And what does this mean to you as a consumer?

The first thing most people think of is "wow, I'll bet my food costs go up!" That's the least of it.

When farmers don't make crops they must reduce spending. They don't spend nearly the money on equipment, chemicals, vehicles, new housing, clothing, virtually anything that they usually do. They cut back on labor, and those employees have less money to spend too. And the equipment dealers, the chemi-

cal companies, anyone in Agri-Business has less money coming in, so they and their employees have less to spend too.

With less money being pumped into the area economy local businesses suffer. Some will have to raise their prices. Some will find this the "last straw" and go out of business.

Suffering businesses cut back on their operating expenses, and so on and so on. All of this means less sales

taxes, less money flowing in our local economy.


It's easy to say "well, but the price of hay (or milo or soy beans or whatever) is way up". It doesn't come near compensating for the scarcity of it.

Deport's Joe Thompson simplifies new machine instructions

Postmaster Joe Thompson has written the book on money order machines...literally! When the manual issued by the U.S. Postal Service wasn't as clear as beginning users would have liked instead of fretting about it Joe sat down with machine and manual and wrote a clean manual that anyone could use!

To begin at the beginning of this story, Joe Thompson is a long-time native of Deport, and has been Postmaster for the Deport Post Office for a little over four years now.

The Dallas District for the USPS was chosen as a test area for the new E-Mod (Electronic Money Order Dispenser) back in 1997. Only in this district were post offices of Level 13 or under (in other words, smaller offices) given the new computerized machine to test

Joe is a trainer, this means that he travels around training people as Postmasters, machine operators or whatever kind of training they need.

But as time approached for him to go out into the field and train people on the use of the new money order machine he had one problem...his machine hadn't arrived! All the other trainers got theirs promptly, but his was missing. Finally he got part of the machine, but not all of it. When he finally did receive his manuals and his full machine he discovered he had a little problem with the manuals being too technical. So, he booted

up his computer and "out of selfpreservation" sat down and began step by step to write an instruction manual that would be completely simple and would tell the operator exactly every step from the time they take the money orders out of the safe to the time they shut down for the day and put them back into the safe. He even went into trouble shooting and the reports that needed to be run...even what to do with each copy of a report. Many a troubled computer operator would kill for the chance to have a manual so carefully and clearly writ-

He wrote this book, in order to make life easier for him, but of course it soon became the "hottest" thing going as more and more post office employees wanted copies of it.

The "Red Book" is now the unofficial manual of choice for everyone in the Dallas District.

In addition to this there were some printer problems with the new machine, and soon Joe had been put in touch with the CEO of the manufacturing company in California who had built the machine.

Before he knew it Joe found him self on a plane to Washington D.C., where he met with higher ups in the Post Master General's organization.

He and the Financial System Co-Ordinator Janice Harris in Coppell, and Patti Robinson, Manager of Finance of the Dallas District met Rita Crawford in Washington and they set

up a FAT test. Fat Test? Yes, the prototype money order machine was subjected to an all day test of it's abilities. After being satisfied with the machine's performance the goahead was given to install new computer chips into the printers so that

they can operate smoothly The trip to Washington was exhausting and strictly business, on one evening they received a very quick "drive around" tour of some of the major monuments but that was about it. The next day they checked out of the hotel and carried their bags to the post office headquarters so that they could leave for Texas directly from

Reply filed in bond issue suit

A reply to the suit filed in Titus County by Randy Carroll, Roy Marris and Darla Ottinger against James Eddie Brown, President, Board of Trustees, Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District and Gary VanDeaver, Superintendent, Talco-Bogata CISD, has been filed in Titus County District Court. The suit is the result of a \$9 million dollar bond to build a new facility to house elementary through high school students at the Rivercrest location. The vote passed by 10 votes, and has been the

The reply says that: "Contestees deny that this Court has jurisdiction pursuant to Election Code 221.002 as asserted by Contestants. " It continues that "as the election contest seeks to challenge a school bond election, jurisdiction lies under Election Code 233.001. Contestees would further note that the citation served upon . It also says that the citation served upon Brown improperly informed him of the required deadline for filing an answer. It also states that there is a clear statutory requirement to send a copy of the petition to the secretary of state by the same deadline proscribed for the filing of the petition"

Item 3. of the reply says 'Contestees specially except to Paragraph 9, of the Original Petition, wherein Contestants allege that There were numerous others out of county and out of district residents that were allowed to vote.' The allegation is vague in that it fails to properly identify the alleged voter or voters who were improperly allowed to vote. Further, it is vague and ambiguous in that it seems to imply that any voter living outside of county is ineligible. The boundaries of the Talco-Bogata Independent School District encircle residents from portions of three counties, any of which have a right to vote in District elections to the extent that they meet the other applicable legal requirements."

The reply continues to say that the allegation that 'voters who were unregistered were allowed to vote' is 'vague and indefinite and fails to identify voters who were allowed to vote illegally; that "voters who registered too late were allowed to vote" is also vague and indefinite and fails to identify voters who were allowed to vote illegally.

The reply also says that "by contesting the election, Contestants delay or perhaps even defeat the bond issue since a delay results in the District's inability to set a tax rate as required and to qualify for substantial state funding for the project. If this brief window of opportunity is lost, the District's ability to replace these campuses may be lost. Because of the strong feelings for community, the outraged tone, cries of fraud and other exaggerated claims of the Original Petition are understandable. They do not, however, justify the rejection of the popular will expressed in the passage of the bonds.

The reply continues by rejecting the notion that anyone voted illegally with the knowledge and cooperation of the bond proponents.

The reply also states that Mr. Dennis Purviance was allowed to vote by an election judge familiar with Mr. Purviance's situation, that it was proper and that he is a legal resident of the school district.

In item 10 the Contestees "vigorously deny the allegation of 'clear fraud' in dealing with absentee bal-

The reply alleges that the twenty missing ballots are unvoted ballots and that there are actually no missing ballots, but that they were miscounted.

The reply also maintains that Dr. VanDeaver did not speak illegally with an election judge, and that there is nothing illegal in his being on hand when absentee ballots were counted.

The reply says that the two mailed in votes thrown out by the absentee judge because "neither had the required voter signature on the envelope." It also says the two ballots are preserved and that there is no viola-

It includes a general denial of each and every allegation raised in the Original Petition and concludes with a plea that the court " deny Contestants all relief sought".

TNMP receives approval on plan for competition

The Public Utility Commission of plan include: Texas granted approval of Texas-New Mexico Power Company's proposed transition plan. This voluntary plan is the first that will result in competition in Texas. As a result of this approval, all of the company's Texas residential and commercial customers will receive refunds retroactive to January 1, 1998.

TNMP's plan includes residential rate reductions totaling 9% during the five year transition period. A 3% reduction will be effective immediately upon the signing of the final order, which will provide refunds of the company's Texas customers back to January, 1998. Commercial rates will be reduced by one percent over the same period. Customers will receive similar reductions in January 2000 and January 2001.

Other elements of the transition

A five year transition period. In 2002, TNMP will formally request the implementation of the customer choice program and specify how any remaining strandable costs could be recovered.

Earnings capped at an 11.25% return. Excess earnings generally will be shared between customer refunds and stranded cost recovery.

Recovery of strandable costs related to the company's investment in its lignite-fueled power plant.


A reasonable cap on Operations and Maintenance expenses.

Provisions for a pilot program, for which a schedule is being drafted.
