We have not run the UIL photos yet, because they are not through competing. They will do so at the end of this month, at which time we will know the standings and take our pho-


We try vry hard to support ALL academic achievements in our excellent school system. We must be informed by teachers, parents or school officials when events take place, so we encourage everyone to do so.





WHEN INJURY STRIKES
