## POULTRY EXHIBITS BIG FEATURE OF FAIR

The poultry building for the Haskell County Fair is being rapidly completed and will soon be ready for the largest showing of fine chickens, turkeys, ducks and geese ever held in Haskell County. In fact, there will be more turkeys in competition here than were shown at any one place last year in this section of the state. Several classes of chickens will be extremely large and the variety of varieties will be a surprise to the majority of visitors. The exhibition wire cages will give uniformly increasing the general appearance and at the same time afford each exhibitor a neat and attractive setting for his poultry.

Entries for this department close Tuesday Sept. 29th, and must be mailed not later than that date. The hall will be open Oct. 1st, to receive exhibits but no birds will be received for exhibition except those that have been entered with the manager and on which the entry fee has been paid.

The poultry department will be one of the best educational features of the fair and to receive the full benefit every farmer who has pure bred birds should enter their best either as singles or pens and have it judged by the American Standard of Perfection. ## MA FERGUSON'S NAME BARRERED TILL TRIAL

Sheriff W. C. Allen, County Judge R. E. Lee and County Clerk Emory M. Neefe, members of the Haskell County Election board were enjoined, in papers received Tuesday from certifying the name of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson to be on the ballot for Governor of Texas in the General Election in November.

The order prohibits them from certifying her name until after the outcome of an injunction suit filed by Chas. M. Dickson of Bexar County, to keep her name off the ticket. The case is to be heard Monday September 22, in Austin, before Judge George Calhoun of the Fifth Judicial District, who issued the restraining order.

The Haskell County Election board will not make up the ticket before next week and it is expected that the suit will be settled before the local board completes their work.

## LEE PIERSON WILL ERECT NEW BUILDING

Work was begun the first of the week on the new Lee Pierson building just north of the Haskell National Bank on Clark street. The building will be of brick and the construction and will be 37 by 80 feet divided into two store rooms.

Mr. Pierson is a believer in Haskell and the future of the town. Several years ago he erected the two story Pierson building on the north side of the square which has been a valuable piece of business property. Last year he purchased the McConnell property on the north west corner, which is also a two story building, well located, when the new building is completed it will make him three separate business buildings of two store rooms each on the ground floor. The other buildings have a number of desirable office rooms on the second floor.

## 6.65 INCHES RAIN DURING PAST WEEK

The entire Haskell country is thoroughly soaked from the big rains that have fallen during the past week. The precipitation amounted to 6.65 inches. The first rain came last Thursday night and Friday morning, amounting to 3.86 inches, followed this week by another Wednesday evening amounting to 2.79 inches, according to Judge P. D. Samiers, official weather man.

The heavy rains have no doubt injured the cotton crop considerably, but will be of great benefit to the stockman, as water is getting scarce in many parts of the county, and will insure good grass for winter pasture.

The farmers are anxious to see the weather in order to rather the cotton that is now open in the fields.

**Toll of Carelessness**

Figures recently compiled by the state of Oregon show that 50 per cent of its automobile accidents are caused by carelessness. Of 9,131 accidents reported from January 1 to June 29 last 3,437 are charged entirely to carelessness. Added to these may be included the following: speeding 184; failure to give right of way, 1381; worthless driving, 290; cutting corners, 372; double at intersections, 153; drifting while intoxicated, 123; failure to give signal, 290; driving on left side of street or highway, 94; improper parking, 79; reverse direction in middle of block, 49; passing to left of street,

care while discharging passengers, 31; intoxication, 23; jockeying on bridges 21; a total of 8480 accidents which might have been avoided, according to the report of the Secretary of State, had the driver been careful: It is probable that these Oregon figures would be a fair average for other states.

That too many automobile drivers "let the insurance company pay the bill" is responsible for many avoidable accidents. Let drivers remember that no insurance policy has yet been devised which will return the life of a person killed through an automobile driver's carelessness. Safety to life and property rests almost wholly in the hands of the automobile driver.

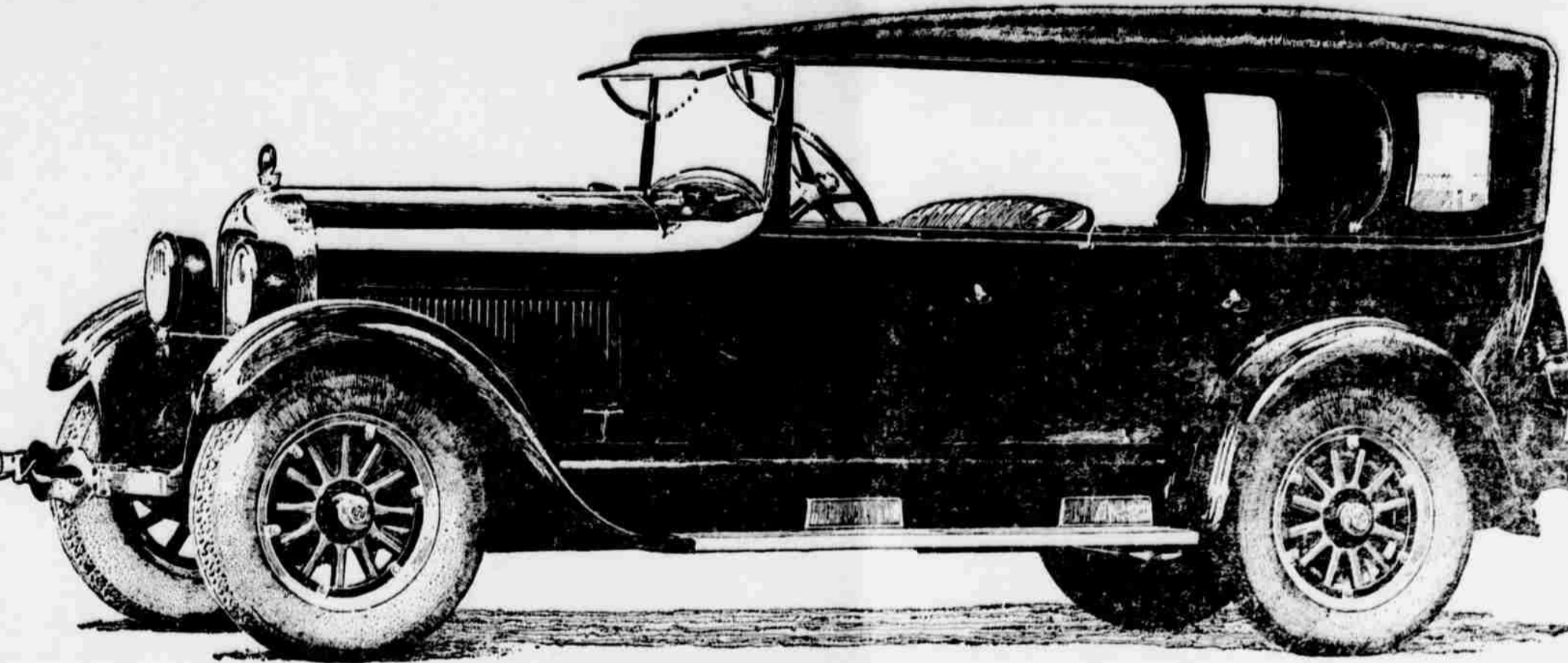

Textile Milling
Unsatisfactory conditions still prevail in the textile industry. During the month of July some of the mills were closed down, while others operated on a part-time basis. Smaller consumption of cotton, fewer active spindles, and reduced production were the outstanding features of the reports received. The July production of nine mills amounted to 1,040,256 pounds, as compared to 1,078,200 pounds in June and 1,230,704 pounds in July a year ago. These mills consumed 2,350 bales of cotton during July as against 2,450 in June and 2,084 in July, 1923.
The reports show that the unfilled orders on hand at the mills are increasing, and that signs of improvement in the demand for goods are beginning to appear.

The checking of an outbreak of this difficulty is largely a case of ascertaining the cause and removing it.
