If I had not spent years taking pictures of fires and terrible accidents, if I had not become a First Responder, would I be the same? No, indeed I wouldn't.


If I had spent my life working for the State Department of Human Resources, or the banks I first worked in, I wouldn't be the same person at all.

essay follows: Soil and Water Conservation

by Molly Hare Saving our planet should be an everyday priority in our lives as Americans. Conserving our natural resources such as our soil and water is a very important issue,

especially around my house. Agriculture is my family's source of income. It puts clothes on our backs and food on our table. It will pay for furthering my education someday. But, in return for the wonderful things it provides for us, we must take care of conserving our land and waterways for future generations of

farmers. We work closely with programs provided by the government to make sure that we do not overuse the land and make it non-fertile for planting crops. The United States Department of Agriculture was formed after the drought of the 1920's, commonly known as the Dust Bowl. There was so much soil erosion from poor planting methods and virtually no rainfall in years that the land actually blew away. Today, with advanced technology, farmers know what crops to plant and when to plant them to help maintain the fertility of the soil and to help keep erosion at the minimum.

We also work at helping maintain another natural resource, water. In our business, we use an enormous amount of water for watering our cattle and everyday cleanup around our barn. The same office helps us plan and construct ponds in our pastures to catch rainwater naturally to water the livestock. The government will also help financially in this area. All farmers should take advantage of this aid being made available.

We should all be more conscientious about conserving our earth and its resources, regardless if we are in the business of agriculture or not. Everyone can do his or her part, no matter how small toward maintaining our planet.

Happy Valentine's Day! The sweetheart of a day that comes around once a year just in time for you to break your diet! Yes.....you finally committed to that diet regime and are going good and what do you receive for Valentine's Day.....a big box of chocolate or some other "goodies" that break your will power! Okay.....so we will start again next week!

Anyway, here we are again and guess what I have for you this week? Cooking with roses! You know.....along with the chocolate, some people are lucky enough to get roses.....well, don't throw them out when they begin to wilt......cook with them! Cook you say! That is right.....oh, be sure they are the right ones first! Some roses, because of their fragrance and rich color, are better than others for cooking and making condiments. Some of these are: Nur Mahal, Cramoisi Superieur, Louis Phillipe, Dortmund and Chrysler Imperial in the reds category. In the pinks category you might find: Paul Neyron, Vanity, Mrs. B.R. Cant, Duchesse de Brabant, Pink Meidiland and Hansa, just to name a few!

For centuries, rose have been that special ingredient in crating the finest culinary presentations. A rose candy to the ancient Romans is the earliest recorded recipe sing roses as an ingredient. It is a certainly that other civilizations also used the sweet, fragrant qualities of their own native species.

By the tenth century, Persia was exporting rosewater to most of Europe, North Africa and Asia. Rosewater was commonly used as a flavoring agent in cakes, cookies and pastries. In medieval 14th entury, roses were used exten-

ively in fish and game sauces as well as in desserts, candies and preserves. Many a royal chef prepared such delights as Roseve of Fysshe (Fish in Rose Sauce) and Rede Rose (Red Rose Pudding).

By the 19th century, roses were widely used throughout the world as coloring and flavoring agents in teas, candies, pastries, sauces, oils and conserves.

Handed down for decades, favorite recipes crossed the oceans as colonists and conquerors spanned the globe. Today, the rose's tangy fruit, called "rosehips" are still used in a variety of recipes and a source of vitamin C. Its leaves are blended with other herbs in fragrant and soothing teas. Its petals lend magic to candies, syrups, honeys, vinegars, oils and

Some tips to follow: Never use roses treated with insecticides or fungicides unless those products are approved for food crops! Treat them as you would other edible garden crops. Thoroughly rinse roses before using. No one likes to find a candied spider in their hip jam! Harvest early in the morning, when roses are at their freshest. Avoid using the yellow, orange or mauve colors as they tend to turn brown when cooked. Some white roses have diuretic qualities while red roses may color vinegars purple.

So, here we go, all of you rose connoisseurs (you may need to check that spelling!) Check out these recipes and we will see you in the rose garden.....I mean Kitchen!

Rose Sugar-this was adapted from a 16th century recipe!

Rose Syrup-make your own rose syrup!

Rose-Tarragon Vinegar-will keep for 6 months in cool pantry! Rosewater-adapted from a 10th century recipe!

Rose Mayonnaise-add 1-2 drops of red food coloring or beet juice to make the rosy color!

Rose Hip Jam or Jelly-adapted from a 17th century recipe!







What about the accused who is charged by the countable and then carried before his close friend, the JP? Too many times in the past the case is already decided.




