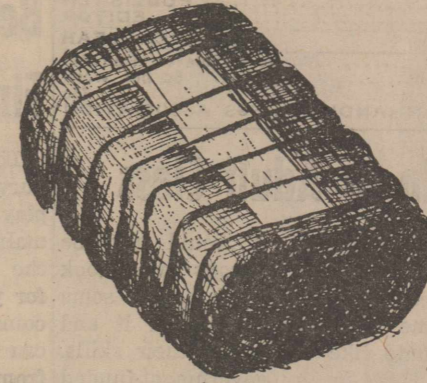

## Coaches Pleased With Performance Of Owls

The coaches were pleased with the performance of both the Owl varsity and junior varsity teams in the scrimmages at Springlake-Earth on Friday night of last week.

The Springlake-Earth Wolverines, whose Head Coach Tom Phelps was selected as "South Plains Coach of the Year" last year for his team's surprising performance in District 3-A, are picked by some to take the District Championship away from Vega and Hart this season. The Top O' Texas Football magazine picks Springlake-Earth in second place behind Memphis in its Top Ten Teams (selected from Districts 1-A, 2-A, 3-A, 4-A, 5-A and 9-A). The Owls have been predicted to finish "way back" in District 2-A, but after seeing the players in their first outing Friday night, some fans are beginning to believe that this may turn out to be the Year of the Owl.

Randy Clay and David Strange alternated at quarterback. The varsity gave up two touchdowns, one of which was called back due to an infraction. The junior varsity boys didn't give up a score, but neither Owl team was able to move the ball.

Springlake-Earth's varsity quarterback did a lot of passing, and did a good job of getting the ball off on target even when the Owls had him on the way down. Randy Clay completed one pass to Danny Perkins for the varsity, and Tommy Perkins intercepted a pass in the junior varsity scrimmage. Tommy Perkins received a sprained ankle, however, and has been out of action this week.

This week's scrimmage with Paducah's Dragons has been scheduled for 7:00 p.m. Saturday night on the home field. The scrimmage is on Saturday night to give the Owl coaches a chance to look over the Kress Kangaroos, with whom the Owls open their season September 5, in their scrimmage Friday night.

Some of the Owls have continued to be on the sick list this week, but it is hoped that by Saturday night they will be at full strength again. There is no admission for the scrimmage, and the Owls will appreciate having a large group of fans on hand to cheer for them.

Monday night of next week (Labor Day) plans have been made to take the entire team to the West Texas Billy Graham Crusade in Lubbock on a chartered bus. Coach Grant Teaff of the Baylor Bears will be a guest speaker that night.

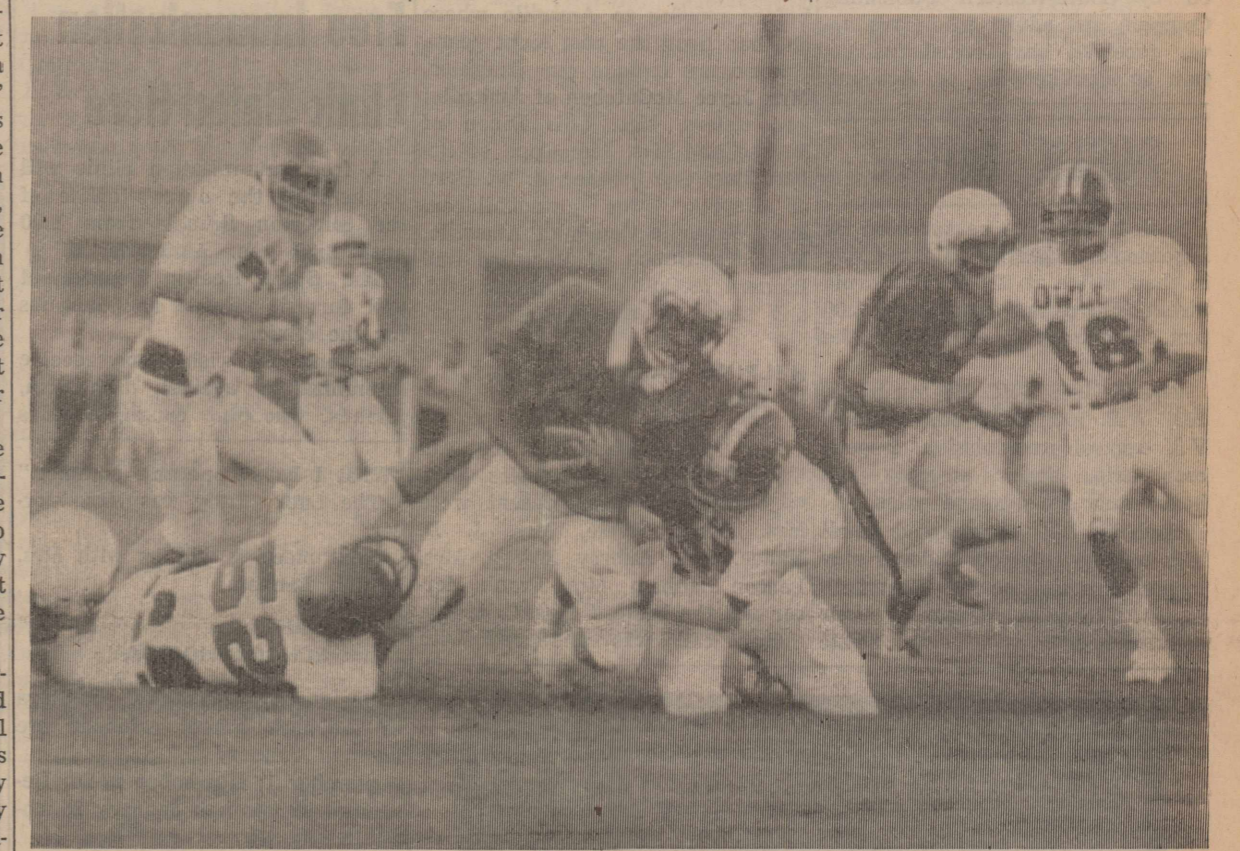

**Some Openings Remain In Adult Class**

An organizational meeting for an adult bookkeeping class for beginners was held in the school business department Monday. There are still some openings in the class, but you must contact Mrs. O. C. Rampley this week if you wish to enroll. The class will start September 8.

The class will be under the supervision of Mrs. Rampley, through the Amarillo College School of Continuing Education Department.

The course will consist of 45 hours of class instruction by Mrs. Rampley and those who successfully complete it will be awarded a certificate from Amarillo College showing that they have earned 4.5 units of credit from their Vocational School.

The cost is minimal—\$15 to cover the cost of building use, textbook, workbook and supplies.

The class will meet each Monday evening from 4 until 7 p.m. for 15 weeks. It is most important that all who enroll attend class regularly. However, in the case of emergency, absences may be compensated for by the student doing the assignment on his own time before the next class meeting.

The course is especially designed by South-Western Publishing Company for adults who have never received any formal instruction in Bookkeeping or Account-

ing. However, it would also be beneficial to persons who took Bookkeeping in high school some time ago and never used it and would like to refresh their skills. This is a government-funded program and at least twelve adults must register before the class will be financed.

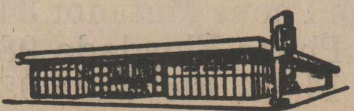

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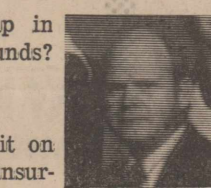
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
