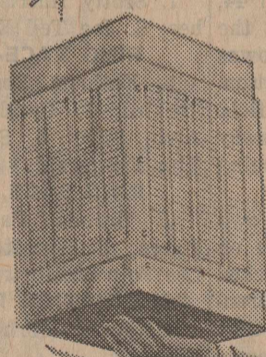

Junior High Takes 14-12 District Win

The Junior High Owls took a big 14-12 win over the McLean Tiger Cubs here last Thursday afternoon, following a 14-12 win by the Red Team over the White Team in the fifth-sixth grade action. The Junior Varsity Owls, who were idle last week, and the Junior High Owls will travel to Claude to meet the Mustang teams beginning at 5:30 p.m. today.

The Junior Varsity teams are scheduled to play in the first game today so the boys can return to Silverton for the Spirit Bonfire.

The Owls began their game Thursday afternoon by driving to about the McLean 10 before giving the ball up on downs. McLean was held and punted to their own 44. In the second quarter of play Kelly Comer saved a McLean TD at the Silverton 35 by overtaking and hauling down the Cub ball carrier.

The Owls threw the McLean

passer for a big loss back to the Owl 41. After getting the ball back, the Owls were forced to punt and John Segura recovered a fumble at the McLean 13. Silverton fumbled and McLean recovered on their own 7.

The teams traded off punts and fumbles, and with 57 remaining in the first half, McLean carried a 30-yard touchdown. The Cubs failed on their PAT, and led 6-0. The Cubs kicked to the Owls, taken at the Owl 46, and on first down on a quarterback keeper with 39 seconds showing on the clock, Jeff McCord ran all the way for an Owl score. Segura ran for the PAT, and the Owls held an 8-6 lead.

In the third quarter, McLean ran three and punted to their own 37. Owl Greg Hill carried to the McLean 11, and McCord passed to Zane Reagan for a touchdown in the corner of the end zone. Segura failed on the PAT run, and the

Owls held a 14-6 edge.

The Owls held for four downs and the ball went over at the McLean 47, but with the dawning of the fourth period, Silverton was forced to punt it away. After a clipping penalty against the Owls, McLean started at the Owl 35, and scored shortly, raising the score to 14 for the Owls, 12 for the Cubs. The PAT failed. Segura took the ensuing kickoff back to their own 46.

The game ended with the Owls having made a first down on a run by Jeff McCord.

Grant Awarded To Fund Merrell-Taylor Archaeological Project

The Texas Historical Foundation has awarded a \$5,500 grant to Wayland Baptist College for funding of the Merrell-Taylor archaeological project of the Llano-Estacado Museum, announced Curator of Archaeology Eddie Guffee.

"Funds will be used to analyze artifacts discovered at the dig," explained Guffee, "and for the writing and publishing of a detailed report."

Many of the artifacts discovered at the Merrell-Taylor dig will be on display when the museum opens to the public for the first time next July. Tentative plans call for an open house and reception on July 4.

Located 13 miles southwest of Quitaque, the artifacts may help determine whether Comancheros once lived at the site. Many specimens are now bagged and ready for analyzing.

Guffee pointed out that the archaeology crew would like to find concrete evidence of a Comanchero

culture since no known Comanchero site has ever been discovered. Comancheros were usually a mixture of New Mexican and Indian blood and moved about frequently in the Southwest. They existed primarily on the profit made from trading with the Plains Indians and rarely settled in one spot.

Several discoveries already indicate that some of the inhabitants of the Merrell-Taylor site a 100 years ago were of Spanish origin. The recent discovery of a Spanish lance blade has been the most convincing evidence to date.

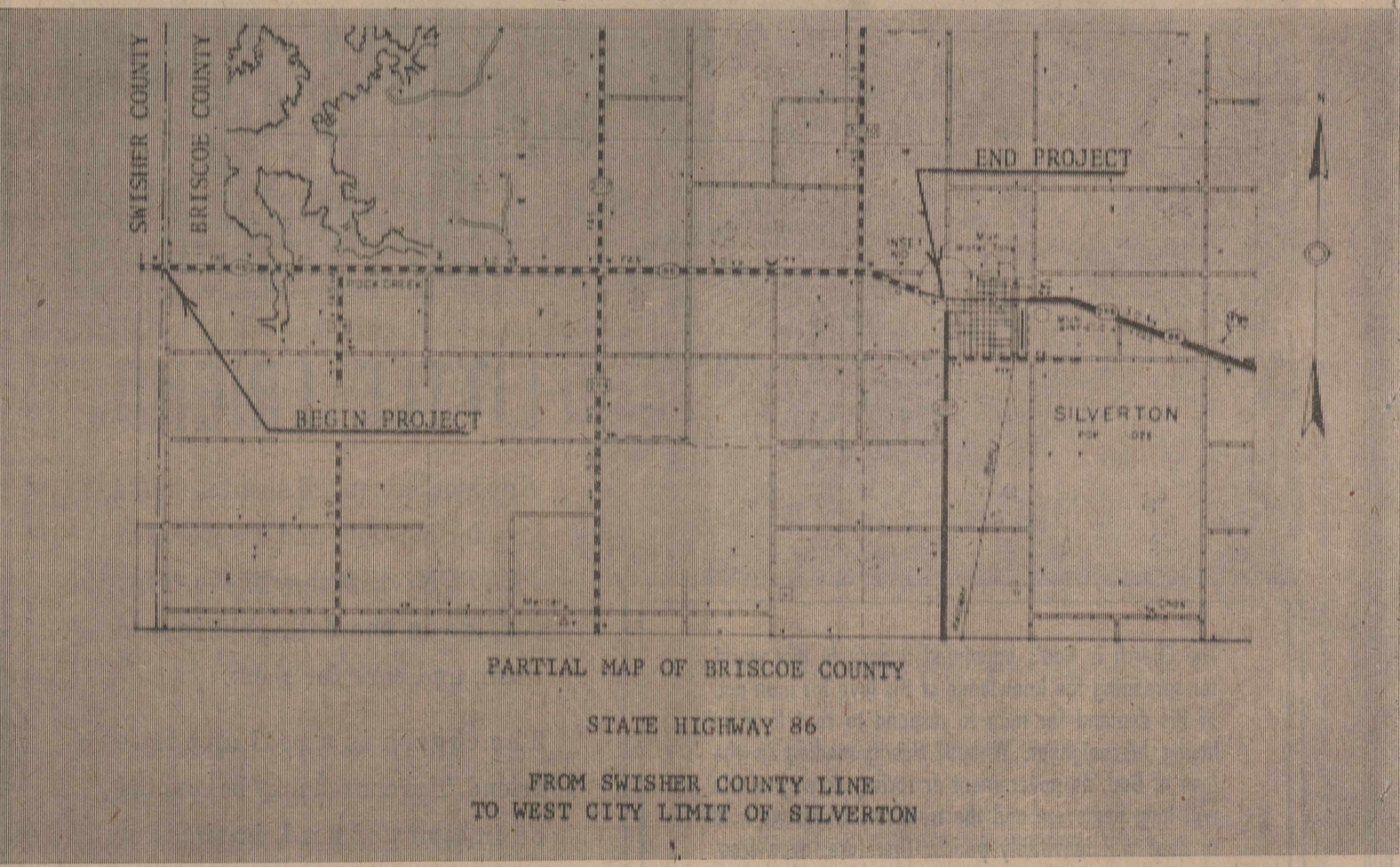

NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING CORRIDOR (LOCATION) AND DESIGN (COMBINED HEARING) The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning the improvement of a 9.1-mile section of State Highway 86, extending from the Swisher County Line to the West City Limit of Silverton, in Briscoe County. The proposed project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing the existing 22-foot pavement to provide two 12-foot travel lanes, with 10-foot paved shoulders. The proposed improvements will follow the same alignment as the existing highway, except that the centerline of the pavement will be moved 12 feet north. A minimum of 100 feet of right of way will be required from the West City Limit of Silverton, West 1.174 feet; and a minimum of 137 feet will be required for the remainder of the project. The additional right of way will not involve any displacements, or relocations. Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, the Social, Economic and Environmental Assessment, and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the office of Everett H. Monroe, Engineering Technician at Clarendon, Texas. Also, drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file with the County Judge of Briscoe County. Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displaced and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction, can be obtained at the District Office of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, P. O. Box 909, Childress, Texas 79201. Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic, and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to Mr. Monroe's office in Clarendon, or to the office of Mr. Lewis H. White, District Engineer of Childress, Texas, on or before November 10, 1975. In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing. 41-2tc
