City Council hears staff reports, results from CPA

The Bogata City Council met July 12 at the Community Center with about 15 visitors in attendance.

Local businessman, Wendell Reeder, spoke against no parking signs near his Armadillo store, arguing that the signs hurt his business and were unnecessary for safety purposes. He also sought police cooperation in dealing with suspected thefts at the store. Police Chief Clegg replied that multiple complaints had been received that trucks parking along Rte. 271 blocked the view of traffic at the intersection with Main Street and stated that he would inform the Council in executive session of the status of his ongoing investigation of the case.

Staff reports were given by Wendell Davis, Wyatt Bush and Charles Clegg.

Lanny Walker of Arnold, Walker, Arnold & Company, Certified Public Accountants, who had been retained to review the lists of bills paid from the general fund and waterworks, reported results to date. In a written report, the company noted "departures from generally accepted accounting principles" and that "management has elected to omit substantially all of the disclosures and the statement of changes in fund balance required by generally accepted accounting principles." Mr. Walker emphasized in his oral presentation that when the City's computer system was again fully operational, it would become possible to "make conclusions about financial position and results of operations" not now practicable on the basis of the company's

Mayor Garretson reported on the present status of efforts to analyze and deal with the gases problem at City Hall and the problem of traces of gasoline. The City awaited advice from the Texas Natural Resources Commission before making decisions.

No final action was taken on city truck bids or possible purchase of a

After discussing possible action on "abandoned or burned houses in the city and notices sent to homeowners," it was decided to clear one site on an experimental basis. Mrs. Nina Stoner reported on the situation at two adjacent sites and proposed to cede one of them to the City for use as a parking lot. John Howison undertook to clean up the site at 201 N. Howison Street, but noted that the house was not his property and that it was neither abandoned, burned nor a health risk.

The Council tabled the cell phone issue and discussion of the HUD report that had been sought by Councilman Jack Crane. Housing Authority administrator Donna Rozell is expected to address the next meeting of the City Council.

Council members will meet on July 19 to interview five candidates for the position of City Secretary.

The Council decided to hire John Davidson as a police officer, initially to be paid from federal grant funds, and tabled action on installing and maintaining stop signs within the

While Council members agreed that a one-half cent sales tax increase was desirable, there were varying points of view as to how it should be spent, whether for strengthening the police or for economic development to provide jobs.

The Council discussed the possibility of employing a city administra-

Mayor Garretson announced that grant money had been received from the State for South Main and Grayson Streets projects and \$26,816.40 had been transferred back to the waterworks fund; that the City is now the owner of the clinic building; and that a temporary court clerk from Mt. Vernon had been hired.

This composting educational program is made possible through the Ark-Tex Council of Government Environmental Program and grant monies from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. 

Producers advised not to panic though grasshopper numbers are up

Though grasshopper numbers are higher this year than during teh 1998 drought, Dr. James Robinson is advising agricultural producers to look and think before treating.

Giving careful consideration before treating could not only save producers money but help them avoid spraying themselves into a corner with label restrictions if there are other pasture pest problems later in the season.

"Many of the grasshopper species don't eat bermudagrass unless they have no choice. They prefer weeds and weddy shrubs instead," explained Robinson, enotomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

On the other hand, there are some species that do eat bermudagrass, and if the producer sees wholesale damage to his pastures, then he or she might consider treating.

"They need to stay on top of the situation but not panic. Whether it's economical to treat will depend on each farmer's situation," he said.

For example, though a producer may see some damage from grasshoppers to his pasture, the summer of 1999 promises so far to be a normal one in terms of rainfall. The producer may have more forage than is needed to feed his livestock, in which case some level of damage from grasshoppers would be acceptable. Grass-

hopper damage is similar to that of fall armyworm in that the blades of grass are eaten.

On the other hand it's possible, Robinson notes, that the summer could turn dry and an infestation that is not economical to treat now might turn into one that is a month from

"It's complicated choice. Each producer will ultimately have to make on his own," Robinson said.

The situation is further complicated by the fact that it is easier and cheaper to control grasshoppers when they are young and small.
