Rampley Appointed As Coordinator

WALLS conform to one of three options: #ONE-6" walls with R-19* insulation, #TWO - tongue and grooved styrofoam sheathing, 4" walls and R-11* insulation, or #THREE - R-15* minimum insulation. Walls must include a vapor barrier of 6 mil. polyethylene or foil-backed sheetrock. Sill insulation or sill caulking (under bottom plate) is also required.

CEILING insulation must equal R-30*.

FLOORS (if pier and beam construction) must be insulated with R-13*. In slab floors choose between Option #1, rigid urethane or styrofoam (3/4 minimum thickness) from top of floor along the outside edge of the slab down to the brick ledge, or Option #2, vermiculite poured in the cavity between bricks and slab up to the top of
