
Next morning I dropped a green bowl I received as a wedding shower gift. Then a mug.






So there I was, grumpy, afflicted with some weird "drop it" disease and a sinus head ache to boot. That was before l dropped another bowl on my foot!

I hope everyone has a wonderful Thanksgiving, I'm planning on it, no matter what I break!






### **Rivercrest PASF** to sponsor concessions and silent auction


## Lunch time pizza
