Jimmy Myers and Dan Herrington were appointed to check into the expense and feasibility of securing mercury lights for the Wood Memorial Arena.

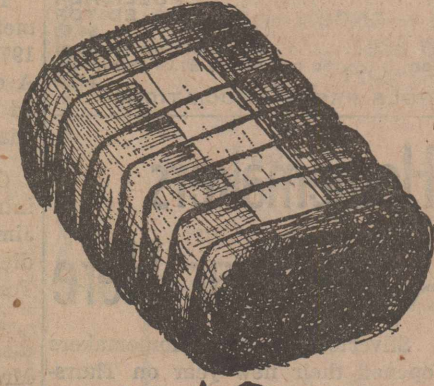
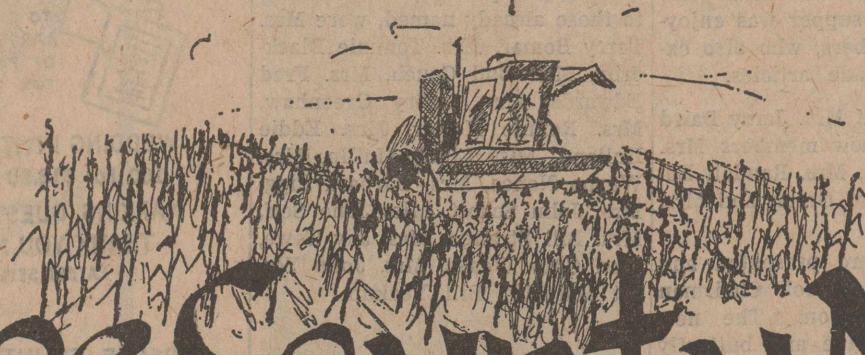
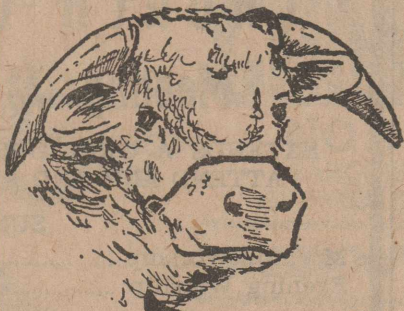
Members voted to donate to the Booster Club's welder project. G. W. Chappell and Fred Minyard were appointed to the Trophy Case Committee.

**One Injured In  
Auto Accident**

Dave Francis was injured when the automobile he was driving was in collision with another car driven by Mike Cornett about 6:30 p.m. Monday on Highway 86 in Silverton.

Francis was taken by Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview, where his mother, Mrs. John T. Francis, said Wednesday his condition was improving. His arm was fragmented just above the wrist and surgery was done on this Tuesday. He received a concussion, which his mother said they know is improving because his reflexes are getting better. He is still running a fever and there has been some internal bleeding in his knee.

His doctor was planning to X-ray the knee Wednesday to determine if surgery to repair torn ligaments was necessary. The surgery was tentatively scheduled for Thursday (today).

He is in Room 230 at Central Plains Hospital.

Mike Cornett was uninjured in the accident, as were the passengers in his car, his brother, Tad Cornett, and Kirk Durham. The boys, except Tad Cornett, are students in Silverton High School and were on their way home from football practice.

Ambulance attendants were Stan Fogerson, W. D. Rowell and Ted Kingery. Many other members of the local rescue team also helped in getting the car door open to remove Francis from the car without moving his body any more than was necessary. He was not pinned in the wreckage.

**Highly-Ranked  
Hart Takes  
Win From Owls**

The highly-ranked Hart Longhorns showed fans why they are listed in the state's top 10 Class A teams this season as they defeated the Owls 26-0 here last Friday night. The 'Horns hit the Owls with a balanced running and passing attack to extend the Owls' losing streak to 13 games.

"Our boys are trying so hard to win a game that they are forced into making mistakes," said Coach Weldon McCord. "These early games don't really mean so much except to the pride of the team, which wants a win badly. We still have a good chance in our district, if we just don't get too many injuries."

Hart's team is composed of players who appear of approximate equal size. They seem to have no very large or very small players, but are a stocky lot with speed to burn.

The Owls played some of their best defense of the season in holding the Longhorns to a scoreless first quarter. Most fans agreed that they looked much better than they had looked the previous week at Kress.

Co-captain Jack Robertson recovered a fumble for the Owls late in the first period.

Hart's first score came with 6:19 remaining to be played in the half. The kick for extra point was no good, and the Longhorns led 6-0. The second score of the game came after the Owls had made a first down on runs by Gary Younger and had come close on another on runs by Chief Davidson. They gambled and lost on fourth down, with the referees turning down their request for a measurement, and on first down, while the Owl spirit was down because of this and because of an injury to Senior Back Brent Bean, the Longhorns went all the way for a touchdown on a 55-yard pass and run with 2:50 still on the clock. The conversion run failed due to defense by Davidson and Brent Brannon, and the Longhorns led 12-0.

The 'Horns came back with a 15-yard touchdown run with :59 still showing on the first half clock. They added the running conversion, and led 20-0.

Hart opened the second half by taking the kickoff 75 yards for another touchdown. Their running conversion failed, and they held a 26-0 lead.

Danny Perkins recovered a Hart fumble, and just a few plays later, Jim Wilson recovered another. However, the Owls lost the ball via the fumble route two plays later.

Brent Brannon intercepted two Longhorn passes in the end zones. The Owls suffered one of their most serious setbacks of the season in the first half when Brent Bean went down with a knee injury. Bean has been playing very well, both on offense and defense this season, and when he was removed from the game with a deep knee bruise, the team's chances for success, especially on offense,

were moving an old heater and it fell on his toes.

The JV team also lost one of its best backs when Dave Francis was injured in an auto accident early this week. Francis will be out for the season.

The Junior High and Junior Varsity teams will host Claude beginning at 5:30 p.m. today. The concession stand will be open, and the Booster Club invites you to come to the games and eat with them. ### Drivers Reminded Of School Bus Laws

"This school year, as in the past, the School Bus Loading Laws confuse many drivers," states Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The Uniform Vehicle Code in Texas states that the driver of a vehicle, meeting or overtaking from either direction a school bus displaying red flashing warning lights that is in the process of loading or unloading passengers, shall stop until the school bus starts moving, the red lights are no longer flashing, or the bus driver directs motorists to proceed.

"Freeways and divided highways add to the drivers' confusion," Major Bell added. "If a bus is on an access road, only the traffic on the access road must stop. However, if the bus is on a divided highway and pedestrian traffic does not normally cross the median or barrier then only the traffic on the portion of the roadway occupied by the bus must stop."

It is most important that drivers observe the School Bus Loading Laws for the protection of the school children.

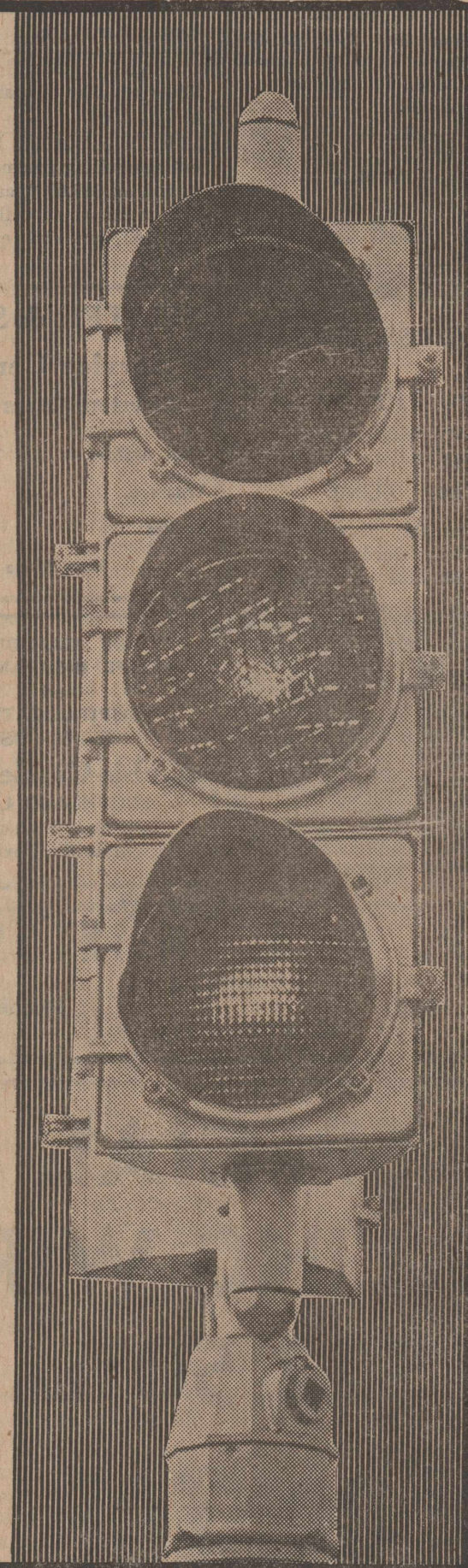

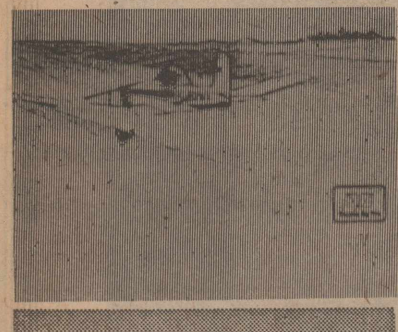

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**  
GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)**  
Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

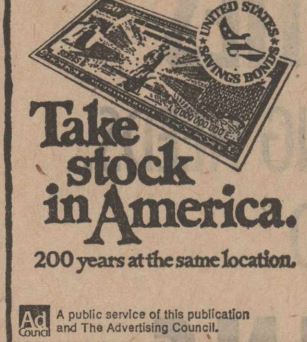

**NUMERO UNO EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 49)**  
Revocando Secciones 49-d and 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas, S.J.R. 49 enmienda Sección 49-c del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas para disponer a autorizar \$400 millones adicionales de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir a la aprobación de dos terceras partes de los miembros de cada cámara de la Legislatura para tales fines de desarrollo del agua que la Legislatura pueda prescribir.

La enmienda contiene prohibición específica contra el uso de fondos del estado para el desarrollo de recursos acuáticos del Rio Mississippi y también requiere que antes de que pueda encargarse de cualquier proyecto particular para el desarrollo de agua que requiere un gasto de mas de \$35 millones de producto de los bonos, debe de ser aprobado por resolución de la Legislatura.

La enmienda remueve el requerimiento constitucional que ciertas rentas deben de ser usadas para retirar bonos para el desarrollo de agua y el encarecimiento de la calidad de agua y remueve el limite constitucional de la tasa de interés en tales bonos.

La fraseología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es la siguiente: "La enmienda constitucional autorizando un incremento de \$400 millones de la cantidad de Bonos del Desarrollo de Agua en Tejas que podrán emitirse al ser aprobada por dos terceras partes de la Legislatura; emmendando y consolidando disposiciones de Secciones 49-c, 49-d, y 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas; y revocando Secciones 49-d y 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas."

**NUMERO DOS EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 99)**  
H.J.R. 99 propone una enmienda a la Constitución de Tejas para aumentar de \$100 millones hasta \$200 millones la cantidad principal agregada de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir y que están en circulación por el Texas Water Development Board para proveer donaciones y préstamos para la mejoría de la calidad de agua como establecido por la Legislatura. La fraseología de la enmienda propuesta como aparecerá en la boleta es la siguiente: "Una enmienda constitucional para incrementar desde \$100 millones hasta \$200 millones la cantidad de Bonos de Desarrollo de Agua en Tejas que podrán ser emitidos con el propósito de mejorar la calidad del agua."

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
