# Murder and controversy marks 1998

A look back to the front pages and inside of the papers published by Thunder Prairie Publishing reveals a busy year, marked with controversy and sadly punctuated with several murders.

January of the just-past year featured stories of unsolicited phone charges on local phone bills, plus active "slamming", (being changed from one long-distance service to another without permission).

Bogata imposed a curfew to cut down on acts of vandalism. Volunteer Fire Departments and First Responders were kept busy during the entire year with many fires and medical emergencies and accidents. The drought kept them busier than usual with the huge

number of grass fires. In March the Regional Controlled Substance Apprehension Program working with the DEA and Drug Interdiction Task Force, made a large drug bust near Deport, resulting in the confiscation of 168 pounds of marijuana, about \$65,000 in cash and three vehicles.

Local elections saw a number of changes from incumbents, with active political races taking place. By June the effects of the drought of 1998 were beginning.

On June 18 the area was horrified and shocked by the murder of Arnetta Davis Rogers and the serious wounding of her husband, J.D. Rogers in Blossom. A fifteen year-old was arrested for the brutal killing, and was later in 1998 sentenced to life imprisonment with the possibility of parole in 40 years for the

By July 2 a burn ban had been imposed on every county in the area. Hay shortages were apparent and crop failures were apparent.

By July 9 water conservation measures such as no watering of lawns, flowers and shrubs was in effect. By August and September emergency hay "hot lines" were in operation in Texas, and cattle prices had dropped because people were forced to sell their animals due to lack of pasture.

Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission had an area-wide crackdown on minors in possession of

On August Lucy Burruss, of Bogata and a well-known waitress at the Lonesome Dove Cafe was reported missing. By August 27 her body had been found in a wooded area north east of Johnson. That same week the body of Donald Ray Sanford was found in a creek near Blossom A 20 year old and an 18 year old were arrested. Mr. Sanford, age 38, had been beaten, and/or run over and then drowned.

A number of lives were lost in car accidents during the year. In December St. Joseph's Hospital announced the closing of their clinic in Deport. A citizen's group

formed and began working on keeping the clinic open. Detroit football team had an excellent year, heading into the playoffs.

Prairiland volleyball girls also headed into the playoffs.

Bogata boys basketball and football teams went into to playoff action also.

A possible vapor cloud from natural gas leakage near Talco resulted in a large area being evacuated. There were no injuries in the incident.

In March the Talco-Bogata school board announced a possibility of a one campus school system, sparking a huge controversy and calling a bond election for June 6th of that year. Large numbers of

letters to the editor, ads and articles resulted. The election resulted in the bond issue passing by 10 votes. It was then contested and the matter is still not completely settled. Dr. Nada of the St. Joseph's family clinic in Bogata resigned to move to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Dr.

Controversy over various ordinances passed in Bogata erupted and letters to the editor flew.

Forest Fires in the Maple Springs area near Talco had to be fought with helicopters as well as

conventional methods, due to extreme fire conditions. Detroit VFD acquired a truck from the Texas Forestry service in February. Detroit student Brett Shelby, Mayor Mike Farmer and Detroit School Counselor met with Former president George Bush in Houston as Detroit took part in the America's Promise program.

Do not presss 90# for anyone. They can make long distances calls from anywhere that wil be charged to your phone bill.



Wildlife Department Alligator Program out of Port Arthur, alligator meat is very versatile and can be readily adapted to your favorite recipes for most other red meats and fish. The tail and jaw are generally considered the choice cuts of the meat. With a little extra preparation, the body and leg meat can be just as

Regardless of the meat you are using, all fat (including the yellowish fat between the layers) and sinew should be removed before preparing or freezing. Body and leg meat cuts work well for burgers, casseroles, ground meat, soup and stews. The jaw and tail meat work well for baked, cutlet recipes and fried foods. Alligator can prove to be a tasteful change for any of your favorite meat

The idea of protecting and harvesting the same species may seem a little contradictory. The American Alligator is a classic example of successfully protecting a species by managing it as a renewable natural resource. The "economic incentive" to manage a wildlife species like the alligator provides a stong argument for maintaining the natural wetlands it and other species need in order to



December makes 2 years that I have been in office. As I reflect back on the things we have done, I am proud of the things we have accomplished. The road crew has done a great job and they take pride in their work. We have hauled rock on a number of our roads and have done so efficiently. However, as with everything, there is always room for improvement, and we are always willing and working on new ways to improve. I realize that I haven't been able to work on roads as soon as everyone wants them, but I always try to get to them as soon as possible. I also know that I haven't repaired the roads the way you wanted them done, but I have done them the way that I feel is the most economical and most efficient. I can see some progress being made, but there is still a lot of work to be done. We will continue to do the best job that we can for you.


