Red River County Sheriff Bob Edrington reported that Saturday, March 4, a deputy responded to a call on CR4426 south of Avery in reference to an attempted abduction.

The complainant stated that three white subjects, two males with blondish hair and one female with dark hair, pulled up into their yard, grabbed his small child and pulled him into a white late model car with green, possibly Oklahoma license plates.

When the other children began yelling, the suspects then threw the child out of their car into the ditch and drove away at a high rate of speed.

The complainant advised the car could have been possibly a Grand Am that may have had four doors. The car was last seen traveling west-bound on CR4426.

The young child was scratched and badly shaken, but is home safe and doing fine.

Over 1,000 letters were received by the Commissioners' Court. They will be submitted with the grant application to the Texas Historical Commission in March.

The fund raising phase of the project will continue, as we must raise enough money to completely restore our historic courthouse, to assist with expenses of temporary relocation of courthouse personnel during the restoration period and to provide a permanent maintenance fund to preserve the courthouse in the future.

Country Cooking

Our cooks this week comes to us from the Lone Oak community near Deport. He is Jake Mauraschat. Jake has been coming up to the paper recently and giving us some tips about our computers. He is one of these people that learned from hands-on experience and very handy to have around in case of a "bomb", as we call them here at the paper.

Jake and his wife Barbara are also the new owner-operators of the Lone Oak Pet Camp. It is a kennel that gives complete care for your pets. Barbara is a counselor in the Mt. Pleasant School District.

Jake does not particularly care for our American cooking. Since he was born in Marelurg, Germany and is a naturalized American citizen, he enjoys his German-style food. He says that American cooking is too fatty, too sweet, much too greasy with too much sugar. So he has let us have a few of his favorite recipes to

see the difference.

By the way, I threw in one of my own I discovered last week and made it Sunday for dinner and it was fantastic. It just happened to be a German Chocolate Upside Down Cake! No offense Jake!

Hope you enjoy these and we will see you in the kitchen.

German Gulasch---this "goulash" recipe is different from ours; where we use ground beef and cook the noodles in with the mixture.

Deutches Rotkraut or German Red Cabbage---German version of sauerkraut. . . some different than what we are used too!

Marmor Kuchen or Chocolate Marble Cake---note the difference of ingredients from the next cake recipe!

German Chocolate Upside Down Cake---maybe this one is a little more sweeter with more oil, but it sure is good!

March 9, 2000
Jake Mauraschat-Lone Oak

German Gulasch

2 pounds beef round or arm roast-cut into bite-size cubes
4 tablespoons oil
3 onions-chopped
dash of salt
1 tablespoon paprika
2 cloves garlic-minced
dash pepper
dash sugar
1-2 cups beef broth
1 cup sour cream

Brown beef in hot oil. Add onion, garlic, paprika, pepper, sugar and salt. Pour the broth over meat and simmer for 1-1/2 hours. Thicken with sour cream. Serve with potatoes, rice or noodles.

Deutches Rotkraut (German Red Cabbage)

1 red cabbage-shredded
5-1/2 tablespoons shortening
3 tablespoons vinegar
2 tablespoon sugar
salt and pepper to taste
1 medium onion
10 cloves
1-2 medium apples-peeled and cubed
1 cup beef broth

Stick cloves in onion. Heat shortening and add onion to brown. Add the vinegar, sugar, salt and pepper. Add cabbage and apples and stir. Pour hot beef broth over and simmer on very low heat for one hour. Before serving, remove the onion and cloves.

Marmor Kuchen (Chocolate Marble Cake)

1 cup butter
1 cup sugar
2 cups flour
5 eggs
dash salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon finely grated lemon peel
3 tablespoons cocoa

Put flour in mixing bowl and add the other ingredients except cocoa. Mix for 2-3 minutes. Take half of batter and mix with cocoa. Pour the batter, alternating intervals into a greased and floured springform tube pan. Swirl with fork. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour.

German Chocolate Upside Down Cake

1 cup flaked coconut
1 cup chopped pecans
1 package German chocolate cake mix
3 large eggs
1-1/4 cups water
1/4 cup vegetable oil
1 package cream cheese
1/2 cup butter or margarine
2 cups powdered sugar-sifted

Grease a 13x9x2-inch pan. Line with wax paper and grease paper or spray with Pam. Sprinkle coconut and pecans on bottom of prepared pan; set aside. Combine cake mix, eggs, water and oil in large bowl; mix according to package directions. Spoon batter over coconut and pecans. Combine cream cheese and butter in saucepan; cook over low heat, stirring often, until butter melts and mixture is smooth. Stir in powdered sugar. Spoon mixture evenly of top of batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 40-45 minutes. Cool in pan on wire rack for 10 minutes; invert cake onto serving plate. Remove and discard wax paper.

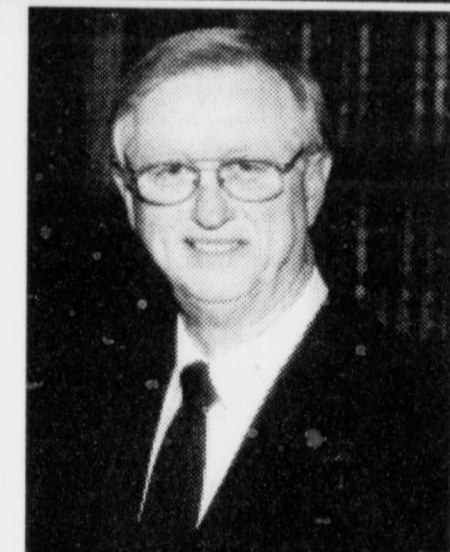

G. came to our county in 1999 to present a plaque to Jack Herrington in appreciation for his successful prosecution of the capital murder cases which enabled them to receive state funding to continue this program for small rural counties.

Jack has collected \$174,449 in "hot checks" since taking office. This money has been returned to the victims.

It has been said that Jack has numerous murder cases left untried. The one that immediately comes to mind is Al Peek. As a kid Al Peek ran around with many of our kids and visited in our homes. Al was well liked and well thought of, and we want his murderer brought to justice.

Check the facts: Very little evidence was presented to Jack a year after the crime was committed. He empaneled a Special Grand Jury who heard and investigated only Al's case for six months. They interviewed numerous people. This Grand Jury found insufficient evidence to indict AT THIS TIME. Jack's office has been accused of taking a \$10,000 donation from a drug offender. The truth of the matter is this \$10,000 was money earned from drugs by the defendant. 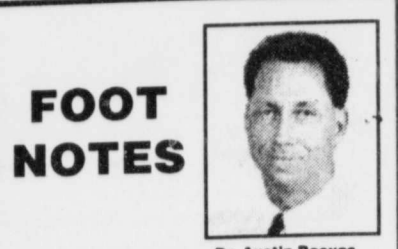

MTBE, more information on its possible effect

Methyl tertiary butyl ether, or simply stated MTBE, is a colorless chemical compound manufactured for primary use in gasoline. MTBE has been used sporadically since 1979, but came into statewide, year-round use in 1996. The characteristics of MTBE are unlike those of other gas constituents and solvents. MTBE is highly soluble and migrates quickly with groundwater. It does not significantly adhere onto soil particles, and it does not appear to readily biodegrade (break down into less harmful substances) in the environment.

MTBE has a distinctive, solvent-like odor that is detectable at relatively low concentrations- ranging from 10 to 30 parts per billion. Individual sense of smell will vary with type of water and temperature of the water. Shallow wells can become contaminated by runoff from leaking underground storage tanks, surface spills and even runoff from rain that takes MTBE out of the air.

Tons of this chemical are entering the air daily from auto exhaust if you live in an area designated by the EPA as an "Ozone Non-attainment Area". Driving during heavy or congested traffic periods increases exposure, as well as exposure during fueling the at gas stations. In 1997, EPA had issued a Drinking Water Advisory for MTBE, citing potential risks for contamination for which no national regulations currently exist. Advisories are used only for guidance and are not legally enforceable. They are subject to revision as more information becomes available.

The prime example of MTBE contamination is the City of Santa Monica, California. There, two well fields supplying 50% of the city's water supply have been contaminated by MTBE, either through underground pipeline and/or storage tanks leakage. One other California city, Marysville, also closed a well due to contamination. With the exception of these two named, it appears from a Congressional Research Service report to Congress dated March 24, 1998, that available data does not show a widespread occurrence of MTBE in drinking water supplies. What the future holds is still up in the air. Legislators in the Tyler, Longview and Marshall area have stated they will submit legislation to ban the use of MTBE in the next session. With the public response observed in

the meeting in Longview during January, a political solution may be forthcoming, mostly due to citizen input to politicians.

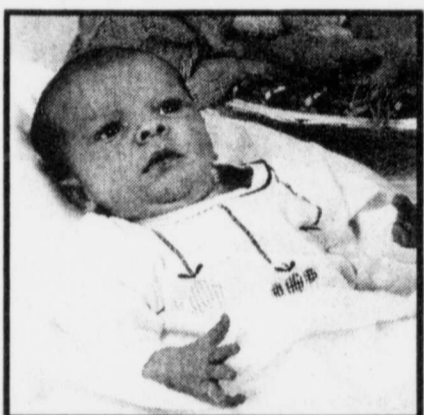

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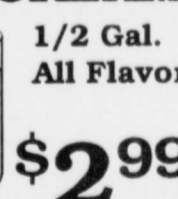

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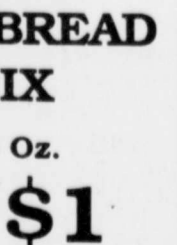
