For myself, I'm too big of a chicken to be anesthesized and cut on in order to pull out my crow's feet!


No, I'm afraid that my many years in the sun, my many hours spent on tractors and my stresses and worries show in my face. And that is the way it has to stay.

Roll each piece of venison in flour with garlic powder added. Heat skillet with sall amount of bacon grease. Brown each piece on both sides and remove and place on a plate. Put onion, pepper and mushrooms in same pan and stir for four to five times to coat and add the one cup of water and simmer for two minutes. Place venison back into pan with mixture. Add I tablespoon flour to 2-3 more cups of water shake in glass to keep mixture from lumping. Pour this mixture on top of steak and turn to medium and place lid on skillet for about five more minutes. **Bear Roast-Canadian Style** I small bear roast to fit into crock pot





Yes and No. Because emergency medical services both professional and volunteer are have seen the comfort and care more important than the average citizen realizes. I will use the word professional to designate a paid EMS worker, and volunteer to designate a non-paid EMS worker. But make no mistake they both know what they are doing, and often volunteers are professionals who serve as volunteers in their time off.

I have shared a few of my sentiments about EMS personnel with readers in the past, and I want to share a few of them once more, company. both old and new memories and opinions.

I have seen volunteers and professionals alike with ice coating their bunker gear, exhausted and falling for the tenth time on glaze ice as they go to the fourth or fifth

auto accident of the day.

I have seen professionals and volunteers alike weep over the save the life of a child who is almost dead.

I have used and seen people use the AED, giving a heart attack victim the only hope of survival they have. And, sometimes it works! Even when it doesn't', I that EMS personnel extend to the families undergoing the terrible loss of a loved one.

I have watched as volunteers break out body bags and I have tracts and pay, but it never stops searched for sheets to help cover the dead and lend dignity to a corpse.

I watched an elderly patient who was so scared her vitals were "off the charts" relax and settle down because of a kind hand staving off the blackness of a night without

I have watched EMS on ambulances practically stumbling in weariness during a flu epidemic, but still managing to give excellent care to their patients.

The jolt of a beeper going off

becomes so ingrained that the deepest sleep is instantly shattered by it's shrill. Clothing is donned by volunteers in seconds, and within only a minute a truck will be rolling to offer comfort and aid. Only a few minutes after that, an ambulance will be on hand also.

EMS

I know from personal experience that EMS personnel in the areas our newspapers serve is fast, efficient and caring.

Volunteers struggle to obtain as much training as possible, and they struggle to raise money for both training and equipment.

EMS faces challenges with conthem from doing their very best for their patients.

EMS weeks doesn't get a lot of publicity. It should.

Because if emergency medical services aren't around to keep a patient viable until they get to ER, all the physicians and hospitals in the world can't help.

The Blossom Times, Bogata News, Deport Times, Detroit Weekly and Talco Times, along with myself, personally, salute the volunteers and the paid professionals of Emergency Medical Services. Keep up the exceptional job!



Car Seat Check-up is June 5

A car seat check-up will be held June 5 from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. in the Paris Wal-Mart parking lot. The event is being sponsored by the Paris EMS

The Car Seat Check-up Program was developed by the Department of Transportation and he Department of Health due to the growing number of injuries and deaths of infants and toddlers. National studies have discovered that infants and toddlers were restrained improperly in car seats.

Those same national studies reflected that at least 8 out of 10 car seats are incorrectly used. The studies revealed that correctly installed car seats are 71% effective in reducing deaths for infants, 54% effective in reducing toddler deaths, and reduced the need for hospitalization by 69%.

A 32-hour training program was developed through the efforts of the DOH & the DOT to educate individuals to become Child Passenger Seat Technicians. Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

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The law gives property owners the right to protest use to uphold their determination. The CAD may actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

*the market or special appraised value placed on your property.

*the unequal appraisal of your property. *the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll

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*any exemptions that may apply to you *the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal

*the taxable status of your property *the local governments which should be taxing your property *the ownership of property

*the change of use of land receiving

special appraisal *any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected you.

Informal Review: 903-427-4181 **Red River Appraisal District** 101 West Broadway Clarksville, Texas

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district, (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board. (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will

ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. the CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. the ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest from the appraisal district office at 101 West Broadway, Clarksville, Texas.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

RENO

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.
