## U.S. 271 to be resurfaced

About 5.6 miles of U.S. 271 between the Franklin County Line and Farm-to-Market Road 1896 in Northern Titus County will be repaired and resurfaced this year according to plans approved by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) in May.

"The work will include making necessary pavement repairs to the current roadway and then resurfacing the entire roadway with new asphalt pavement," said Roger Ledbetter, area engineer for TxDOT in Mount Pleasant. "We will also be replacing and upgrading guard rails along this section of highway."

Buster Paving Company, Inc. of Sulphur Springs was awarded the contract for the project with a low bid of \$1.5 million.

"Work on the project should begin in July and be completed by December of this year," Ledbetter said.

## School Bond election is Saturday

Main voting in the Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. School House Bond Election will take place Saturday, June 6.

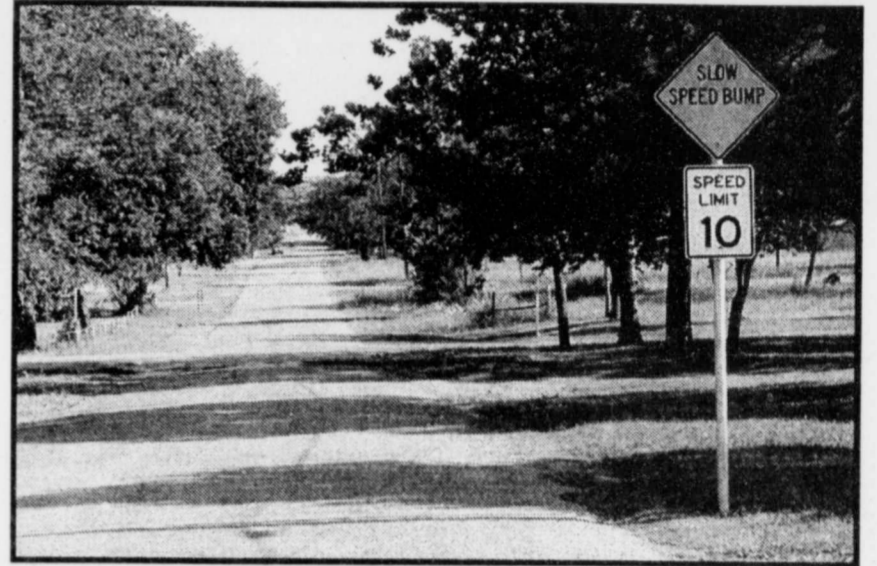
Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. and polls will be located in the lobby of the Talco Elementary School and in the cafeteria of Bogata Elementary School.

According to Dr. Gary VanDeaver, Superintendent of Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D., the proposal calls for \$9 million for the construction of new

facilities for elementary and high school and improvements to the current high school building. If the proposal passes, an increase of .20 per

\$100.00 valuation in the district's tax rate will be necessary to pay for the bonds. It is estimated that this tax increase would raise the taxes on a home valued at \$35,000.00 by \$3.33 per month. This is based on a home-stead exemption of \$15,000.00.

All registered voters who did not vote early are encouraged to cast their ballot in this important issue. Voters should remember that new election codes require voters to present their registration card or a picture I.D. (such as a driver's license) to election officials before being accepted as a voter at the polls.

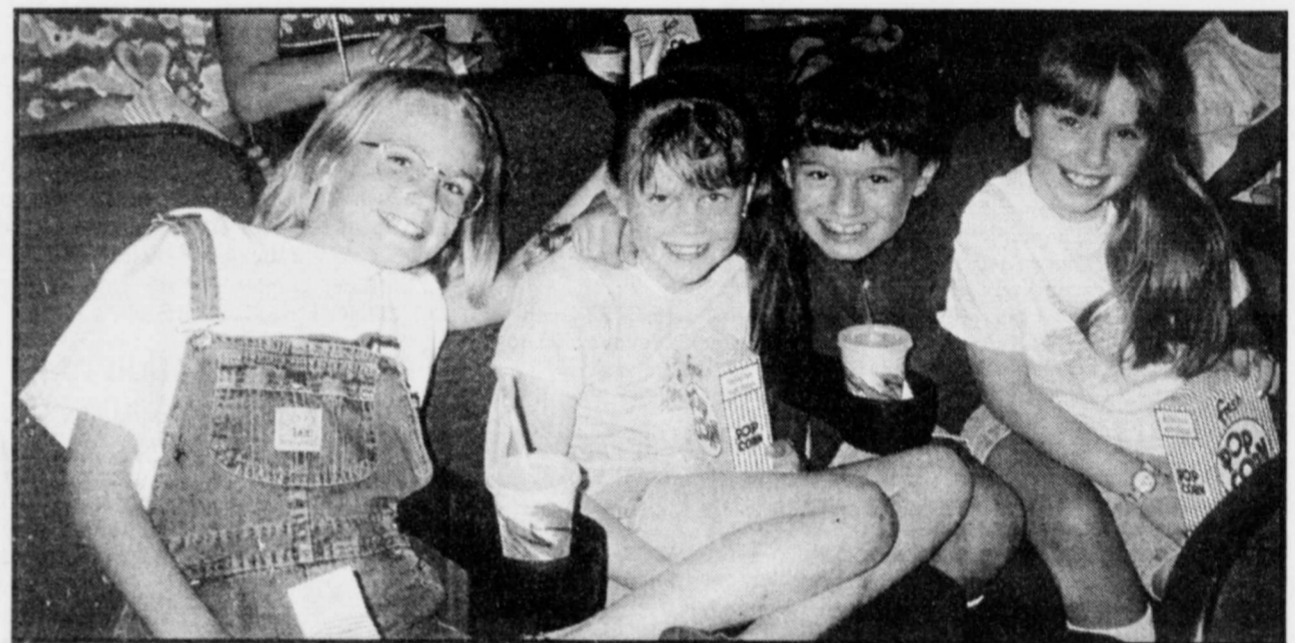

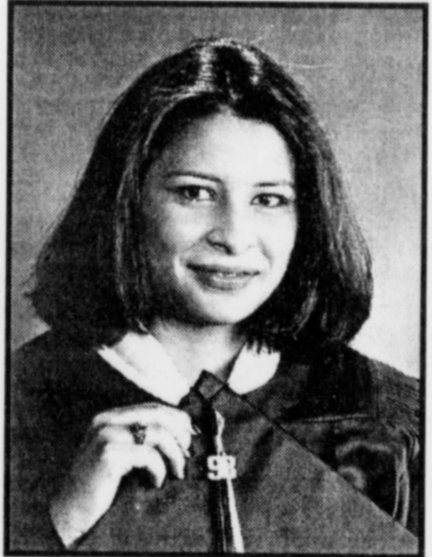

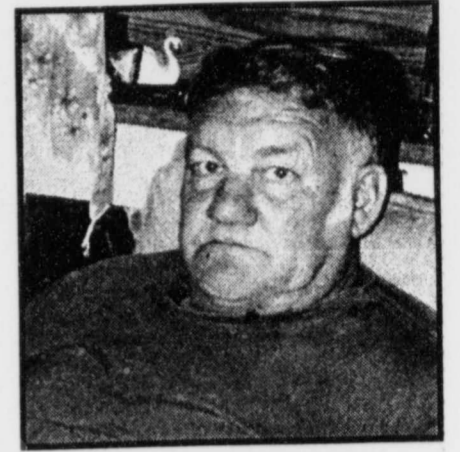

1 teaspoon vinegar  
1 cup marshmallow cream  
1 pint whipping cream  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 tablespoons powdered sugar  
1 can pineapple tidbits  
1 can peaches  
1 jar maraschino cherries  
1/2 to 1 cup chopped pecans

Cook egg yolk, sugar and vinegar. Add marshmallow cream; stir until mixed. Chill. Whip 1 pint whipping cream, add vanilla, powdered sugar and fold in pineapple, peaches, cherries and pecans. Freeze 12 hours and place and serve. If you use Cool Whip in place of whipping cream, omit powdered sugar and vanilla.

1 large box vanilla wafers-crushed

4 cups half and half

dash red food coloring-optional

In a heavy three-quart sauce pan, combine flour, 2 cups sugar and 1 teaspoon salt. Beat in milk and eggs until blended. Cook over medium heat stirring until mixture thickens and soats spoon. Cool. Crush berries or peaches with lemon juice and 1 cup sugar. Pour half and half, vanilla and coloring, egg mixture and fruit into freezer.

**RUMOR:** The bond issue is for a new sports complex, with 3 gyms.

**FACT:** The RHS gym now being used for ALL basketball programs will be used by the Jr. High program.

**FACT:** A new competition gym would be built for the High School. The High School gym brought in \$10,000 into the district last year.

**FACT:** A new Physical Education classroom would be built for the Elementary students. This building would NOT have bleachers or a competition floor, but would provide a covered climate controlled place for students to grow physically and mentally. Physical Education is required by state law.

**FACT:** There will NOT be 3 gyms built.

**RUMOR:** Computers and technology are being overlooked in the bond issue.

**FACT:** New and larger computer, science and technology labs and library are needed NOW at the High School level and ARE being addressed in the bond proposal.

**RUMOR:** Your taxes will not increase if the bond fails.

**FACT:** Taxes WILL increase regardless, how much depends on how much revenue is needed to FIX problems of the district. There is no way to predict how much it would cost to remodel the Talco campus and have it up to the fire code and to ADA (American Disabilities Act) standards, which is Federal law. The building is 60 years old.

**RUMOR:** Faculty members were FORCED to sign the recently published ad for the new school.

**FACT:** No faculty or staff members was forced to participate. This ad was designed and agreed to by each name presented. \*see Teacher ad\*

**RUMOR:** Class size will effect the students classroom performance and learning abilities.

**FACT:** The State mandates class size.

**FACT:** Teachers will have better working conditions to educate all students.

**FACT:** More educational benefits could be offered to students.

**FACT:** The Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. has prided itself in hiring the best qualified staff available. The Teachers and other staff members are professionals with the student's best interest at heart.

**FACT:** Increased class size would encourage students to perform at their personal best in every aspect of their educational experience.

**RUMOR:** We have plenty of room on the present campuses to build or remodel.

**FACT:** The Bogata campus has 325 students on 4 acres, Talco has 235 students on 10 acres and Rivercrest has 220 students on 50 acres.

**FACT:** The Bogata campus is too small for any building program according to TEA. The Talco building is now filled to capacity, with MAJOR problems to repair or rebuild. The Rivercrest building is in good shape and with a little updating would make an outstanding Jr. High.

**FACT:** The land surrounding the present High School is owned by the district and is large enough to accommodate having an Elementary, Jr. High and High School complex.

**RUMOR:** The towns will dry up and disappear if the schools leave.

**FACT:** The schools are not leaving just being relocated to a safer environment.

**FACT:** The towns such as Naples, Omaha, Alba, Golden, Como or Pickton have not disappeared but have grown.

**FACT:** There were no TOWNS in Hagansport, Fulbright, Cuthand or the others that were mentioned, they were only communities. These schools were lost due to lack of students and state law. There are more residents in these areas now than in years past.

**RUMOR:** Tier II funding will cease in two years.

**FACT:** If Tier II funding ceases in two years school districts across the state will close. New schools are being built today with the help of the state. Currently 1,069 schools are taking advantage of Tier II funding. Let's take advantage of the state's offer to provide 73% of the funds needed to provide the students of our district a new facility.

**RUMOR:** Parents and Grandparents would not have easy access to their children if an emergency should arise.

### Jack Herrington gives history of Lennox house to Fulbright Club

Red River County District and County Attorney Jack Herrington met with the Fulbright Community Club on Monday evening, with the main topic of discussion being the Lennox House in Clarksville.

Herrington, who is also president of the Red River County Historical Society, gave a short history of the house and the Lennox family. The Queen Anne style home was built in the 1890's and was given to the Red River County Historical Society two years ago. Some historians believe that the house was built in 1895 and some say 1898.

The house was built by Martha Washington Lennox' father, Charles David Lennox, Sr. He was involved in farming, raising cattle and banking. The Lennox family owned approximately 21,000 acres of land from Sulphur River to the Red River in Red River County. The family was noted as one of the early Texas settlers. In fact, Martha Lennox grandfather, Albert Hamilton Latimer, signed the Texas Declaration of Independence. The house is located at 601 Broadway in Clarksville.

All the furniture in the home has been completely refinished as well as the doors and hardwood floors. New windows made in the exact design of the originals, with double panes, have been installed throughout the house.

Six fireplaces were found in the house, but only five could be refurbished. Most of the light fixtures were replaced with new fixtures fashioned after Victorian type fixtures of the time.

Air conditioning and heating have also been added to the home.

Funding for the restoration of the Lennox house has been provided through the Lennox Foundation. Over the past two years, \$500,000.00 has been spent on the project.

An open house will be held the second Saturday in October. At the present, tours by appointment are being conducted at the house for an admission fee of \$5.00 per person.

The house is also available for weddings and other special events. The money raised from the tours and special events will be used by the Historical Society to maintain the facility.

Dear Dr. VanDeaver:

There is absolutely no reason to believe that the state will eliminate its "Tier II" matching funding for local school district tax levies.

Tier II funding was an essential part of the system that was approved by the Texas Supreme Court in the Edgewood lawsuit. Failure to continue such funding will certainly land the state back in court. Further, from a strictly political standpoint, a substantial majority of school districts in Texas depend on Tier II funding to meet their ongoing budget needs. It is difficult to envision a situation where a majority of legislators and the governor would allow a reduction in that funding without providing a replacement system worth at least as much in state funds.

While state funding has never reached the share that many of us believe it should, the state has nonetheless never changed the funding system so as to place a larger burden on local taxpayers for the repayment of existing bonds. To say that it could happen is merely to repeat a tired old argument trotted out by anti-bond forces to avoid any meaningful discussion of the merits of your building proposal. I'm sure there are legitimate reasons to vote for or against your bond issue, but fear of losing Tier II funding is not among them.

I hope this helps to clarify the situation for you and your taxpayers.

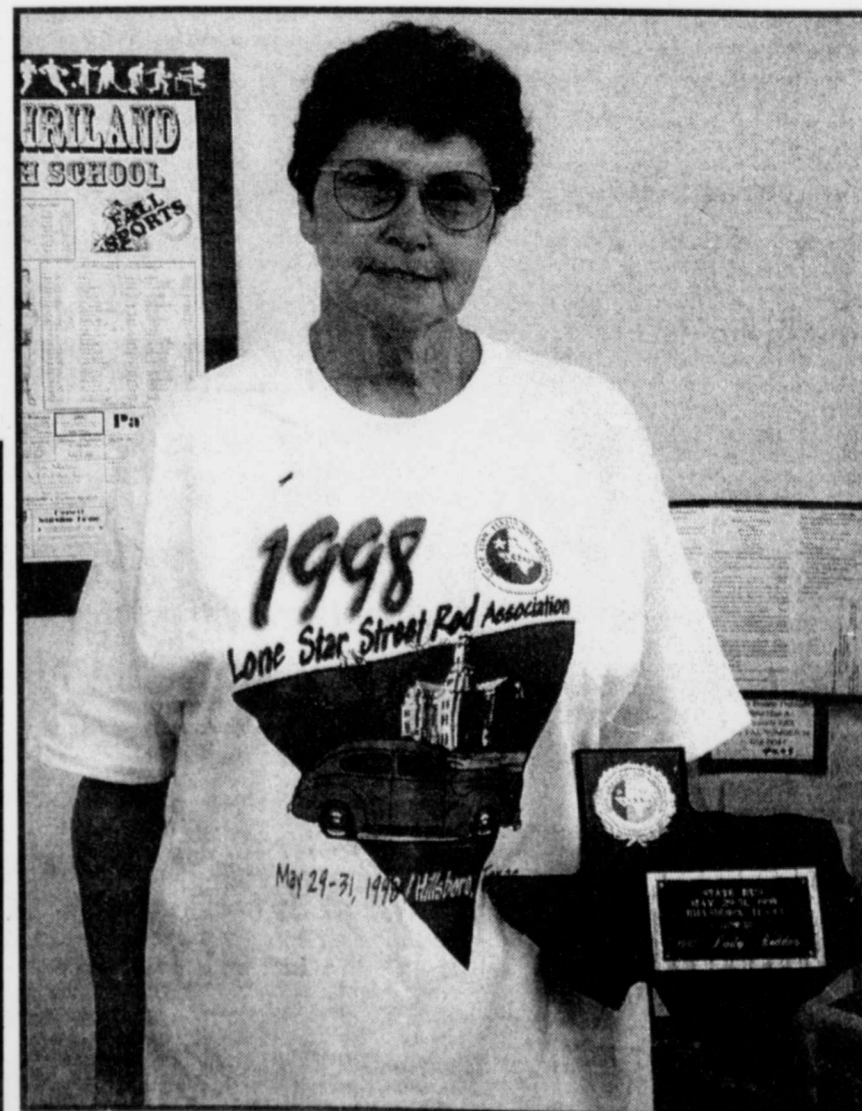
Of course, Sonny and Juanita have time for their two adult sons, Jay and Dickie, and their grandson Brandon.

Commissioner's report for May

May has been a very dry month except the last week and we were able to get several things done. We hauled rock, installed one tank car at Marris Chapel, cut limbs, patched oil roads, installed 2 culverts, did maintenance work on our equipment and got some ditches pulled. We are pleased with the things we were able to accomplish.

In May we hauled 1 load of white rock to the yard, 1 load to the sewer plant and 1 load to Marris Chapel road. We hauled 2 loads of oil sand to the yard for patching material. We hauled 10 loads of railroad rock to Marris Chapel road and 44 loads of railroad rock to the McCoy Community. We also hauled 5 loads of railroad rock to the Sherry Community. The rock will be paid for by one of the oil companies.

We used 20 hours of community service workers and 80 hours of inmate labor. The labor helped in our patching and picking up railroad spikes. A magnet was purchased to help with picking up the railroad spikes.

In Commissioners Court this month we passed a resolution supporting legislation allowing counties

to establish weight limits on county roads, accepted bids on "Stuck-Off" property, approved contract with B.A.C. for work program, approved bid for lead paint and asbestos analysis for the court house. We also approved deputation of Carolyn Mauldin as Deputy District Clerk, approved expending funds from the Book Preservation Budget for indexing and comparing records in the county Clerks office, approved sending drug task force attorney to a required school, approved supporting legislation which would require inmates from this area to pay reimbursement to the county for up keep while they are incarcerated in the county jail. We also approved plot of Graff road in precinct 2, approved State Title IV-E Reimbursement Contract of the Child Protective Board between Red River County and the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services, approved resolution supporting grant for computer equipment and amended County Attorney's budget to cover repair on automobile.

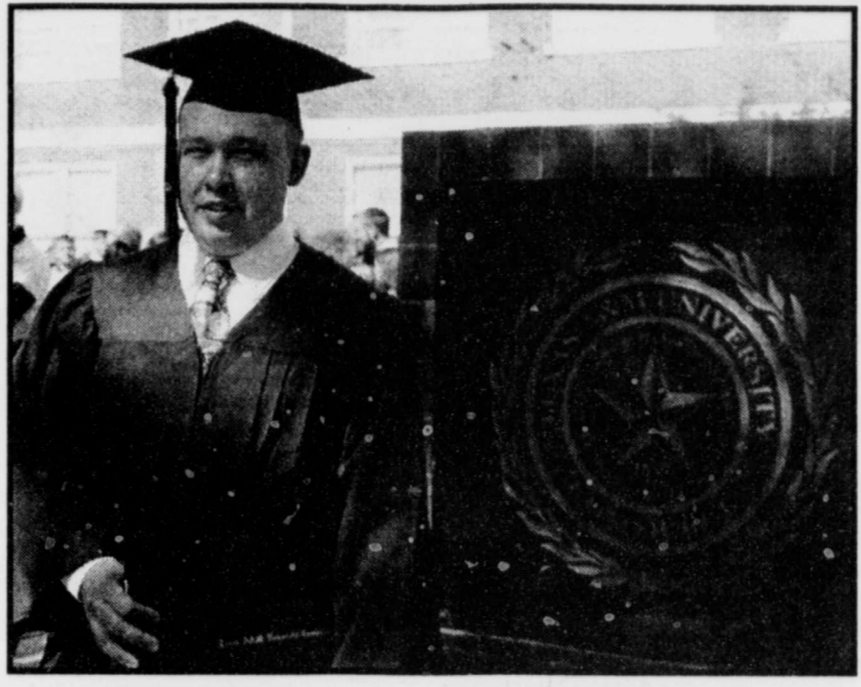

**Resident receives fellowship**

*"When I took this position in 1990, I immediately realized something needed to be done about the facilities at Talco and Bogata. At Talco, the sewage system was just about rotted away. In case of fire, many children would not have escape routes. The electrical fixtures are very old and the wiring system is overloaded, which leads to major safety concerns. The building continues to settle and the roof will be in continual need of costly repairs. I always considered it deplorable that we placed our students and teachers in such sub-standard facilities at the Bogata Junior High campus. I was involved in an effort to bring our facilities in compliance with federal handicap requirements. After thorough study, it was evident that the modifications required at the Talco building would be cost prohibitive. I am in sincere hopes that this important issue passes for two reasons. First, for the educational benefits to the students and secondly, to put an end to putting students in an educational environment that is a concern to me."*

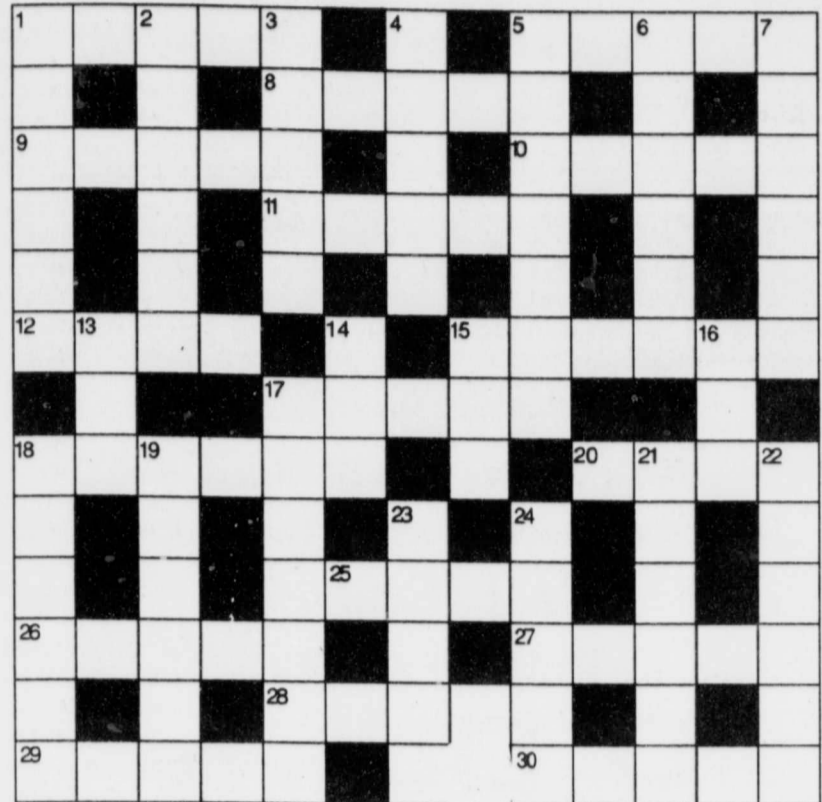

**Basketball camp planned**

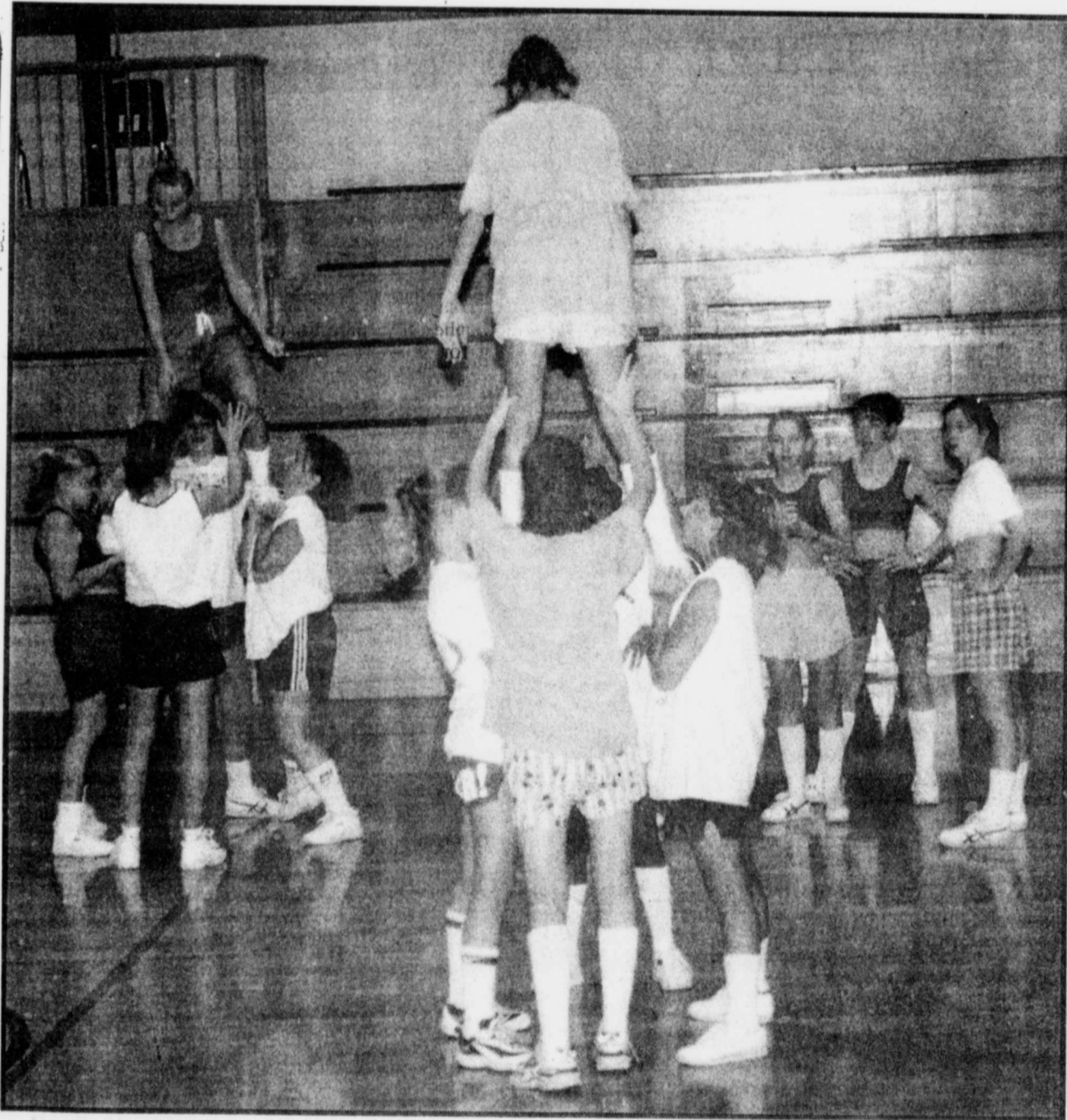

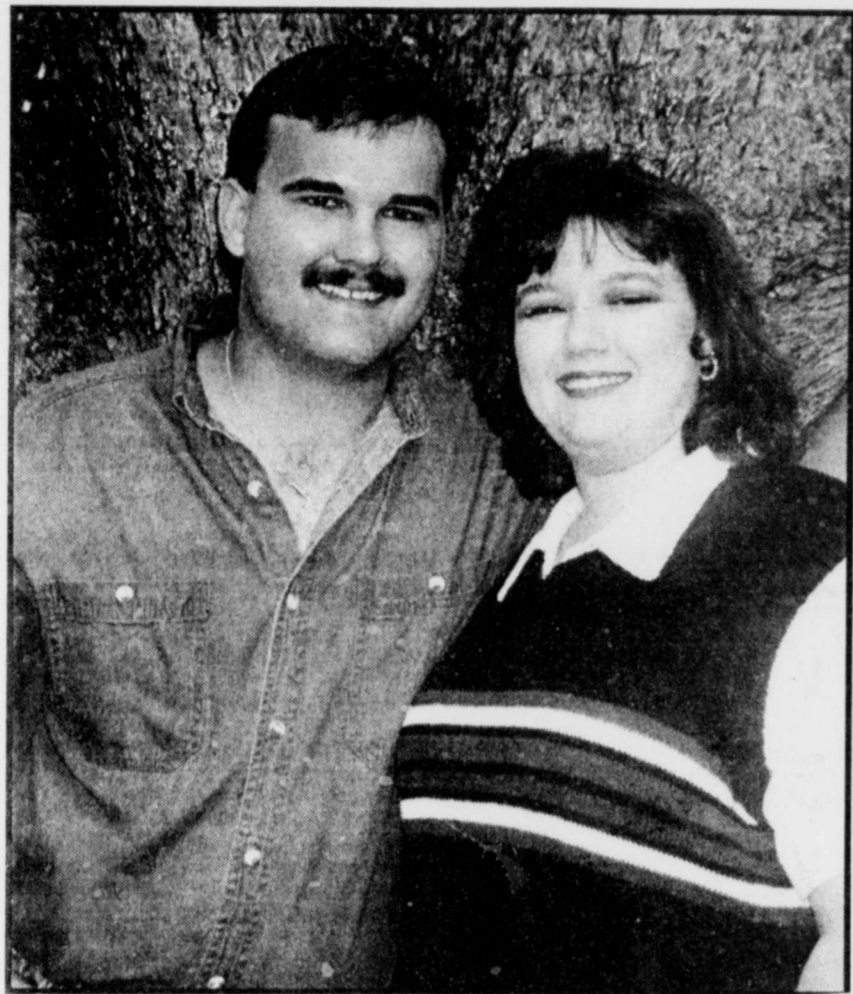

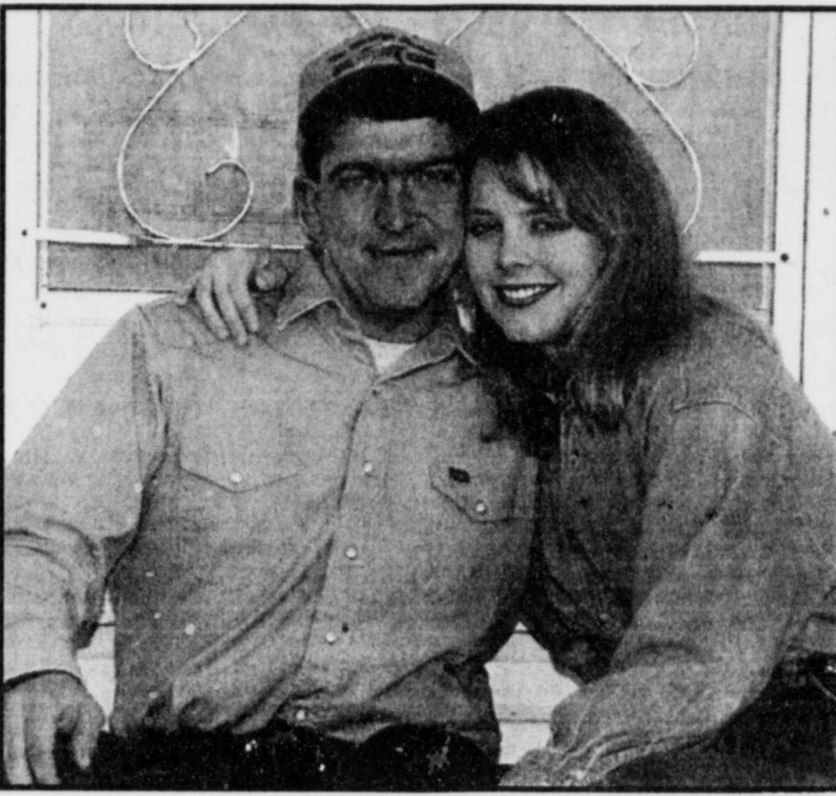
