Adult Accounting Course To Begin In January Here

Both the senior and junior divisions will offer a first, second and third place ribbon in each of the four entry classes.

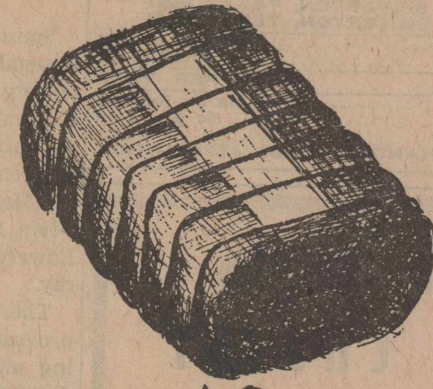
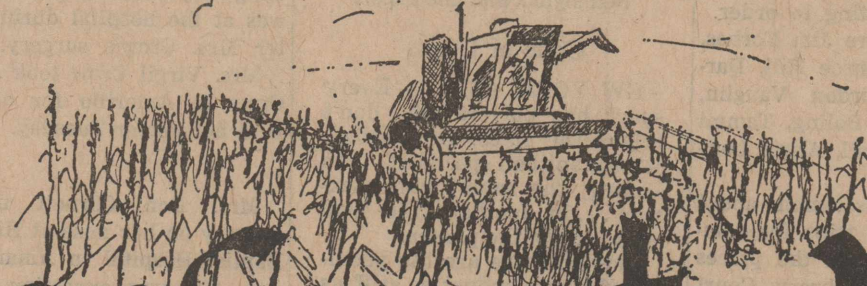

Survey To Determine If Rental Housing Project Needed Here

Members of the Housing Committee of the Briscoe County Industrial Committee met recently to determine if a rental housing project would be feasible for Silverton. At the meeting, George James, Farmers Home Administration Director, and Gene Barbour, Consulting Engineer, on retainer for the City of Silverton, encouraged local members to begin necessary preparation for a Farmers Home Administration Rural Rental Housing Loan (Section 513).

James explained that the purpose of the Rural Rental Housing loan program is to provide good rental housing at a cost the elderly and other people with low and moderate incomes can afford. In order for a loan to be approved, proof must be given that:

1. There is a need for rental housing;
2. The housing planned fits the needs of prospective occupants from the standpoint of design, location, cost;
3. Good management can be provided.

Code of Ethics

NEW YORK (ED) — Every sport has players who don't follow the rules. In baseball, it's the spitball specialist... in boxing, the rabbit punch expert... in football, the man who roughs the passer.

But nowhere are the penalties for misconduct as stiff as those facing the errant hunter: He loses his license, pays a fine or spends time in jail. Fortunately, the "rotten apples" in the hunting barrel are few. Today's sportsman lives by more than the written law, he also observes an ethical code or code of honor that he places on himself.

The wildlife experts at Remington Arms support the sportsman who follows the code of ethics:

- Know the limits of your gun and your shooting ability... and always try for a clean kill.
- Treat your quarry with compassion. Don't leave wounded game behind.

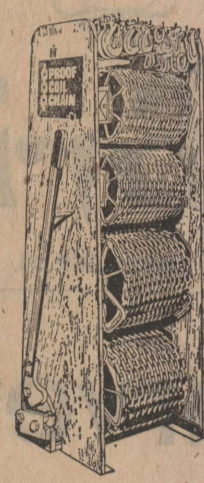

BI-MONTHLY TESTS BEING MADE ON LAKE MACKENZIE WATER

How will Lake Mackenzie's water taste once the lake has filled enough for municipal use?

"We're not sure yet, but we don't think it will be as bad as Lake Meredith water," says West Texas State University Biology Professor William A. Cooper.

Cooper closed down his ten-year water quality study of Lake Meredith to begin his work on the slowly-filling Lake Mackenzie, which will eventually supply the water needs of Silverton, Floydada, Tullia and Lockney.

Cooper and his WTSU graduate assistant, Britt Canada of Sunray, are making bi-monthly checks on the lake's dissolved mineral content and oxygen level.

"We are trying to establish trends in water quality of man-made lakes," says Canada. Any correlations they can establish could be used by water treatment plants to produce the best-tasting water possible for their cities and by the scientific community as well in a field which has been little studied.

If Lake Meredith is any example, Lake Mackenzie's dissolved mineral content will slowly rise with the lake level. Currently, about 30 feet deep, Mackenzie is far from its 150 foot capacity.

High levels of sulfates and sodium account for the strong taste in water. Mackenzie's total dissolved mineral content is 450 milligrams per liter of water at present, while Lake Meredith's is 1200 parts per liter and stabilized.

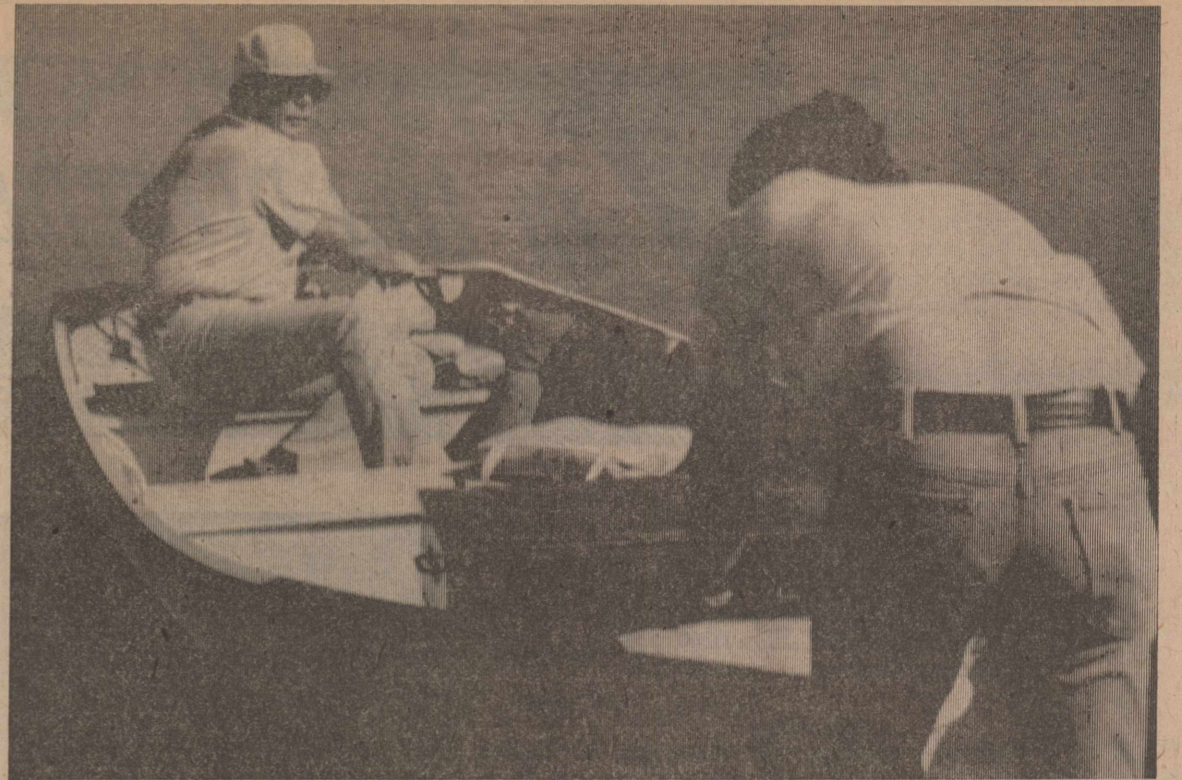
The minerals enter the reservoir through the inflowing streams and the leaching of the lake bed. Cooper and Canada have been taking water samples from the streams

since 1974, when the lake began filling, and have added another sampling station at the dam.

Canada has already noted a high fluoride content in the streams that are feeding the lake, which is one of 15 minerals he tests for in the lab.

Canada will compile his data into a master's thesis in the spring. The son of Rev. Roy Canada of Sunray, he will graduate from West Texas State in biology with an emphasis in ecology and limnology.

NOTICE OF HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvement of a 9.1-mile section of State Highway 86, extending from the Swisher County Line to the West City Limit of Silverton, in Briscoe County.

This project will be developed in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration, therefore FHWA's approval has been requested.

The proposed project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing the existing 22-foot pavement to provide two 12-foot travel lanes, with 10-foot paved shoulders.

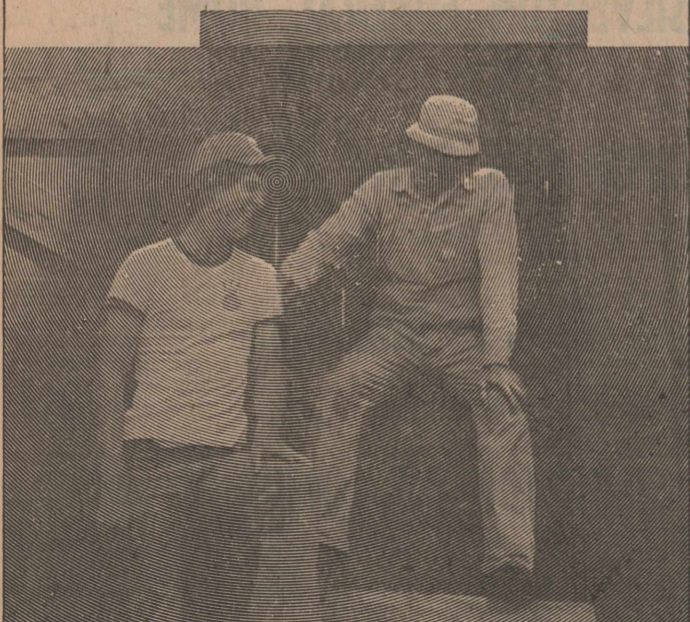
Proposed improvements will follow the same alignment as the existing highway, except that the centerline of the pavement will be moved 12 feet north. A minimum of 100 feet of right of way will be required from the West City Limit of Silverton, West 1,174 feet; and a minimum of 137 feet will be required for the remainder of the project. The additional right of way will not involve any displacements, or relocations.

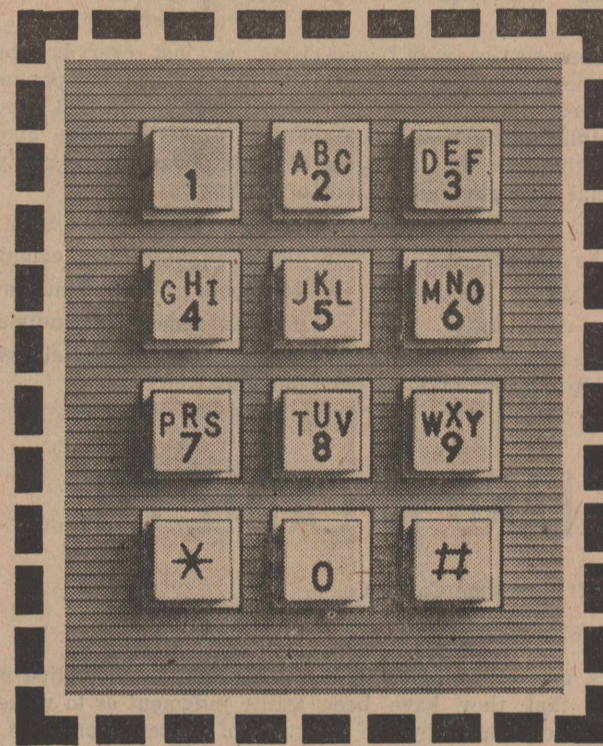

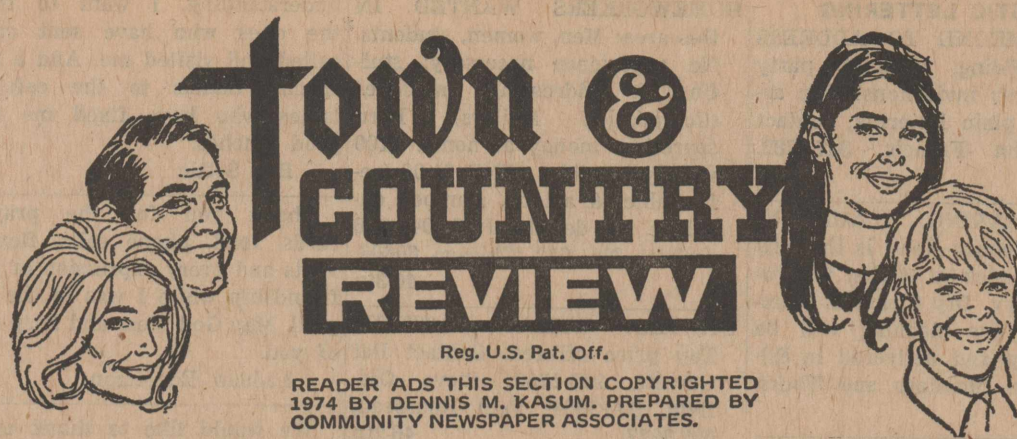
