



A nativity from the 1850s

seasons, the media have been reporting "living nativity scenes" as something new. In reality, Bogata's first example of such a scene appeared almost a century and a half ago, in

We have no details and no pictures, but the evidence is official. The federal census-taker took down the bare facts when he appeared on horseback at the cabin of the William and Mary Humphreys family, the first settlers at the site of the future town of Bogata, in early December of that year. (Their cabin then stood a few feet north of the site of the present- difficult future. day First Baptist Church in northern Bogata)

After listing the Humphreys couple and their children, the record appears at first glance to be just a reminder that human slavery, now only a part of our distant history, was still a grim reality. The "slave schedule" indicates two African slaves as part of the household. A slave who was in those days not even accorded the dignity of a personal name was listed as a black male, thirty years old. Another nameless black male was shown to be "4/ 12ths" of a year old.

The inevitable conclusion is that the older man was father of the fourmonths-old infant and that the mother have starred in the living nativity had died in childbirth, or shortly thereafter, of what was then called "childbed fever". The account is a sad memento of pioneer life in northern Texas. But that is not the whole picture, or the end of the story.

dozens of Bogatans. Of the little orphan slave-child who played the part of the baby Jesus, the rest of his life is lost to history.
