

## Man pleads guilty to murder of wife

Gregory Dale Belcher of Talco Sulphur River. pled guilty to murder charges Tuesday August 25th in Titus county.

Belcher was charged with murdering his 25 year old wife in August

The body of Sandra Lynn Williams Belcher was discovered by a boy riding a four wheeler on August 3rd on County Road NW 39 near

According to Titus County District Attorney Chuck Bailey, Gregory Dale Belcher pled guilty to the murder charge, giving up the right to an appeal and will have to serve at least half of the fifty year sentence given him for the offense.

Belcher will be transported to Huntsville prison to serve his sen-

According to Red River County las for an autopsy in order to make a positive identification. A positive ID was released Wednesday morning and the cause of death is still under investigation. No charges had been filed at press time.

Lloyd Burruss has been held in the Red River County Jail since Wednesday, August 19th on unrelated charges of aggravated sexual assault of a child.

# Talco VFD says they won't respond to county fires

ment has served the City of Talco ment to use in fighting structure fires and the adjacent area of Titus County since the late 1930s, but as of September 1, 1998, any fires outside of the city limits of Talco will be attended to by the Mt. Pleasant Fire Department, according to Fire Chief Randy Carroll and Mayor K.M. (Mike) Sloan.

The decision is a hard decision to make", states Chief Carroll, "because it means that many of our friends, fellow firemen, and even our city secretary live outside the city limits. It will be a hardship for everyone in our fire district, which stretches from the city of Talco, 1 miles west to Franklin County to 13 miles east, 5 miles south and 1 1/2 mile north. Residents of all that area will need to call 911 for the city of Mt. Pleasant to respond, even though it might take them 20 minutes to respond if they are not involved with a fire within their own city at the same time" Carroll continues.

"The simple fact is" says City Manager-Secretary Jone Clemmons, "The city of Talco can't afford to pay for ample fire fighting equipment to fight structure fires in the county, and the commissioner's court says they can't afford to purchase the equipment Talco needs either, so the people in the county are the losers".

For months City of Talco officials and members of the Talco Volunteer Fire Department have petitioned the Titus County Commissioners Court to purchase a new mini-pumper truck in the county, Clemmons says. Last Monday the city, represented by Clemmons and the Talco VFD representatives went before the Commissioners Court again to ask the court for a mini-pumper truck. Pct. 3 Commissioner Billy Thompson made the motion to purchase the truck for \$90,000 and sign a contract for \$24,000 with the Talco VFD to handle the fire calls in the Talco fire district in Titus County. Even though part of Talco's fire district includes Pct. 1 in the south-west corner of Titus County, none of the other commissioners would second the motion, according to Clemmons

The meeting died from lack of a second and Talco was told no once more to their request. Members of the Commissioners Court have repeatedly said that they can't afford the new truck or contract and believe that if a truck is purchased for one fire department the other five fire departments will want one too. Five Star, Winfield, Nortex, Cookville, Tri-Lakes all have volunteer fire departments in Titus County

According to Chief Carroll the Talco Volunteers have responded to 148 calls in the years of 1996 and 1997. Only 18 of those calls were inside the city limits of Talco, leaving 130 calls made in the county.

Chief Carroll says that "the county has not increased the \$8 per man and \$6,000 per year paid to the county fire departments since 1984, but the

to the city of Mt. Pleasant from \$21,000 to \$275,000 per year and has a contract with the city of Mt. Pleas-

In April the city of Talco asked for a contract with the county to provide the north part of the county with fire protection, maintaining that, like the city of Mt. Pleasant, Talco is a city department. That proposal, like the proposal on Monday, died on the floor of Commissioners Court from lack of a second.

"How the Commissioners Court can say they can't afford to purchase the equipment we need to fight structure fires in he county is something I can't understand" Chief Carroll stated.

'We asked for \$90,000 for a truck that would last for years and serve the residents of our fire district with much less response time. They said no to us, but pay Mt. Pleasant \$275,000 per year and are supposed to increase that to \$300,000 per year" he contin-

The Talco fire department can't purchase the equipment needed with the \$6,000 per year the county pays, and the city of Talco can't afford to purchase the needed equipment to be used out in the county.

"To the resident left without fire protection and who might be faced with an increase in insurance premiums, or no insurance at all, we are truly sorry" Chief Carroll said. "We are at a standoff with Commissioners Court" it's up to them to help us help the residents in our fire district"

relocation of our schools. There were many opinions expressed pro and con, and most made valid points. As I recall, relocating our schools to a major highway wasn't addressed.

As most of you have heard, the Texas Department of Transportation is in the process of developing a plan to turn US 271 into a four lane highway. I know from personal experience as an employee of TxDOT, and as a citizen that travels this highway daily, this is a much needed project. Anyone who travels this highway knows it has a lot of traffic, and over the past 5 years there has been a tremendous increase in truck traffic. US 271 is fast becoming a major north/south truck route. It is already one of the most heavily traveled truck routes in north east Texas.

TxDOT is charged with moving people and goods, safely and efficiently. With traffic increasing each year and truck traffic of prime concern, completing US 271 as a four lane highway makes good transportation sense. The main idea is to make this route a safer, easier route for the traveling public. Improvements of this highway will eventually contribute to more traffic. This is one reason there will be public hearings to gain input from the surrounding areas that will be involved. Building by-passes around communities like Bogata and Talco is very likely. Remember the idea is to move traffic; there fore to route traffic through small towns and slow it down or bring it to a stop would not be efficient transportation planning.

It has been my observation that an improvement of this type will be good for our communities. I've never seen an area where improvements weren't seen after a highway improvement had been made. The number one and immediate benefit will be the economic gain the area sees from the construction. We may not see local gains, but anytime we can create jobs in our area we will all benefit. The second and longer term benefit will be the increase in traffic through our area. Increased traffic will bring more revenue in one way or another.

You notice I keep referring to an increase in traffic. Think about what we've done. We are proposing to take

hearts of our communities and relocate them to a major highway that will be developed into a four lane facility. In Bogata we were concerned with the congestion in front of our school think about how it will be once this highway is completed: 70 MPH and four lanes. Years ago some people in Talco made some pretty wise decisions. They built their school off the main travel ways and left them in the neighborhood, this permitted parents to allow their children to walk to and from school and made it easy for children to be dropped off and picked up. Now, if we locate at the Rivercrest campus, everyone has to travel to pick up children and to drop them off. Nobody will be able to walk

our elementary schools from the

to and from school anymore. You think, "Well, TxDOT will work with us." And I'm sure they will. We can probably request some warning lights and we may get them. But I know from experience, the travelling public will slow down only for congestion or if law enforcement is visible. And keep in mind TxDOT is proposing this highway to relieve congestion to move more traffic.

Maybe TxDOT will accommodate our school with turn lanes to help our buses and students on and off the highway? Even if they do, this will create six lanes and now our buses and students will have to cross 4 lanes of high speed traffic instead of

Think about our neighboring schools. Prairiland in Pattonville will likely be safely off the main highway route. Deport Elementary will likely be off the main route if a by-pass is built through there. But we are proposing to move all our schools onto the main highway route. A by-pass is not planned for Rivercrest campus.

I think the existing locations of our schools are looking better and better. We have not gone too far. It would be wise to become involved in these hearings and communicate with our school administration.

As an employee of TxDOT, I am not involved in any way with the planning or development of this project. As a citizen of these communities, the opinions I have expressed are my own and in no way related to TxDOT.

#### Grandparents have rights provided by law Acetaminophen may help protect against parent dies and the remaining parent tation rights if you do not take action

no rights under the law when it came to seeing their grandchildren after a divorce or the death of one parent. The law spoke of the rights and obligations of parents, children and other interested parties. Grandparents, however, were not even considered. That has changed. State family laws now make specific reference to grandparents' rights of access to their grandchildren.

The Office of the Attorney General is prohibited by law from offering legal advice to private individuals. However, it can offer some basic information on grandparent visitation rights, including where to go for

Grandparents can play a vital and important role in the lives of their grandchildren. Spending time with grandparents may be especially important to a child who has lost a parent. Grandparents can provide love and a sense of family. Additionally, they can provide much needed support to a single parent trying to raise children on his or her own.

Sometimes when parents divorce or separate, the parent granted custody does not want the child to see the relatives of the non-custodial parent.

CORRECTION:

cuts off ties with the family of the deceased spouse. Grandparents can be caught in the middle and denied access to their grandchildren.

State law now provides a vehicle by which grandparents can establish their right to visit their grandchil-

Who determines the right to see grandchildren? If the custodial or surviving parent does not want such visits to occur, only the courts are allowed to decide that issue. The law says that the courts can determine when grandchildren can be visited and if access to grandparents is in the best interest of the child.

The right to visit a grandchild is not automatic. If you are a grandparent and are denied access, you must sue the custodial parent in order to establish your visitation rights. The family law court will then determine if it is in the best interest of the child

Do grandparents always have the right to visit grandchildren? Not always. As a grandparent, you may lose your right to visit your grandchild if the child has been put up for adoption. New research suggests that acetaminophen, a widely used pain reliever, may help protect the blood from changes leading to hardening of the arteries - - a condition that contributes to hundreds of thousands of deaths per year from stroke, heart attack and other forms of cardiovascular disease.

Dr. Addison A Taylor, professor Remember, every case is not the of medicine and pharmacology at the Center for Experimental Therapeutics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, presented the findings at today's session of the Thirteenth IUPHAR Congress of Pharmacol-

ogy in Munich. Taylor reported findings in 12 healthy human volunteers, suggesting an association between the use of acetaminophen at recommended doses and a significant inhibition of the oxidation of certain low-density lipoproteins which carry the form of cholesterol commonly described as "bad cholesterol."

"The oxidation of cholesterol-containing, low density lipoproteins is one of the main processes involved in the formation of arterial plaque, which accumulates in the walls of blood vessels and contributes to hardening of the arteries, or atherosclerotic disease," explained Taylor.

> Antioxidants are substances that counteract the damaging effects of oxygen in tissues. Vitamin E, which is among the more commonly known antioxidant agents, is believed to provide protection against certain forms of cancer, cardiovascular disease and other conditions..

The study conducted by Baylor and his associates was a randomized, blinded, placebo-controlled trial involving the administration of eight doses of acetaminophen (1,000 mg doses every six hours). Plasma samples from patients who received acetaminophen were then compared with those from patients who received

Taylor noted that the results of this study support those reported by other investigators.

"Although our research was the first to examine the effects of acetaminophen on low density lipoproteins in humans, other investigators have reported similar findings in laboratory settings," said Taylor. "The next step will be to confirm these findings in larger studies, both in animals and in humans."

Atherosclerosis is a major contributor to coronary heart disease and stroke. Coronary heart disease is the country's number one killer of both men and women, while stroke claims an estimated 150,000 U.S. lives each
