Then I got out the antibiotic ointment and rubbed it into a burn on his arm which he had gotten from welding.


He put drops in my eyes for the itching.

Bogata police grant application goes to Washington

closer to a grant of \$412,500 for 24hour law enforcement when the Ark-Tex Council of Governments gave unanimous approval to the application August 27 at a meeting in Mt. Pleasant. The grant application has been sent on to the Department of Justice in Washington D.C. where it will be approved or not.

The grant would come from the Community Oriented Police universal hiring program and is strictly a grant, no matching funds or repayment would be necessary.

The grant was for 5 full-time and one part time police officer. This would provide the city of Bogata with twenty-four hour, seven day a week police patrol.

Mayor Mike Garretson said "five officers seems like a lot at first, but this is the number it takes working 3 eight hour shifts per weekday and allowing people two days a week off and providing 24 hour coverage and protection on weekends. These officers will NOT be in addition to the officers we have currently. The total will be five full time and one part time.

The grant would pay for this police protection for three years. When asked what would happen in three years the Mayor said "there are lots of different possibilities. There is the possibility of an extension on the grant, the pos-

The city of Bogata came a step sibility of new grants, the possibility have approximately \$60,000 budthat the citizens of Bogata would see the effect the police department had and would be willing to pay for it from then on, or even the possibility of ceasing the 24-hour department at that time'

Garretson cited that Mt. Vernon and Honey Grove had both received similar grants in the past, and that at Honey Grove the citizens were pleased enough to vote to keep the department after the grant ended. Mt. Vernon's grant expired this year, and they, too, have retained all officers hired under the grant.

"It is going to be up to the citizens of this town to decide what will happen in three years" Garretson said "inthe meantime the money is there to apply for to help cities like ours".

There are opponents of the grant application. They state that "there are no free lunches" and worry about what will happen in three years when the grant expires. They also have concerns and fears about speed traps or unnecessary tickets being handed out. They do not feel that a town the size of Bogata needs full-time police protection.

When the final approval on the law enforcement grant will come is not known at this time.

Mayor Garretson also stressed that "whether we get this grant or not we will have a police department. We


geted for police protection right now. Also, if we get the grant it will pay for our police department. If we don't, the citizens will pay for the police department. If the grant comes through, that's \$180,000 over a three year period that we could use for other services or that money could go toward the police department after all grant monies are exhausted.

Serving Local Businesses and Local People

"The citizens of Bogata elected a new mayor and 3 new council members the last election. We told the citizens of Bogata if we were elected our goals and promises were to clean up the town of overgrown lots, buildings, cars and take control of the stray animals and have a police department with enough men and equipment for 24 hour protection, to the best of our ability with limited funds. These funds are now possible to obtain from the government. "Garretson said

"We are working very hard to accomplish this. Please don't be misled by the few who oppose our city having a police department" he continued.

Garretson says that "Since we have had existing law enforcement we have not had the juvenile problems in our parks, cemeteries, nor graffiti problems that we had before. We are truly making efforts to do more and this grant will enable us to accomplish our goals"

Phillips, Assistant Director for Grants Administration in Washington, D.C. They bear the signatures of Bogata citizens. I also have over 200 more to mail"

The letter reads: Dear Mr. Phillips:

Bogata's crime rate is below the average in this area of Texas. It is our opinion that sooner or later this will be a burden that our community cannot bear after the grant money is gone. We believe more harm than benefit will come to this city if this grant is passed. We have recently elected a young and inexperienced mayor and city council. 


Benefit planned for Burruss children

Contributions to help with pavilion construction at Bethel Cemetery



Census Bureau prepares for Census 2000

Although the Census 2000 is still two years away, government officials are already working to make sure that the nation's population count is complete and accurate.

Census statistics are governments primary source of information. This information collected (population, age, ethnicity, housing, etc.) is extremely important for state and local jurisdictions, which use this data to plan for such things as roads, schools and hospitals.

37 die in Labor Day traffic accidents Preliminary reports (and these

could increase if additional reports are received, and they almost always are) indicate that at least 37 persons died in 32 traffic crashes during the 78 hour reporting period that comprised the Labor Day Holiday. Thirtyfour had been predicted.

Twenty-nine of the thirty-two involved single fatalities, one collision took three lives and three of the deaths involved were in Northeast Texas. One death each occurred in Hunt County, Van Zandt County and Morris County.

There were two auto-pedestrian deaths, one fatality involved a pickup and a train and another involved a pickup and a cow

There were three motorcycle fatalities, none of which were wearing helmets. Fifty-four percent of those killed were not wearing seat belts. This included one twelve year old boy

Finaily, at least four deaths were DWI related . It is predicted that this number will definitely increase as the investigations continue. Statistics are courtesy of the Texas

Department of Public Safety.

Census data also influences decision making for private industry on where to locate.

The U.S. Census Bureau is gearing tax collector or law enforcement ofup now for Census 2000 by updating its maps and address lists in counties and communities throughout the state. Locally the Census is looking for people who can work at least 20 hours a week. The hours are flexible, and some of the work can be done on weekends and during evenings.

Census field workers drive through communities and rural areas, even walking street by street to check the accuracy of Census Bureau maps and addresses. They get reimbursed 31¢ a mile for using their car.

In Red River County the Census pay for 9 field workers at \$7.50 per hour 1 crew leader who will draw \$9.00 per hour.



This year he will also take on half of the principal's duties which includes evaluating teachers and will put him back in a hands-on situation with the student body at Rivercrest High School. Sharing the principal's duties with him will be Kay Kennedy, who is also the counselor at Rivercrest High School. Between the two the year will be a very busy one.

Dr. VanDeaver explained the workings of the school for me to share with the public. When asked, "Where does the school's money come from?" Adding cosmetology and health services and carpentry are a possibility some day. Although we'd like to add plumbing and electrical these are basically out of reach for now". This year Rivercrest and Bogata School received Exemplary on the TAAS test and Talco received Acceptable, missing Recognized by only 1..2%. Rivercrest has held this high rating for 3 years.

Dr. VanDeaver is looking forward to a successful year for the Talco, Bogata and Rivercrest Schools because he feels we have some of the best teachers and students anywhere and he is proud to be associated with our schools.

I would like to thank him for his time and patience with me and to wish him, his staff and students a very good year.
