Two days before my niece had pulled down the attic stairway in the garage to put some things up, and Kinker had done what cats do, slipping up into the attic space.


The poor cat was too dehydrated to even walk!

# Petition filed to overturn Talco-Bogata bond election vote

A petition has been filed to have progress of the bond issue. the Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District's recent \$9 million bond vote reversed.

The complaint, filed in Titus County on Friday, July 10, 1998, alleges voter fraud and other "illegal acts" took place during the election June 6, 1998. The vote, which passed by ten votes, was to pave the way for construction of a central campus at the current high school location. This would do away with elementary and junior high facilities at Bogata and Talco.

The complaint asked for injunctive relief against James Eddie Brown, president of the Talco-Bogata CISD board of trustees and Superintendent Dr. Gary Vandeaver in a bid to halt

Roy Marris of Bogata and Randy Carroll and Darla Ottinger of Talco filed the petition.

The three said the election involved "illegality in the voting procedure which resulted in its approval.

They contend that "the illegal votes materially affected the outcome of the election, such that the bond issue was approved when it would otherwise have been defeated."

The petition alleges that some of the voters were not proper residents and "voted illegally with the knowledge and cooperation of the propo-

Watermelon is one of the summer's greatest gifts. It always tastes best slightly chilled, on a day that is at least 85 degrees...in our case, it has been slightly in the 100's, in the shade or when you are sitting on the back steps or where you can spit the seeds without anyone caring.

Don't tell the kids, but watermelon is really a giant, red-fleshed cucumber, a relative of gourds. It isn't a fruit at all. But that doesn't seem to stop anyone. Americans consumed a record 17.4 pounds perperson in 1996. That same year, U.S. farmers raised an estimated 4.4 billion pounds, and consumer demand for watermelon all year around resulted in increased imports from Mexico and Central America.

Most watermelons come to the market between the months of April and October, with May through August being the peak season. The biggest seller in subermarkets are the oblong varieties such as "Jubilee" amd the round to oval "Crimson Sweet" which weighs from 16-40 pounds.

Up north, midget or "icebox" varieties such as "Sugar Baby" have found their followers, even though they only reach 5-15 pounds. Because many people don't like the bother of seed, new round seedless varieties (some still have tiny, white, edible seeds) are popular too. There



### Children are at high risk of exposure to high levels of ozone

exposed to high levels of ground- Harris County Hospital District's Ben level ozone during the summer than Taub General Hospital in Houston.

"Children have a growing respiratory tract, and breathe in more air per pound of body weight then adults, so we tend to see a drop in lung function more in children," said Dr. Nick Hanania,, an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "In addition, children are outside more than most adults during the summer and therefore are more susceptible to ground-level ozone exposure.

There are two types of ozone, one good, one bad. Ground-level ozone, or bad ozone, is an oxidant formed by either exhaust from petrochemical plants or automobiles and can damage body tissue. Stratospheric ozone, or good ozone, is 10 to 15 miles away from the earth's surface and prevents ultraviolet light from penetrating the

"The sunlight, heat, and humidity, all factors for high ground level ozone levels, are highest during the midday period," said Hanania, a lung special-

Children are more at risk of being ist in the emergency center at the 'It is best to change play-time to either the early morning or late afternoon, and keep children in an air conditioned facility as much as pos-

Asthmatics, 40 percent of whom are children, and the elderly are also at high risk of becoming ill from too much exposure to ozone. Those affected may suffer from chest tightness, a cough, and breathing problems. This is why it is important for everyone to take ozone watches and warnings seriously.

Healthy individuals, especially those who exercise or work outside on a daily basis, should not think they are immune to the effects of ozone exposure.

"Researchers do not yet know what effect exposure to high levels of ground-level ozone will have on longterm health," said Hanania. "The best thing we can do right now is educate people on the health risks, " said Hanania.

I recently chose to show my suppport for centralizing the two elementary and junior high campuses in our school district by voting for the proposed bond dealing with this important issue. My father is Dennis Purviance, a long time resident of the Bogata area who currently also resides in Cresson, TX. Although Dennis has career responsibilities that require him to spend most of his time in Cresson, he still maintains a permanent residence and is a registered voter in Red River County. He receives mail, receives and answers jury summons and votes in local state and national elections from this residence. Upon retirement in a few years, he plans on spending all of his time in the Bogata area. My father is a progressive thinker who has a granddaughter who will attend school in the Talco-Bogata district and is a strong supporter of the bond issue. Armed with this conviction and with every legal right, he proceeded to the ballot box on June 6. Upon arrival at the polling station, he explained his situation to the election judge and when he was told that he was a legal voter, he cast his vote in support of the bond

In the Friday, July 10 issue of the Paris News it was reported that a group of people are suing the superintendent of the Talco-Bogata school district and the president of the school board. ### County Commissioner's report

June has been a busy and a good month for us. We have finally completed what we call the Old McCoy Road or County Road 1345. This road has been in bad shape for some time now and the crew did a good job on it. We have several other roads on schedule to do though, so we have a lot left to be done.

This month we hauled 58 loads of railroad rock and 29 loads of red rock. We installed 2 culverts and used 48 hours of inmate labor and 62 hours of community service. We also were able to pull some ditches, and there are still a lot left to be pulled. We have also started putting up our road signs. We probably lack about 2 weeks getting all these up, except where there were mistakes in ordering or on the map that need to be corrected. Hopefully this won't take too long to complete.

In Commissioner's Court this

month we approved the purchase of about 3/4 of a block of land across from the old jail. We also approved names of presiding judge in each precinct for the Democratic Party and approved purchase of a pickup for precinct 2. We also passed a resolution for the probation department to seek more information to establish a residential treatment center in Red River County for adult offenders. This would be a secured facility for sex offenders from all over the state with drug and alcohol problems. It is my understanding that they would receive treatment and phycological evaluation. This would be a grant funding facility with the county paying about 25% of the grant. This would include utilities and facility. I also understand that there are 15 sex offenders in Red River County on probation and on the streets. I would like to hear your comments and talk to you in regards to this matter. MANUFACTURED HOME
