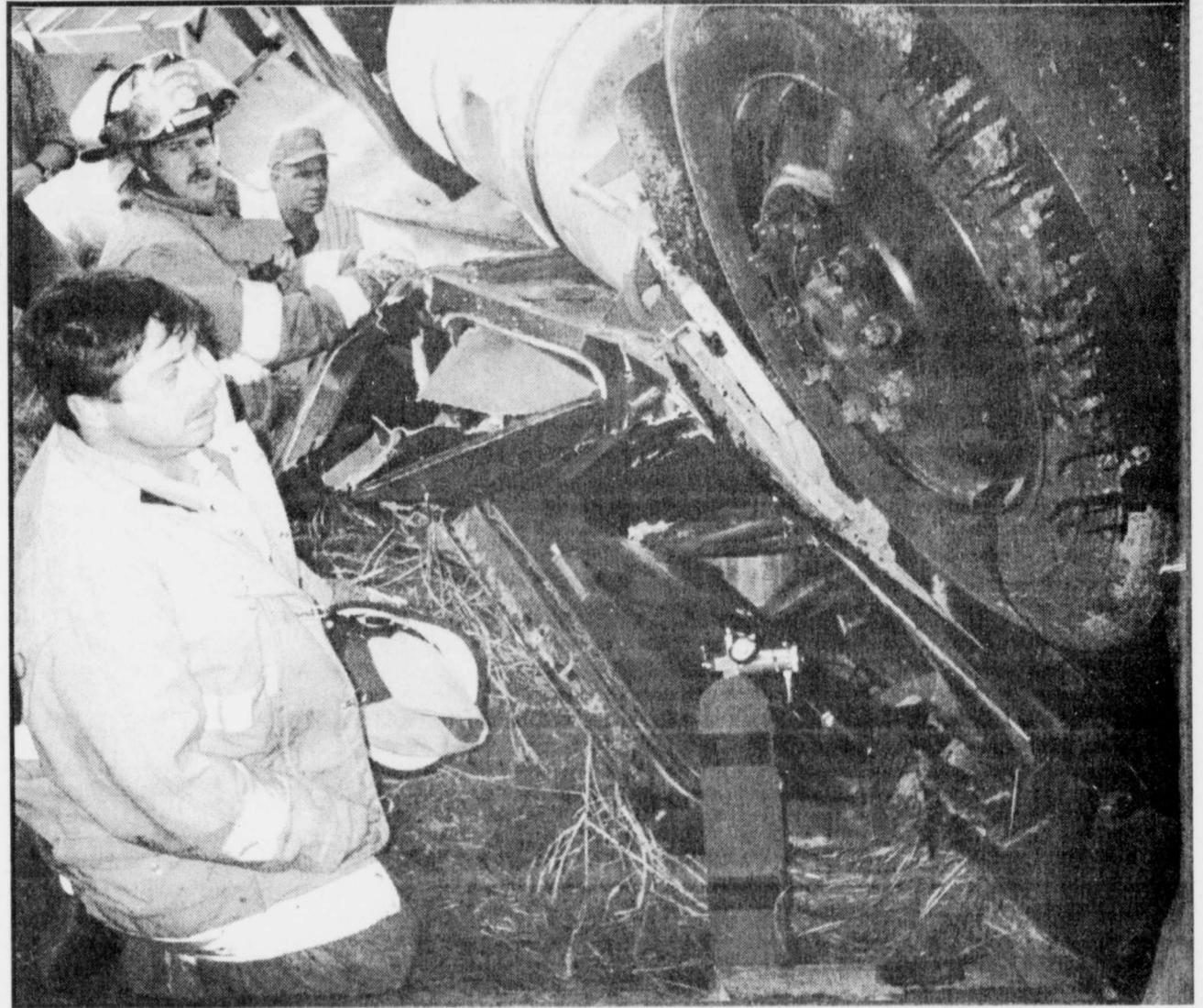
The meeting will be at Rivercrest High School.

Driver opts for ditch over school bus

It was truly a miracle on U.S. Highway 271 south and County Road 14300 last Friday afternoon.

According to a report filed by DPS Officer David Reynolds, a call of an overturned tanker truck came in at approximately 3:25 p.m. The mishap occurred when a 1985 Mack tractor/trailer truck driven by Mark Keys of Deport left the roadway on Hwy. 271 south to avoid colliding with a school

bus that was stopped for unloading students.

The tanker truck was owned by Deport Farm Supply and was hauling 4,200 gallons of liquid nitrogen fertilizer.

After leaving the roadway, the truck and tank overturned, coming to rest in the ditch.

The driver was pinned in the wreckage for approximately 90 min-

utes before rescuers from Pattonville, Deport, Reno Volunteer Fire Departments and Rescue One of the Paris Fire Department, were able to free him.

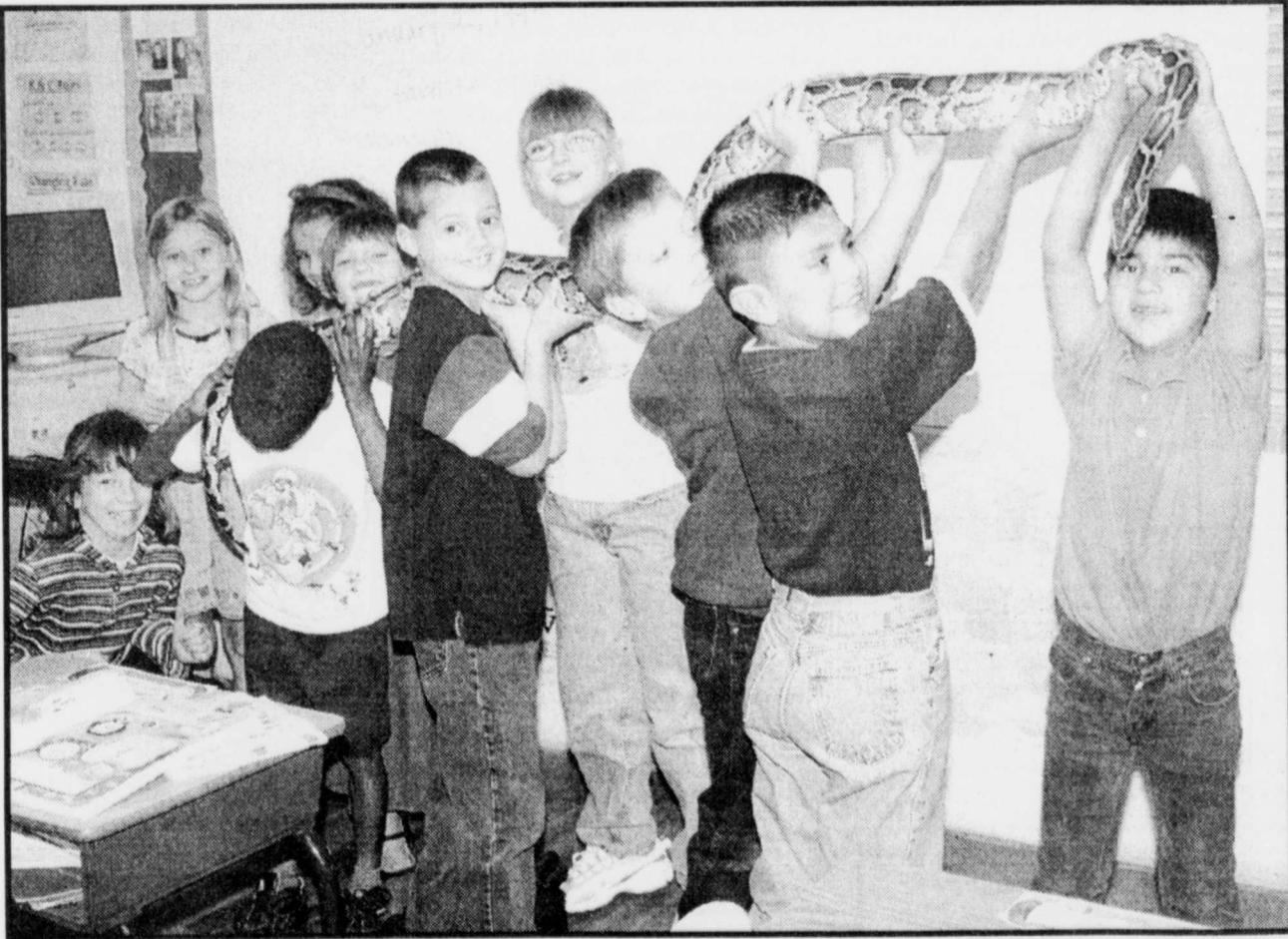
Workers using the "Jaws of Life" dismantled the cab of Keys' truck in an effort to rescue him.

Keys was transported by ambulance to a Paris hospital and was later released with only minor injuries.

New Highway - Old Memories

I have been reading in the paper about the new 4-lane highway to extend from Paris to Mt. Pleasant. I believe the next meeting to be held at Rivercrest, by the Texas Department of Transportation, will be on February 18, 1999.

The thought occurred to me that it would be nice if a request could be made that a "pull over" area be made as it goes through Talco to afford a "Historical Marker."

This sign would commemorate the importance and a brief history of this oil field.

I admit to being prejudiced when it comes to discussing the importance of this little town, but I also believe it was one of the Depression era's great events.

Some points that could be made are as follows:

1. The discovery well was "drilled in" on Friday, March 13, 1936 by the Hinton Oil Company. The location was east of Talco on what is now

FM71. It was about 1/4 mile north of the highway from what was later known as the Humble Camp. It was on the Carr lease. An exact mileage from the new highway could be shown on the plaque.

2. It happened during some of the darkest days of the Depression. It therefore, provided jobs that people desperately needed and they came from all across the nation.

3. A population explosion ensued. It would be possible, I'm sure, for the people from the state capitol to provide a population comparison between 1935 and 1938. This would reflect the largest change.

4. The size of the field should be shown, especially the length. It would be interesting to know the number of wells at its peak. Their depth and formation from where the oil is produced. It should also be noted that this fault line has its beginning in Arkansas, goes mostly west to just about six miles of Campbell, TX,

where it turns south. There are other fields along its path, before it goes into the Gulf of Mexico. Some of the other fields are Sulphur Bluff, Kemp-Mabank area and Mexia.

5. The density of the oil should be mentioned and that it has been instrumental in the production of asphalt and other road materials, in addition to the normal extractions from crude oil.

I'm sure there are other things which such a marker should display. As stated earlier, I admit to being prejudiced when it comes to describing these things about Talco. I probably would need at least a full sized billboard.

I challenge you, Talco. Attend this meeting on February 18 and start the process. Always carry this banner with pride and in memory of all those hard-working people who built this "oil patch", which has meant so much to so many for a long, long time.

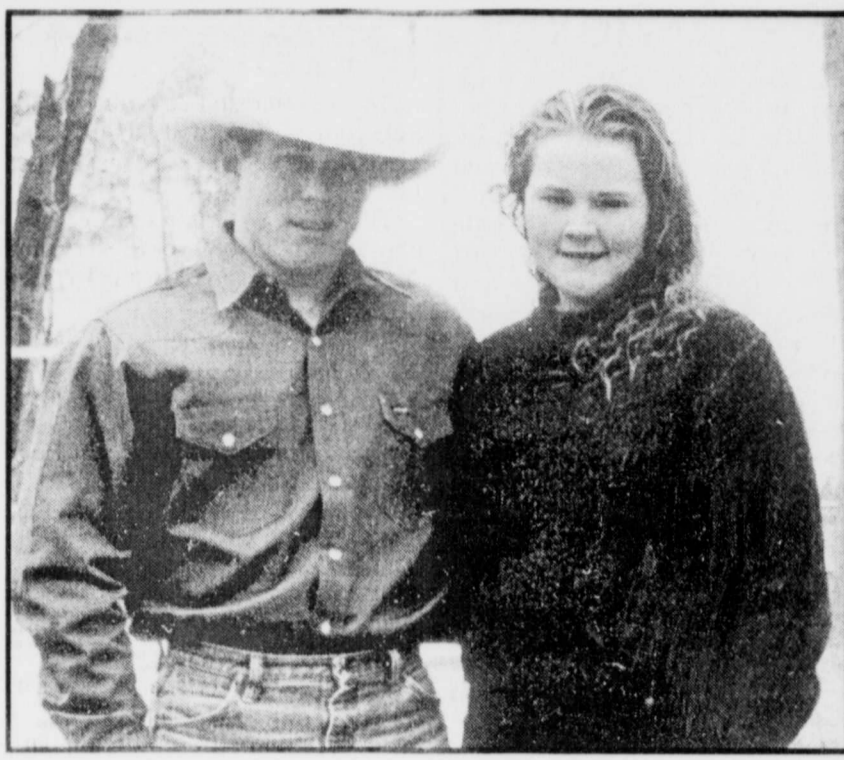

The Rebel faced the undefeated

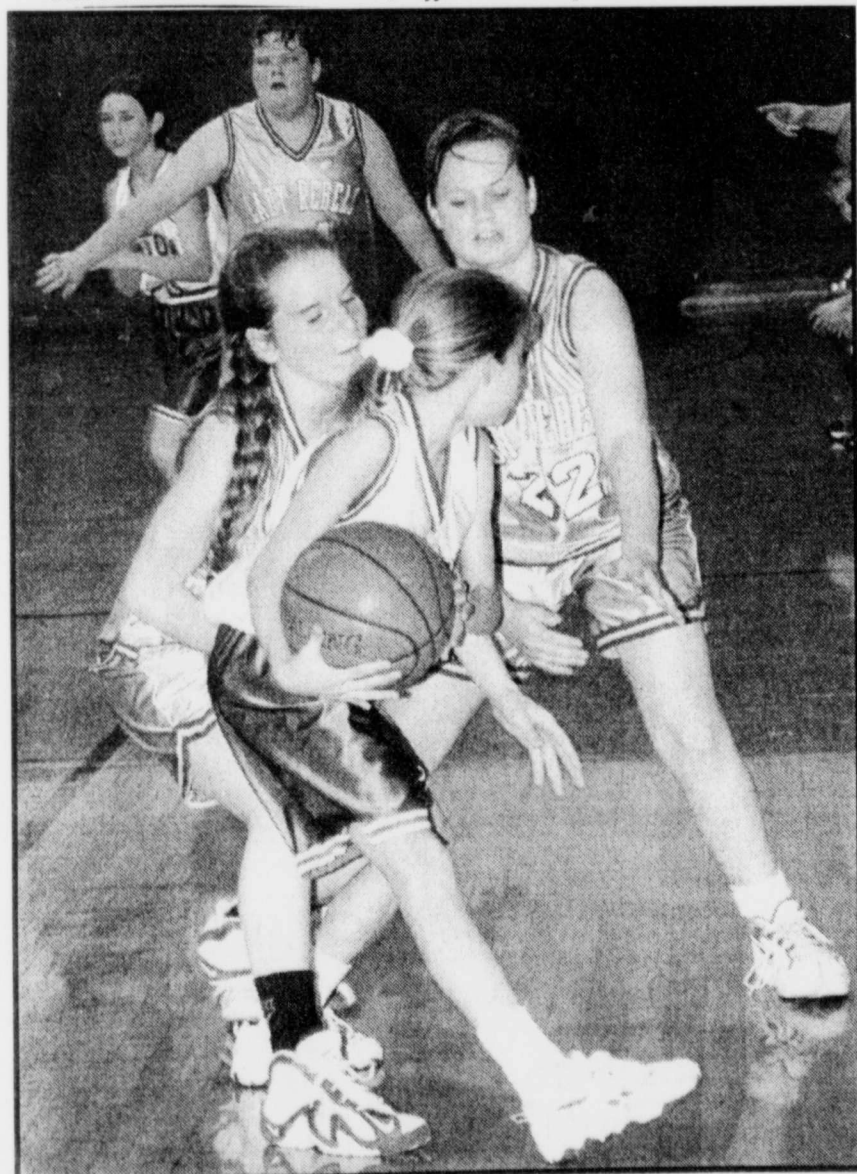
