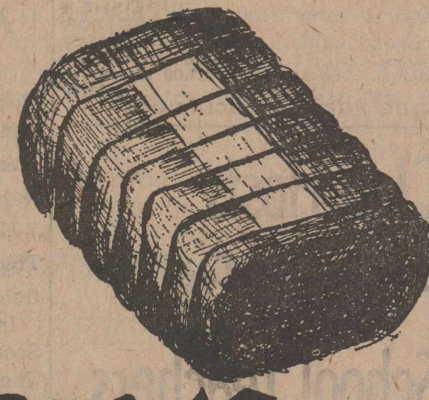
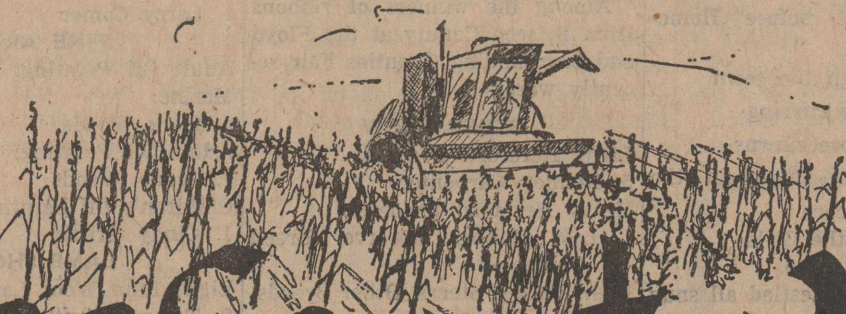
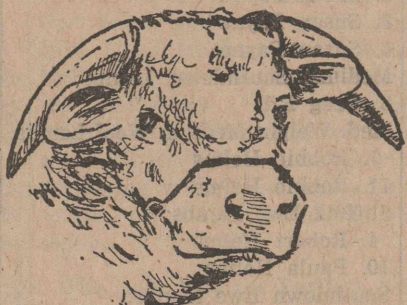

Owls Open District Here With Valley Friday Night

Silverton's Owls will begin District 2-B North Zone competition here Friday night by hosting the Valley Patriots at 8:00 p.m.

This will be the first game for the Owls in their new district.

This has also been designated as Silverton's Homecoming game, and the 1976 Football Queen is scheduled to be crowned at 7:30 p.m. Candidates selected by the football team are Lee Ann McMurry, senior; Debbie Storie, junior; Liz Brown, sophomore, and Traci Mayfield, freshman.

The Battle of the Classes will be a feature of the Pep Rally at 3:00 p.m. Friday in the school gym, and the Future Homemakers of America will be serving a Spaghetti Supper in the school cafeteria from 5:30 until 7:30 p.m.

The Booster Club will be operating the concession stand at the football field.

Friday night's action saw both the Owls and the Valley Patriots left on the short end of the scoring stick, the Owls losing 27-20 to Springlake-Earth, and the Patriots dropping a 30-12 decision to Sudan, last year's champion of District 2-B North Zone. So far this season, the Owls stand 0-4 and the Patriots are 1-3, and the two teams

not having played by one opponent in common, that being the Claude Mustangs, who defeated both.

Several changes are being made in the Owl lineup this week, some necessitated by replacement of injured players and others due to injured players being able to return to action. Springlake-Earth opened the ballgame last Friday night by taking the opening kickoff all the way back for a score, kicked the extra point, and led 7-0 with 11:44 still remaining to be played in the first quarter.

Brent Brannon took the S-E kickoff back to the S-E 20 and the Owls ran for a first down on the four. From there Gary Younger carried the first Owl touchdown. The running conversion failed, and the Wolverines held a 7-6

advantage over the Owls.

On the Wolverines' next possession, the Owl defense held, and S-E punted into the end zone. On third down, the Owls lost the ball via the fumble route. The teams traded the ball back and forth a couple of times, and Gary Turner recovered a Wolverine fumble for the Owls.

The next touchdown was scored by Springlake-Earth with 9:54 remaining in the fourth quarter on about a 10-yard run. The running conversion was good and the Owls were in the hole 27-6.

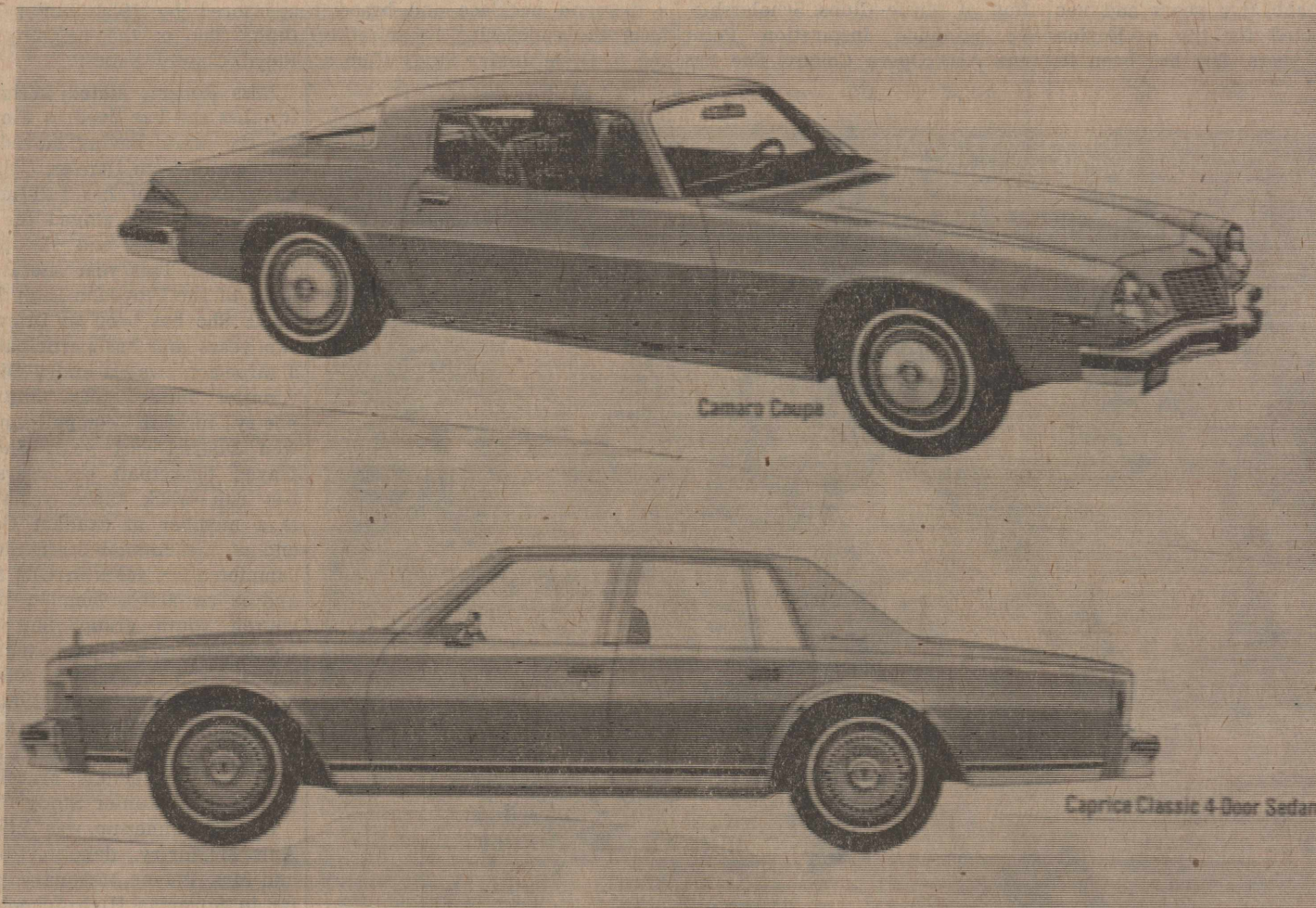

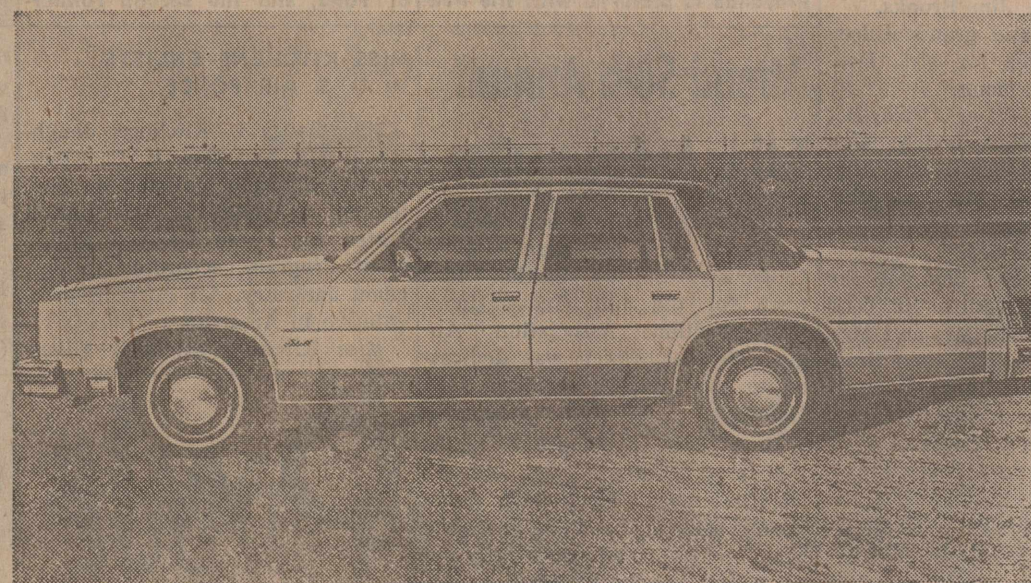

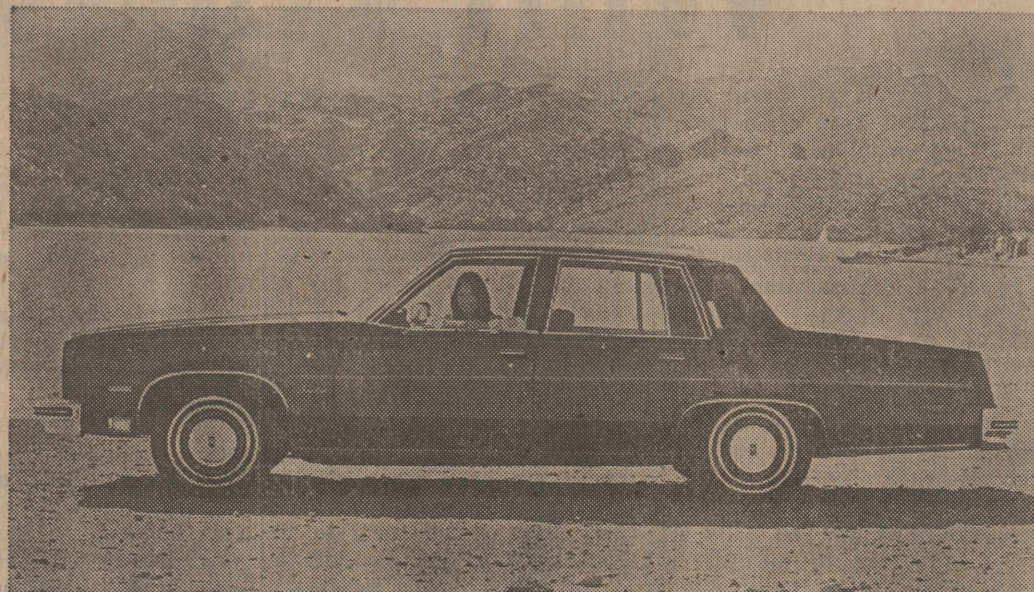

Junior Varsity Defeats Patriots

The Junior Varsity Owls dominated their game with the Valley Patriots last Thursday evening and brought home a 6-0 victory. Valley kicked off to the Owls, and Kirk Durham carried to the

Four minutes were remaining in the first quarter, and so far only the Owls had had possession of the ball.

The Owls held the Patriots, who punted out to the 4 on fourth down. Silverton opened a nice drive which carried to the 36 before the ball went over on downs. Again the Owls held with good defense by Mitchell Roehr and Hill, and Valley punted to the 40. Runs by McJimsey and McPherson were good for a first down, but on the next series, Valley intercepted the pitchout and took over on the 47. On fourth down, the Patriots fak-

ed a punt, were stopped by the Owls and Silverton took over at the 48. Rushes by Hill and a pass by Paul Brannon to the 20 gave the Owls a fourth-and-five situation. The ball went over on downs on the 18.

The Patriots punted on fourth down after good defense by Nicky McJimsey and Doug McJimsey. Diji Couch rushed to the 33 for Silverton, but the half ended on this drive.

In the third quarter, Bobby McPherson ended a Patriot drive by recovering a fumble on the 34. Hill and McJimsey rushed for the Owls to the 5-yard line, where the Patriot defense held and the ball went over on downs.

Mike Cornett tackled the Patriot ball carrier on third down, and needing 12 yards for a first down, Valley punted on fourth down. Hill and Doug McJimsey carried to the one-yard line, where the ball went over on downs. The next Patriot punt carried to the Valley 30, and the Owls rushed to the 25. A Patriot fumble was recovered by Brannon, but the Owls saw the ball go over on downs at the Valley 20.

Wayne Reed made a quick tackle on first down for a Valley loss of nine yards, and on third down Doug McJimsey intercepted a pass and ran for an Owl touchdown which was called back due to a clipping penalty. 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
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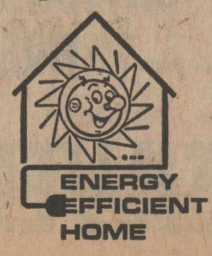

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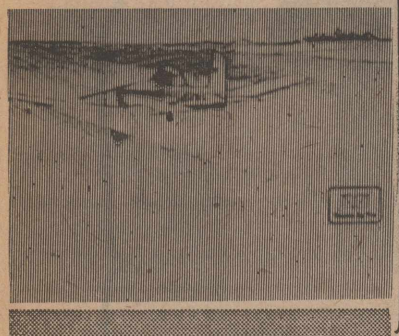
