My physician (Dr. Linda Ball) works one weekend a month at ETMC-Clarksville at the ER, and we set up a day for me to spend at the emergency room as well as the time I have spent and will be spending at St. Joseph's in Paris.

Anyway, I tought that I looked neat, crisp and fairly professional. As I pulled up in the parking lot, I clipped on my PJC ID badge, flipped a stethoscope around my neck, and strolled into ER, feeling like I should at least look like a legitimate student in emergency health care,

I was directed around the corner into the room where the doctor, lab tech and nurses

As I stood there, clutching my little clinical note book, James, the lab technician glanced up and said.

"Hey, did someone order something from Rio Verde?"

Ouch, talk about a low blow! After all the laughter died down, and I suppose my face began to fade back to it's normal color from beet red, I realized that the Mexican restaurant there in town really did use exactly the same shirts. Their logo actually has most of the same colors as mine did!

I promised I was going to give my instructor the dickens over being mistaken for a Mexican food delivery person, and this is the best way I know how to do that.

I had a fascinating day, and I learned quite a bit (including the fact that those "wall mounted" blood pressure cuffs are different from mine, and don't work well when put on wrong side out). I also was reminded that sometimes the appearance we put forth is a far cry from what people looking at us actually see!

So, from now on, I'll be tempted to ask patients if they was queso or ranchero sauce with their pulse check, and salas with their blood pressure check!

Dialing long distance calls within the 903 area code region will not change. Callers will continue to dial "1" plus the area code, plus the seven digit number. Creation of the new area code will not affect rates or local calling areas. Calls that are local and long distance today will continue to be local and long distance after 10digit dialing goes into effect February 15, 2003. There will be no change in calls to 411 or 911 emergency services.



The West Nile Virus has now ing fever, headache, body aches been detected in Orange, and skin rashes. Less than 15 of those infected will develop more severe symptoms that included meningitis or encephalitis, an infection of the brain. West Nile virus has killed 18 people along the East Coast since it was first detected in New York in 1999. Last summer was the most severe so far, with 66 human infections and 9 deaths.

The first human case of West Nile virus this year was reported in early July in which three men in Louisiana were hospitalized. All lived in towns east of Baton Rouge.


