Sulphur River treatments knock back blackfly outbreak this year

hoped, but were still effective enough to prevent a major blackfly outbreak this year

Using \$22,000 of a bacteriological agent that kills only blackfly larvae, a team comprised of Texas Agricultural Extension SErvice county agents, local gricultural producers and International Paper employees treated the river on Feb. 2 and 8. From recent sampling of the river, Eric Lum, Bowie County extension agent, estimates they achieved 60 to 80 % con-

Though this falls short of the 90 percent control the team hopes for and has achieved in years past, it is still good enough to turn what might have been a major crisis for livestock producers into a mild inconvenience,

Lum said Though treatments of the same stretch of river in December were considered successful, unseasonable rains and untimely temperatures during the alte fall of 1998 and early 1999 created conditions perfect for the ggs to hatch and the larvae to survive. A portion of the eggs black flies deposit were hatching in huge numbers. Larvae counts in January

Sulphur were not as successful as tural Service personnel feared the worst outbreak since the mid 1980s when losses to livestock producers from blackfly infestations were estimated in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

There's little defense from the flies once they emerge and begin hunting for blood hosts.


"Each fly takes only a minuscule serving of blood, but thousands of servings add up, irritating animals and causing them to go off their feed. One strategy is to burn hay. The smoke from the smoldering hay drives off the flies and cattle soon learn to huddles about the burning bales.

"They may have to burn a few bales of hay this year. You may have seen some cattle huddling together here and there, but it'll be nothing like it could have been" Lum said. Heavy rainfall in the Bowie and Cass County area prevented the team from accomplishing more complete control. Since the late 1980s, Robinson has recommended using Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis (Bt) a proven and highly effective and environmentally safe control. The product is expensive, however, and high flow rates on the Sulphur River

Treatments in early February along were off scale and Texas Agricul- mean that much more of the product has to be used. High flow rates also make it dangerous to safely maneuver flat-bottomed boats which are used to dispense the Bt along the river. The boats, laden with a twoman crew, a 100-gallon spray tank a gasoline powered spray pump, several batteries and extra gasoline tanks, weigh 2,400 to 2,600 pounds and handle more like a barge than a boat, Lum said.

Though the Corps of Engineers at Wrigiht-Patman lake were cooperative as always in reducing the flow rate from the lake's associated dam, to about 500 cubic feet per second, he river remained high throughout February. Lum believes the persistently high flow rate was due to the area farmland soils being saturated form heavy rains and water seeping in from the watertable or flowing from feeder streams and sloughs.

The success of the program has prompted those living along other area rivers, such as the Sabine and White Oak, to ask for blackfly control programs of their own. It's impossible to fulfill these requests because the flow rate of those rivers cannot be controlled at all because thy are not dammed as is the Sulphur, Lum said.



FOOT NOTES



POST SURGICAL PAIN MANAGEMENT

If you are having foot or ankle surgery, ask your podiatrist if you are a good candidate for a popliteal sciatic nerve block.
