worth Metroplex since 1947, and having children and grandchildren in the Garland, Arlington and Grand Prairie school systems, I have seen many changes, some good, but other terrible. As long as we had neighborhood schools where our children were allowed to walk to and from school and where parents, grandparents or friends could walk with them was a real plus. This gives a feeling of security and love to children.

I drove to and from work for 46 years and had to follow buses as they made there stops. It was sad to see the small children standing on the corner waiting for their buses in the rain, snow or heat. How many of you parents feel your child could be picked up at Rivercrest in case of an accident? If they were in Bogata, someone could even walk to get them. Have you considered the traffic on Hwy. 271?

One area of great concern, is the financial side of this whole thing. Why not use some of these funds to refurbish the present facilities in Bogata and Talco, to take care of the neighborhood schools? After that use

the remaining amount at Rivercrest. I'm opposed to the very expensive structures which are built after paying "big bucks" for architects to design plans for elaborate buildings that do not enhance the education of the children on iota.

I watched the kids walking to and from school on April 28, 29 and 30, and it did my heart good. There was lots of laughter and talking among them, such as sense of freedom, and I feel it will be a thing of the past if we lose the schools.

I attended the meeting held at Rivercrest. It was a good meeting with much information presented by both sides. Just remember there are problems that come when you take grade school children and put them with a high school, more especially where they have to be bused. A grand school facility does not make for a good education. Just visit the Dallas-Ft. Worth area and you will find that these grand structures do not stay so grand.

Please give it lots of thought before you vote for moving schools.

control officer to pick up animals out in the county that have attacked people or animals that are rabid, and accepted bids for road material and



Depression problems pose unique challenges

COLLEGE STATION - As many people suffering from depression and other stress-related problems know, finding the right kind of health care is not easy. Psychological problems are often stigmatized, appointments may be difficult to arrange and often people do not realize they are suffering from such problems.

An early detection program developed by two Texas A&M University professors and funded by Scott & White Clinics seeks to remedy this situation. By screening for mental health problems during primary care visits, the program aims to increase recovery rates and decrease health care costs.

"Our concern is that a large number of patients with psychological problems are going untreated," said Mary Meagher, the Texas A&M psychology professor who designed the program. "Although 75 percent of the patients with these stress-related illnesses have contact with a primary care doctor, only about 15 percent seek out mental health treatment."

When patients do not recognize psychological problems, they often ike repeat visits to their family doctor complaining of physical problems. In these cases, doctors can have a hard time tracking down the problem, Bramson said.

But when the early detection program identifies the mental health malady, the real problem, not the headaches and stomachaches, is

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





Ancient clue could lead to efficient vitamin

COLLEGE STATION - A "little instruction book" embedded billions of years ago in the DNA of bacteria could give modern biochemists a better way to produce an important vitamin, researchers say.

The instructions - genetic information that enabled ancient forms of bacteria to make vitamin B-12 during the eons before the earth's atmosphere contained oxygen could provide the foundation for improved production of the important vitamin today, say biochemists at Texas A&M University.

Survival of the vitamin-producing genetic information is unusual, says biochemist A. Ian Scott, director of Texas A&M's Center for Biological Nuclear Magnetic Reso-

"Usually, nature is more parsimonious than this," says Scott. "It doesn't like to expend energy to maintain systems it doesn't use."

This system, a 20-step biochemical pathway that synthesizes vitamin B-12 without oxygen - anaerobically - has been used for at least four billion years, Scott says, then bacteria evolved to survive in an environment that contains oxygen and developed an aerobic process to do the same thing about two billion
