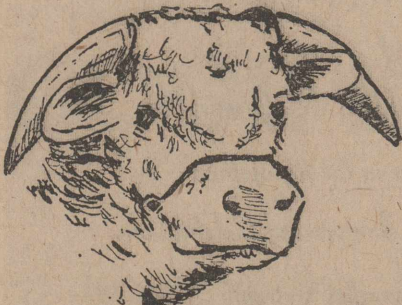

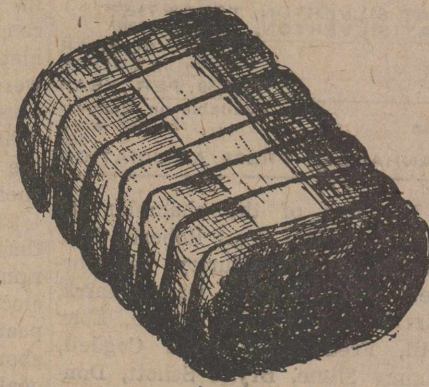

## Owls Travel To Wheeler For Last Game Of The Season

The Owls travel to Wheeler for their last game of the season and their last meeting with the Mustangs for awhile, since both teams are dropping out of District 2-A next year, and Wheeler will be in District 1-B and Silverton will be in the North Zone of District 2-B. The Owls played much harder at Shamrock last week than the score would indicate, and they need and deserve your support at Wheeler Friday night. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

The Pep Squad will be presenting their Beau in Pep Rally at 10:30 a.m. Friday and invite the public to attend. Candidates for Pep Squad Beau are Brett Gill, senior; Tommy Lacy, junior; Jackie Vaughn, sophomore; Doug McJimsey, freshman.

The Owls ran three plays and punted to open their game at Shamrock last Friday night after winning the toss of the coin (one of the few times this season the Owls have won even this). The Irish fumbled on first down and Jack Robertson recovered it for the Owls. On Silverton's first down, the Owls fumbled and lost it near midfield. Shamrock scored their first touchdown from 10 yards out, kicked the extra point and held a 7-0 lead until almost halftime when they added a second score and no conversion to take a 13-0 lead to the dressing room at the half.

The Owls picked up two first downs in the first period on passes from Brent Brannon to Jackie Vaughn, and got another first down in the second stanza on a pass interference call on another Brannon to Vaughn aerial. Brent Bean and Tommy Lacy picked up another first down in two carries, but the Owl drive stalled and Silverton was forced to give up the ball. Danny Perkins recovered still another Shamrock fumble in the second period, and after punting to the Irish the Owls killed a Brett Gill punt on the Shamrock-1.

In the third quarter, Gill kicked to near the Irish goal line and recovered a Shamrock fumble on second down at about the 17. Bean carried for a first down, but on Silverton's next series of plays, Shamrock intercepted an Owl pass and ran it out to the 38. A Silverton fumble was later recovered by Shamrock on the 9 and the Irish carried a score on first down. The extra point was kicked and Shamrock held a 20-0 lead.

The Owls made another first down on a Brannon to Bean pass. Shamrock scored again from 40 yards out in the fourth quarter with 4:35 remaining in the game, and added another score on a play on which Jack Robertson had to be removed from the field by ambulance. The final score was 32-0.

Robertson was taken to the hospital for x-rays of his back, which players and fans were glad revealed no break, and he was able to return home that night.

## New Program Of Emergency Loans For Farmers

Farmers who suffer property damage or severe production loss from natural disasters now may be eligible for an expanded program of credit assistance from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), the rural credit service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Mr. George H. James, jr., county supervisor of FmHA for Swisher County said today.

FmHA emergency loans to eligible farmers, ranchers and aquaculture operators are to enable them to return to their normal operations after having sustained losses resulting from natural disasters. Individual borrowers must be unable to obtain credit from other sources to qualify for FmHA assistance.

Each person applying for credit will be given equal consideration without regard to race, creed, color, marital status or national origin.

## Crop and Livestock Reports Needed

During the last half of November and in December, some 75,000 farmers and ranchers will receive either a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Accurate estimates have always been of great importance to producers and are even more important in light of the supply-demand situation facing agriculture today. Data collected in this survey will provide an accurate picture of agriculture for each county and for the state of Texas.

Each farmer receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.

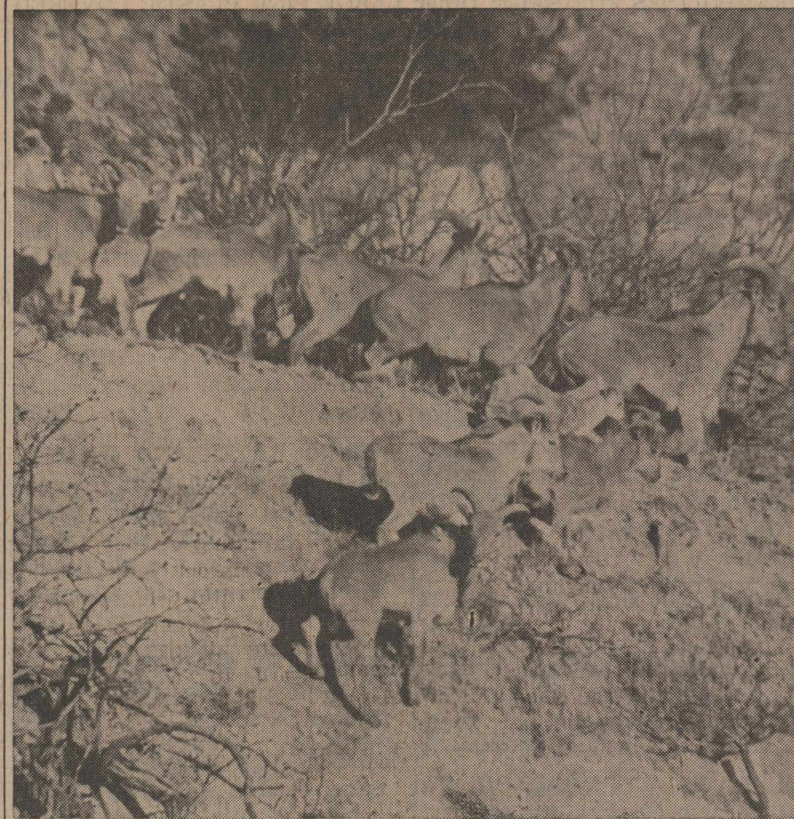

### Aoudad Season Opens Here Saturday

Sportsmen are awaiting the 1975 aoudad sheep season which opens November 15 and continues through November 21 in four Texas Panhandle counties.

Landowners in Briscoe, Floyd, Armstrong and Randall counties were issued 202 aoudad permits by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The duties of a Texas game warden vary from day to day but releasing an aoudad with a trap on his foot was a new experience for wardens Ronnie Ainsworth of Plainview and Julius Stevens of Tulia.

The chase started when a Floyd County rancher spotted a big aoudad ram that had stepped into a No. 4 coyote trap and was dragging the trap wherever he went. The rancher contacted the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and Stevens and Ainsworth were on their way.

The wardens debated about using horses and roping the ram but after driving the big sheep into a canyon where the trap and drag hung on a rock as the ram jumped over a cliff, there was no time.

Using steel bars and a lot of muscle, the two wardens pried the trap loose from the aoudad's front foot and the aoudad fell to safety below with no visible injuries.

Ainsworth said this particular sheep would be especially careful where he put his feet in the future.

These landowners can issue the same permits to sportsmen willing to pursue the elusive aoudad or barbary sheep.

Approximately 35 percent of the hunters are successful in bagging an aoudad as shown by the 1974 P&WD records. A total of 72 sheep were bagged from 203 permits issued last season. Each hunter spent 12.8 hours in the field after his sheep and fired an average of 7.4 shots for each aoudad collected.

Out of the 39 rams and 11 ewes weighed by P&WD personnel, each sheep averaged 140.5 and 81.9 pounds respectively.

Horn measurements taken from 50 animals indicated that the average horn length for rams was 22.7 inches and for ewes 16.2 inches. The largest horn was measured from a ram taken in Randall County that exceeded 32.5 inches.

All the hunters questioned by P&WD officials indicated they had spotted 863 aoudads and compared to the number bagged, this figure illustrates the difficulty hunters had in getting within range of the animals.

Hunters unfamiliar with the aoudad sheep should become acquainted with the habits and characteristics of this imported mountain climber.

The aoudad is rufus or tawny brown with dark brown areas about the head and forequarters. The inside of the legs, the chin, a line on the under parts and the inside of the legs are whitish in color. There is no recognizable color variation between the sexes or between seasons.

The mane on older males may nearly touch the ground even when the head is held upright. A distinctive characteristic is the long, tufted tail which normally reaches the vicinity of the rocks.

Horn characteristics on both sexes include horn tips that remain sharp throughout life and sweep outward, backward, and then inward reaching a tip-to-tip spread of over 30 inches on some animals. A full curl is never reached by the aoudad as on native North American bighorn sheep.

The aoudad is gregarious and generally associates in small fam-

ily groups consisting of an adult male and female with their young offspring of various ages. They escape detection by remaining motionless rather than leaving whenever danger threatens.

The aoudad is highly resistant to internal parasites which have helped the P&WD transplant these animals to various parts of Texas. Aoudads are adept at climbing and jumping. They have been observed readily jumping a four foot livestock fence and if pressed can jump a seven foot fence, although it will normally contain them. This jumping ability is readily used in the caprock country of the Panhandle.

Hunters looking for a trophy aoudad ram will find the four to seven year old male carrying the longest, thickest horns. The experienced hunter would suggest that you spend 95 percent of your hunting time looking and only five
