

.Massey's Pit Bar B Q Flashes.

The sign just off Highway 37, "PIT Q", is now old and weathered and partly hidden on one side by a small but growing cedar tree. In years gone by, the sign once proudly proclaimed the roadside home of Massey's Pit Bar B Q restuarant located just about midway between Bogata and Clarksville.

Massey's long ago cooked the small one room building of light green shingles, three single windows trimmed in white and a white roof is now all but abandoned. No longer does the flapping screen door invite customers to come in and enjoy that special flavor only Massey's knew how to provide. The gravel, oval driveway remains and the pit chimney and two smoke pipes still stand tall on top of the fading building, but the torn curtains hanging from the windows tell you that pit barbeque is there only in memory.

I was only a kid when I made my first trips from Deport to Massey's. It was practically a Sunday morning ritual for me and my daddy to crank up that 1954 Royal Blue Chevy pickup truck and drive the farm-to-market road

through Fulbright to Massey's. If Bud Nobles only knew, at an early age, driver's license or not, it was pretty exciting for me to learn to drive on occasion on that road behind the wheel of that old

Anyway, I supppose Massey's was open on other days of the week, but our day for barbeque

was Sunday. I remember pulling into that oval driveway and at times seeing Mr. or Mrs. Massey tripping out of the back door of their house which was located just about thirty paces beyond the carport from the restaurant. Going inside the restaurant front door, you quickly met up with the counter and the old cash register. Behind the counter were the obligatory chip rack and the old Coke wall menu proclaiming beef and pork by the pound or by the sandwich.

Mrs. Massey, grandma-like and always smiling, usually handled the counter and the customer service, while Mr. Massey, always serious about his product, was busy in the pit. You don't find barbeque like the Massey's much anymore. The sauce was a deli-

cious, special clear vinegar based blend of spices and heavy on red pepper. It was sweet, yet with the right spicy bite. It was always

tough to choose between the pork and the beef, so we usually just got both.

What made a trip to Massey's really special was the preparation of the "to go" order. Folks, it was pre-styrofoam times. Then, they packed both the sauce and barbeque in what we know today as those neat, white cardboard Chinese food boxes complete with the little wire handles. Just drop those into a brown paper bag and you were on your way.

Once we got home with barbeque by the pound, Mother would toast "hamburger" buns to perfection with just the right touch of browned edges from an old black iron skillet. Those buns were good for mopping up the sauce that dripped off your sandwich. That was the best part. We just added chips and bottled Dr. Pepper to our Massey's on Sunday. That was all you needed to enjoy an old family tradition--one for days gone by supplied by the Massey's for our house.






She was a sister of the publisher Henry R. Luce, who died in 1967


