We shared our love of cats, and our disgust with people who abuse animals.


When she left, she apologized for having stayed so very long. I hope I assured her that I had enjoyed really visit....because I did.




Girl Scout sign up to be held Sept.30



The Bogata Methodist Women met Wednesday, September 9, in the Fellowship Hall.




Margie Myers presented the video program,, "Aim High" by Patsy Clairmont. Patsy's presentation to a




