



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

Caramel-Apple Pecan Tart 3-1/2 cups baking mix cup heavy whipped cream /2 cup butter or margarine-melted can cinnamon-apple pie filling 2/3 cup caramel-apple dip

/2 cup pecans In mixing bowl, stir together mix, cream and butter until pastry dough forms a ball. Turn onto flour dusted surface with additional baking mix if needed. Knead 7-10 times. Roll out 15nch round. Fold into quarters and transfer to 13-inch pizza pan or baking dish. Spoon apple filling over pastry. Place teaspoonfuls of caramel dip over filling. Sprinkle pecans over top. Fold dough oward center to make edging. Bake at 100 degrees for 20-22 minutes or until olden brown.

Chewy Caramel-Apple Pecan Cookies

I cup granulated sugar I cup packed dark brown sugar

1/2 cup butter-softened 1/2 cup margarine-softened 2 large eggs 2 tablespoons milk

2 teaspoons vanilla 3-1/3 cups baking mix 2-1/2 cups oats

I package chopped dried apples I cup chopped pecans-toasted 20 caramels-cut into 8 pieces

In large bowl, beat sugars, butters until light and fluffy. Add eggs, milk and vanilla; beat well and combine. Slowly add baking mix and oats; beat at low speed to combine. Stir in apples, pecans and caramel pieces. Cover; chill for I hour. Place tablespoonfuls on baking sheet well coated with cooking spray. Bake at 375 degrees for 12-14 minutes. Cool and transfer to wire

Pound Cake Cookies I package pound cake mix

1/3 cup butter or margarine-softened I teaspoon almond extract

Heat oven to 375 degrees, Mix half of cake mix, margarine, extract and egg in large bowl until smooth. Stir in remaining cake mix. Divide into halves. Roll each half 1/8 inch thick on lightly floured board. Cut into desired shapes; or roll into 1-inch balls. Place on ungreased cookie sheet and flatten with bottom of glass. Bake until edges are light brown; 6-8 minutes. Cool slightly and remove to wire rack. Ice with Butter cream Icing below.

Buttercream Icing 1/2 cup margarine I-I/2 teaspoon clear vanilla 5 cups confectioners sugar

2-3 tablespoons milk Cream butter and shortening and add vanilla. Add sugar, one cup at a time. Beat at medium speed. Ad milk to desired consistency. Smooth onto cookies. Sprinkles may also be added.

George Peter Ford, age 51, died Thursday, October 12th at his home in Dallas.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday, October 14 at Sparkman/Hillcrest Northwest Highway Chapel in Dallas. He was cremated.

Dr. Ford was born in Ilford, Essex, England in 1949. He earned a bachelor of science degree with honors from Bedford College at the University of London and a doctorate of philosophy from the University of East Anglia in 1975.

An interest in computational chemistry prompted Dr. Ford to come to the United States, where he worked and studied under Dr. Michael Dewar at the University of Texas at Austin.

After five years conducting cancer research at the Hutchinson Cancer Research Center in Seattle, Dr. Ford began his career as a chemistry teacher

at SMU in 1984. He filled his time away from chemistry with world travel, bridge games and classical music, which is how he met his wife, Linda, more than twelve years ago.

"A major interest of his and mine was trying to learn about classical music", Linda says.

'I guess he saw that I was interested in continuing to learn about classical music and for the first date he asked me to go to the SMU symphony. He compiled quite a large CD collection> Gustav Mahler was probably his favorite.'

In addition to his wife, Dr. Ford is survived by his mother Sheila Cross and her husband, Alan of Colchester, England; his father, George W. Surviving negative episodes in my life, especially those that were aimed at my Hispanic heritage, is something I want to forget. However, I have found that this is not very easily done. I still can recall many of those negative events as if they were happening now. The emotional scars that these events left in their wake are long lasting and they still hurt when I recall them. However, I am able to cast them aside quicker than when they initially occurred.

As early as first grade, I learned that I had to rely on my skills and my God-given talents to overcome negative events. Instead of harboring hatred toward those who hurt me, I compensated by plunging into schoolwork with vengeance. I applied every piece of advice my Dad offered, especially if it applied to learning an achievement. I turned being a Hispanic, a negative in my peer's eyes, into a positive attribute for my family and me. Through my achievements, I wanted to pave the way for my brothers and sisters and other Hispanics who followed me, to show the world and mostly those that hurt me, that Hispanics could be smart in school.

Throughout my education career, as a student and as an educator, I have always followed the philosophy instilled in me by my Dad: "work hard and it will pay off". In many respects this philosophy helped me to succeed at Paris Junior College, at Sam Houston State University, as a classroom

teacher of the mentally retarded, and finally, to succeed in obtaining my Ph.D. from the University of Kansas. I applied this same philosophy in my work as at teacher educator in the field of special education and as a Director of Student Assessment. Throughout all my endeavors I never lost the confidence that I gained as a first grader when I proved to my non-Hispanic peers that I was a smart dude and they had better study hard and work hard because if they didn't they would be beaten by a Hispanic.

I have tried to become a model that others can emulate, both academically and socially. To promote myself as an academic model, I publish articles in professional journals. I have published to monographs, and chapter in a book. To promote myself as a social model, I maintain a strong work ethic, put in an honest day's work, apply rules an regulations fairly and justly and am open and accepting of individuals of all cultures, races, ethnic backgrounds, ages, levels of employment and income levels. In short, I, as a Hispanic, want those who witness my achievements, my positive work behaviors and my positive attitudes to use these attributes as a yardstick to measure other Hispanics they encounter.

If I succeed in making a positive impact on some individual within and without my cultural group, then I am satisfied that I have turned my Hispanic perspective into a positive influence.




Club Foot



Water?

Today's religious world finds it difficult to accept that immersion in water is essential to salvation. They believe, instead, that a person is saved prior to baptism, rather than at the point of baptism. They apparently are unable to conceive of God incorporating such a simple, ordinary substance, like water, into such a significant event, man's salvation. Many people, upon hearing God's will, balk at His command and exclaim, "Are you saying that the only thing that stands between me and God is water?"

As the Israelites sought to escape the bondage of Egypt, what stood between them and freedom? Water. In fact, they were baptized in the Red Sea to escape slavery and enter into freedom (1 Corinthians 10:1,2). Moses referred to this water immersion as "salvation" (Exodus 14:14)

What stood between Naaman and cleansing salvation from his dreadful skin disease? Water. His attitude was much like those today who minimize and refuse to accept the divine role of water in man's salvation (2 Kings 5:11,12). Nevertheless, Naaman was not healed until he was immersed in water (2 Kings 5:14).

What stood between the man born blind and the ability to see? Water. IF he had refused to apply water from the pool of Siloam to his eyes as Jesus had instructed, he would have remained blind. (John 9:7, 11).

What stood between Noah and his wicked peers doomed to destruction? Water. Peter, in fact, declared Noah's salvation from the sinful world of his day to have been "by water" (1 Peter 3:20). He then went on to declare what the denominational world persistently denies; baptism now saves us (1 Peter 3:21).

Water has never actually had any inherent ability to cleanse. God is always the only one who does the saving. But He chose to save and cleanse people only after they obeyed His command by faith (Hebrews 11:30). If these had refused to use water to escape bondage, cleanse skin, remove blindness and avoid destruction, they would have remained in bondage, diseased, blind and destroyed So people today who reject the role of water in salvation, I.E., baptism unto the remission of sins, are yet in heir sins, unsaved, disobedient and displeasing to God (Act 2:38; 22:16; Luke 7:29,30).



ORDINANCE NO. 01-002 Amending Ordinance No. 99-010 "An ordinance of the City of Blossom, Texas, amending certain Articles of existing Ordinance No. 99-010"

Whereas, the governing body of Blossom, Texas, meeting in duly posted Public Session, deem it prudent and necessary to amend Articles I and II of existing Ordinance No. 99-010, adopted May 18, 1999: and

Whereas, a duly posted Public Hearing has been held prior to consideration for adoption of aforementioned amendments:

Now, therefore, Be It Ordained by the City Council of Blossom, Texas, that Articles I and II, Ordinance No. 99-010, are hereby canceled and superseded and are restated as follows:

Article I. Construction Regulations: Section 1. Building Codes. The "Standard Building Code," in its latest edition is hereby adopted by reference as though it were fully copied herein, as the safe and practical building standards for all construction within the City of Blossom and other areas outside the City over which the City has regulatory au-

a. All finished foundations of slab construction or the level of the first floor of all site built construction must be constructed at a minimum level of eight (8) inches higher than the crown of the street or road which provides the primary access to the finished construction.

b. Set back requirements for all structures must be a minimum of ten (10) feet from the back and side property lines and a minimum of 25 feet set back from the property line facing any public street.

Section 2. Types of Construction. Except as approved separately by the City Council, all new construction or residences shall be sitebuilt single family residences or consistent with "Existing Land Use, City of Blossom, July 1999", prepared by Hayter Engineering as an element of the City's Comprehensive

Section 3. General Land Use Requirements.
The City of Blossom Comprehensive Plan, developed with financial and administrative support from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs, completed by Hayter Engineering, 1999, is hereby adopted by reference as though fully copied herein as the standard for land use and types of construction to be considered in the approval of all building permits.

Section 4. Regulation Outside City Limits. The regulations established herein, pertaining to building permits is extended to areas outside the City limits wherein the City has regulating authority and regulations established herein specific to plumbing permits and general requirements relating to plumbing extend to any area wherein the City provides water supply, whether that supply is provided by public or private distribution lines

Article II. General Provisions. Section 1. Permit Required. It shall be unlawful to construct or alter any building or structure in the City of Blossom, excepting fences, when the cost of such construction exceeds \$500.00 or where the effect of such construction or alteration is to enlarge the capacity or affect the bearing walls of any building or the roof thereof, without having first secured a permit for such construction.

Section 2. Unless an Ordinance is specifically declared to be an emergency necessitating immediate effect, an Ordinance shall not take effect until it has been published in conformity with Chapter 52 of the Local Government Code and with the provisions of this Ordinance.

If any section, provision, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or word in this Ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such holdings shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance, and the City Council of the City of Detroit, Texas hereby declares it would have enacted such remaining portions, despite

Section 4. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed to the extend of conflict only.
