## From drum beat to police beat

Bogata Police Chief will "write you a ticket or play you a song"

Bogata Chief of Police Charlie Clegg "can write you a ticket or play you a song".

Charlie Clegg came to Bogata in 1998. He helped create the Police Department for Bogata, a department that aims for value based policies to better serve the community.

Charlie was born in Nashville, Tennessee. His dad served in World War II and his mother worked as a riveter, building air planes.

The family moved to Hendersonville, Tenn. when Charlie was about 12 years old. Hendersonville was about 30 miles out of Nashville, near Old Hickory Lake.

Charlie grew up in this neighborhood, and Boots Randolph lived a short distance away; Johnny Cash lived close by.

Charlie's best friends were Del and Dane Bryants. Their dad was Boudeleoux Bryant, who was added to the Country Music Hall of Fame three years ago. Roy Orbison's little brother, Sam, went to school with Charlie. Boots Randolph, Chet Atkins and Floyd Cramer would do fund raisers for their school.

Charlie's older brother brought drums home, but Charlie was the one who "took to" them. He started playing in "The Black Poodle" next to the Carousel on Printers Alley in Nashville when he was only 14 years old.

Charlie and some friends formed a music group and called themselves "The Homesteaders". The band consisted of Charlie Clegg, drummer;

Bob Leftridge, standard guitar and lead singer; Dave McCreary, bass guitar; Jerry Rivers sang and played fiddle and mandolin; Frank Evans sang tenor and played lead guitar. Jerry Rivers was the fiddler in Hank Williams Senior's band. The Homesteaders record "Show me the Way to the Circus" was in the top 10 hits. This was all back in about 1966.

The Homesteaders played back up music for many singers: Red Foley, Lefty Frizzell, Dottie West, Marty Robbins, Charlie Pride, Slim Whitman. They played the music for Carl Smith when he did "Hey Joe", played for Floyd Tillman when he did "Slow Poke". They played for Hank Snow, Tex Ritter, P. Wee King, and Red Stewart who wrote "Tennessee Waltz" and "Bonaparte's Retreat". Charlie and the other Homesteaders played in Carnegie Hall for the opening of the show "Buck Owens Live At Carnegie Hall". The Country Music Awards in 1967 recognized The Homesteaders as one of the Top 10 bands in the USA. Buddy Lee Attractions was their booking agent. They traveled to all 50 states and 28 countries seven or eight times from 1966 to 1974.

Charlie was staff drummer for Tree Publishing Co. of Nashville. Deanna Carter's dad, Fred Carter, Jr., played guitar on their records.

There are remarks about Charlie Clegg in Hank Williams Sr.'s Biography.

Charlie married Betty Foster of California. She started singing on the

west coast at the young age of 12. She appeared on Cals Corral and Cliff Stone Jamboree. Cliff Stone was entered in the Country Music Hall of Fame. Betty was encouraged to go to Nashville, there in Little Darlings Recording Studio, she and Charlie met. Glenn Campbell was a big backer of Betty's but she decided to give up her singing ambitions for the role of wife and mother. She and Charlie married and have two children. A son, Brandon, is a policeman in Dallas. A son, Shannon, was in law enforcement, but is now doing interior customizing of jet airplanes. He and other crew members did Arnold Schwartzegger's jet. Charlie found the music field took too much time away from his wife and sons, so he gave it up and moved to Texas. He said he always enjoyed Texas when he came to the state with The Homesteaders. He went to work for Alfa Laval/Swrg Dairy Equipment Co. as regional manager. After a few years Charlie decided to get into Law Enforcement and some time later found his way to Bogata. He and his department have made Bogata a safer community.

The Homesteaders record "Show Me The Way To The Circus" featuring Charlie Clegg on drums can be heard at the Bogata Library/Museum when it is open Fridays from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. or Saturdays from 10 until 2.

Our cooks this week are a group of ladies from the Jolntown Missionary Baptist Church. The ladies auxiliary recently compiled a recipe book and it has some great recipes in it!

Land for the church was donated by Mary W. Rhodes on July 2, 1875. The first church building was constructed in 1908. The church has enjoyed growth in membership and facilities. The new frame building was completed in the spring of 1953 with additional Sunday School rooms added in 1955.

In 1996, a brick parsonage was added. In 1967-68, a new church auditorium was built. In 1969, the old frame church building was remodeled, bricked and connected to the new auditorium.

A new educational building with kitchen facilities, nursery, fellowship hall and pastor's study was completed in 1975. In 1980, a new parsonage was built. A youth activity building was completed and dedicated in 1999.

The church has been blessed in many ways with a growing membership and the addition of a new foyer to the building.

In addition to the cookbook, the ladies have many other activities to raise money. They take orders for homemade fried pies for \$1.00 each. During November of 2000, they sold over 1800 pies. They make peach, apricot, and apple. They also work throughout the community during the holidays and hold food drives for the needy along with other worthwhile activities.

**Spicy Mexican Skillet Chicken-Kathy Hawkins**-this one will be a keeper with your family!

**Gran's Chalupas-Jerry Ann Richardson**-for a quick and simple recipe you family will love!

**Zucchini and Tomato-Jerry Ann Richardson**-usually everyone has these two vegetables in their garden...here is a great recipe for them!

**Macaroni Loaf-Johan Turpin**-if you like macaroni and cheese...you will love this one!

**Mexican Hominy-Johan Turpin**-canned hominy, cream of chicken soup, jalapeno, sausage bits and cheese...sounds great!

## Thursday, June 7, 2001 Jolntown Missionary Baptist Church Cookbook

### Chicken Spaghetti Billie Pirtle

- 1 whole chicken
- 1/2 pound butter-2 sticks
- 2 large onions
- 1 tablespoon chili powder
- 2 cans stewed tomatoes
- 1 jar chopped pimentos
- 1 small jar mushrooms
- salt and pepper
- 1 pound Velveeta
- 14 ounce elbow noodles

Boil chicken. Cook noodles in stock; debone chicken. In saucepan boil butter, onion, chili powder, tomatoes, pimentos, mushrooms, salt and pepper. Simmer for 45 minutes. Add cheese to sauce. Place drained noodles, chicken and sauce in baking dish and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

### Baked Corn Billie Pirtle

- 2 large cans cream-style corn
- 1 small can chopped green chili
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 6 tablespoons oil
- 3/4 cup cornmeal
- 2 eggs-beaten
- 2 cups American cheese-grated

Mix all ingredients together. Pour into baking dish. Top with some more grated cheese and bake for 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

### Spicy Mexican Skillet Chicken Kathy Hawkins

- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
- 1-2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 15 ounce can black beans-rinse & drain
- 1 cup frozen whole kernel corn
- 1/2 cup thick and chunky salsa

Remove fat from chicken. Mix chili powder and salt and pepper; sprinkle evenly over both sides of chicken. Heat oil in 10-inch non-stick skillet over medium heat. Cook chicken in oil 8-10 minutes; turning once; until juice is no longer pink. Stir in beans, corn and salsa. Heat to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and simmer 3-5 minutes or until vegetables are hot.

### Easy Cornbread Kathy Hawkins

- 1 cup meal
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup sugar-more or less
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg

Grease baking pan-iron skillet is best, with 2 tablespoons oil. Place in hot 400 degree oven to let oil get hot. Mix all ingredients and pour into hot pan. Bake at 400 degrees for approximately 30 minutes.

### Gran's Chalupas Jerry Ann Richardson

- 2 pounds hamburger
- 2 cans refried beans
- 2 cans cheddar cheese soup
- 1 can Ro-Tel tomatoes
- 1 package corn tortillas
- shredded cheese
- lettuce
- tomatoes
- sour cream
- picante sauce

Brown hamburger. Add beans, soup, cheese and tomatoes. Heat thoroughly. Cook tortillas in hot grease until crispy. Top tortillas with soup mixture and garnish with remaining ingredients.

### Zucchini and Tomato Jerry Ann Richardson

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 2 cups sliced zucchini-1/2" thick
- 1/4 cup soft bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon salt
- dash pepper
- 2 cups tomato wedges
- 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Melt butter and saute green pepper and onions. Add zucchini, bread crumbs, Parmesan, salt and pepper. Turn into 1-1/2 quart covered casserole. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes. Add tomatoes and bake 10 more minutes. Melt cheddar cheese on top and serve.

### Macaroni Loaf Johan Turpin

- 1 cup macaroni
- 1-1/2 cup scalded milk
- 1 cup soft bread crumbs
- 1-1/2 cup American cheese
- 3/8 teaspoon salt
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- 1 pimento-chopped
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 1 tablespoon chopped onion
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper

Cook macaroni in boiling water; blanch in cold water and drain. Pour scalding milk over bread crumbs. Add butter, pimento, parsley, onion, cheese and seasonings. Then add well-beaten eggs and stir in macaroni. Pour in well buttered loaf pan. Bake 50 minutes in 350 degree oven until loaf is firm.

### Mexican Hominy Johan Turpin

- 2 cans hominy-drained
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 onion-chopped
- 1 stick oleo
- 1 cup grated cheese
- pickled jalapeno-to taste-chopped
- salt and pepper to taste
- sausage bits-optional

Saute onion in oleo. Add hominy and soup, pepper and 3/4 of cheese. Top with rest of cheese and bake for 30 minutes at 350 degrees in casserole dish.

**What Must I Do To Be Saved?**

Many answers are given to the above question in the religious world today-but what does the Bible say? To the rich young ruler, Jesus gave an answer appropriate to that day by directing the Jew to the Jewish Law (Luke 18:18-23). Yet, we are neither Jewish nor subject to Mosaic Law. The Christian Age or New Testament period began after Christ's death (Hebrews 9:15-17). We, therefore, need an answer to the question which pertains to this time period. Three examples should suffice. Peter gave the answer when believing Jews asked what they needed to do: "Repent and be baptized...into the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38). Paul was told to go into the city and await an answer, which Ananias soon provided: "Arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins, calling on His name" (Acts 9:6; 22:16). When Paul himself was asked the same question by a jailer, he responded, "Believe on the Lord Jesus, and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31). How did this answer differ from the previous two?

In the first place, Paul and those gathered on Pentecost already believed in Jesus prior to their question. The jailer on the other hand, was a Gentile who needed to be informed of the necessity of obedient faith. Secondly, Paul did not wait for a response of faith from the jailer since the jailer did not know HOW to believe on Jesus. So Paul proceeded to teach him precisely what he needed to do so that he could then display obedient faith (Acts 16:32; Romans 10:17). Paul's instructions obviously included (1) the necessity of repentance, as demonstrated by the jailer's decision to wash their stripes and (2) the necessity of baptism, as demonstrated by the fact that they were immersed "immediately" even though it was still the middle of the night (Acts 16:33). It was not until after baptism that the jailer rejoiced. It was not until after baptism that Luke tells us that the jailer believed (Acts 16:34), further emphasizing the essentiality of baptism to the conversion process.

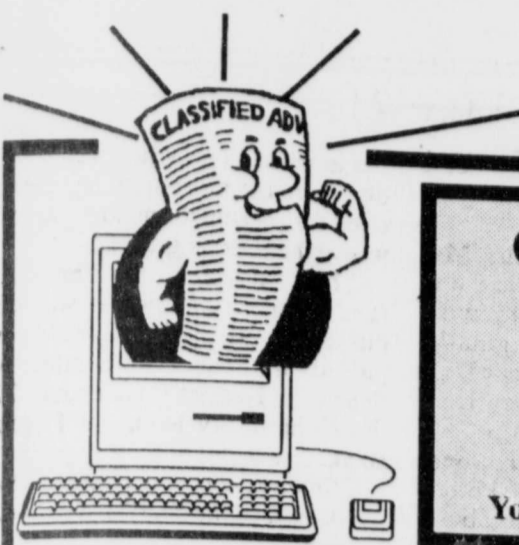

### Zero tolerance means zero alcohol

Parents and anyone over 21 needs to be aware that it is illegal to make alcohol available to a minor. Fines of up to \$2,000 and/or 180 days in jail can be assessed and adults open themselves up to tremendous civil and criminal liability.

Under Texas' zero tolerance law, it is unlawful for a minor to purchase, attempt to purchase, possess or consume alcoholic beverages, or misrepresent their age. Minors can face a fine of up to \$500, a mandatory al-

cohol awareness course, community service, and a 30-day suspension of their license. On the second offense, there is again a fine of up to \$500, possible attendance of an alcohol awareness course, 20-40 hours of community service and a 60-day suspension of their driver's license. On their third MIP, a teen could face a fine of \$250-\$2,000, confinement in jail for up to 180 days and automatic suspension of their driver's license if the teen is at least 17 years old. If a

minor is driving, any detectable amount of alcohol in a minor's system is unlawful and will result in a DUI. Many teenagers can reach a .08 BAC with two or three beers in an hour.

According to the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration, Texas leads the nation with the highest number of alcohol related traffic fatalities among youth. One in four Texas high school seniors stated in a 2000 survey that they had driven a car after having a good bit to drink at least once during the past year. This represents 80,000 impaired drivers on Texas roads each year.

If you know of a teenage drinking party, you can anonymously report it by calling 1-888-THE-TABC, which is statewide an toll free. Underage drinking can be a deadly choice. Remember, there aren't always second chances.
