Plans Being Made For Photo Booth

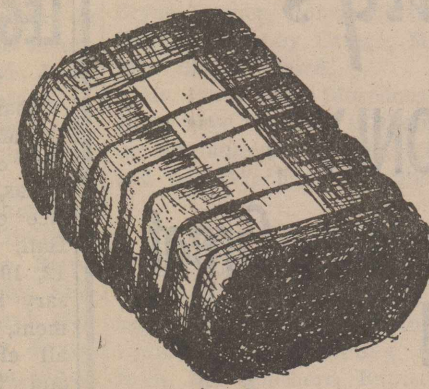
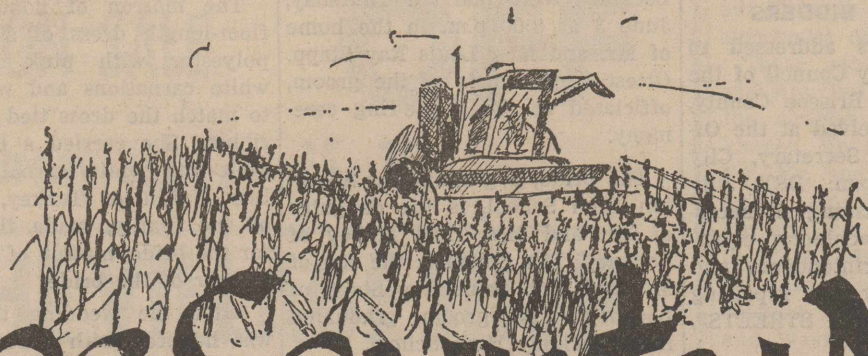

Movie To Premiere Here In July

Wiser, HB P. S. He was honest enough to return our twenty-nines!

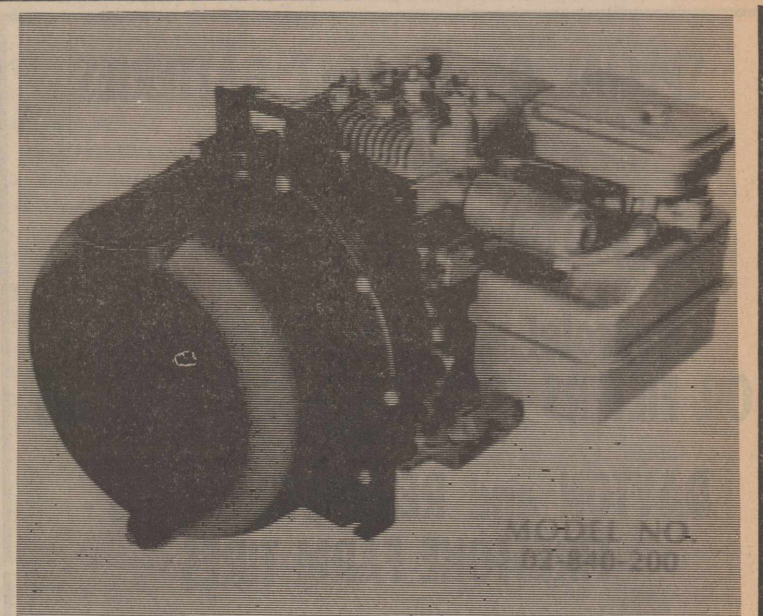

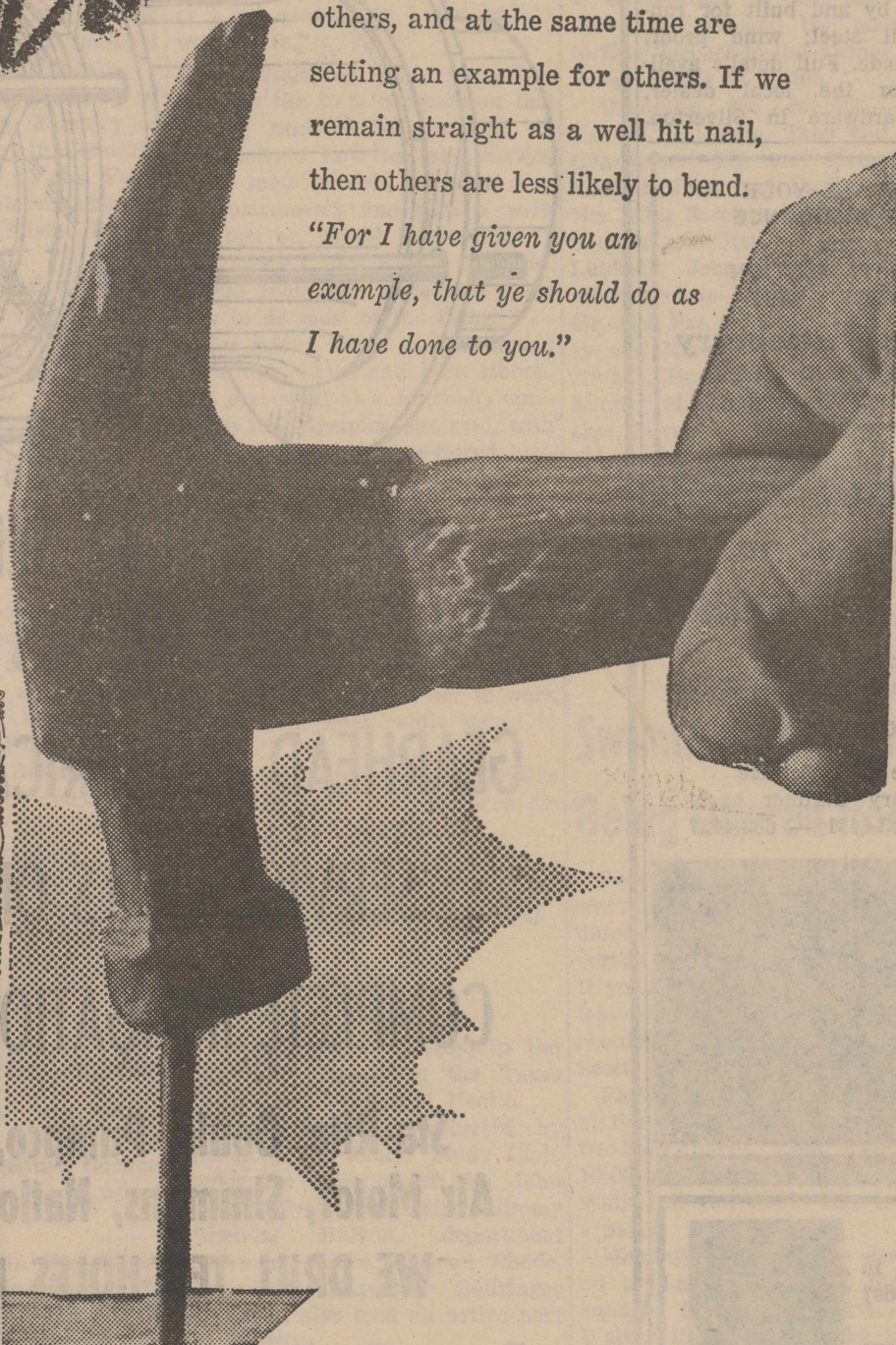


