SPECIAL AWARDS

The Outstanding FHA'er Award, which was received by Jo Jarrett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Jarrett, is based on her contribution to the FHA organization and the benefits she has received from FHA. She is a junior student in Silverton High School and is active in a variety of school activities.

Susan Northcutt, winner of the Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow award, is the daughter of Mrs. Larry Jarrett of Silverton and Pat L. Northcutt of Dalhart. A senior in Silverton High School, she has also been active in a wide range of school activities.

She won the honor by scoring high in a written knowledge and attitude examination administered to high school seniors here and throughout the country December 2. The Family Leader received a certificate from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living and becomes eligible for state and national honors.

From the ranks of all school winners in the state, a State Family Leader of Tomorrow is selected through judging centered on test performance and receives a \$1,500 college scholarship. The second - ranking student in the state will receive a \$500 scholarship. Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation will present "The Annals of America," a 20-volume reference work, to the state winner's school.

Representing every state and the District of Columbia, the 51 Betty Crocker Family Leaders of Tomorrow, together with their faculty advisors, will gather in Washington, D. C., in April for an expense-paid educational tour of the capital city. During the tour, personal observations and interviews are conducted to select the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, who receives a \$5,000 college scholarship. Second, third and fourth place national winners receive scholarships increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

The test, personal observations and interviews are all prepared and conducted by Science Research Associates of Chicago.

 Young Farmer for '75**

Bill Rampy, chapter advisor for the Silvertown Young Farmers, presented the Outstanding Young Farmer Award to Jimmy Myers at the Twelfth Annual Awards Banquet held Saturday, February 21 in the Silvertown School Cafeteria. Myers farms eight miles southeast of Silvertown, and as winner of the coveted chapter award, will compete for the Area I Outstanding Young Farmer Award at the Area I Young Farmers Convention to be held in Lubbock next September.

The Agribusinessman Award went to Steve Barbour, co-owner-operator with his father, of Silvertown LP Gas, Inc. G. W. Chappell captured the Outstanding Associate Member Award. Chappell is a charter member of the Silvertown Young Farmers, and is an active member and supporter of the club. Outstanding Service Award went to Wayland Fitzgerald, who

has always assisted and supported the Young Farmer organization. Jeff Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. Troy Jones, received the Outstanding Future Farmer of America 1975-76 Award. Jones is an active member of Silvertown FFA, holds an Area FFA office, and is junior advisor for the local chapter. Receiving plaques as the Outstanding 4-H Girl and Boy were Jo Jarrett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Jarrett, and Thomas Perkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lee Perkins.

The Young Homemakers presented plaques of "appreciation and support" to Mayor and Mrs. Fred Mercer, L. O. A. Junior Study Club, Silvertown Young Farmers, Tobe Riddell, Cletus Grady and Hester & Sons Gulf. Becky Francis, a senior in Silvertown High School and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alvie Francis, was selected as the Little Sister of the Silvertown Young Homemakers. She will represent the Silvertown chapter at the Area I Convention and Banquet in Lubbock next September. Presenting the awards for the Young Homemakers was Miss Kathy King, chapter advisor.

Master of ceremonies was G. W. Chappell. The invocation was given by Rev. Freddie Stice. Mrs. Fred Minyard and Jimmy Myers, presidents of the Young Homemakers and Young Farmers, gave progress reports. State Senator Ray Farabee, Wichita Falls, was guest speaker for the occasion. Senator Farabee's 29 counties make up the 30th Senatorial District of Texas. The main topic of Senator Farabee's speech was on rural health care. In December 1975, there were 23 counties, 53,000 population, which did not have a doctor. "Without Doctors, How Do They Live?" Twenty or thirty years ago all counties had at least one doctor and one dentist, and not all that long ago, dentists were the local barbers. In 1954 the Texas Constitution was amended to support and have rural Texas medical education. In 1973, Texas passed and funded the Texas Rural Medical Act with \$130,000. Now the board of rural people will interview people who are interested and want to go to medical school and who cannot afford to. The board has a \$3,600 contract for the ones who need financial assistance. For each year these people practice in rural areas following the completion of their medical schooling, a percentage of the debt will be credited. There is also the Fifth Pathway Program, where people who cannot get into medical school in the USA might be able to get into medical school in another country. H. S. A. is an organization for development of health resources in areas where they were not. There is Bill 635, better known as the Medical Malpractice Bill, which may help to improve some problems. Hopefully, Texas won't find problems that other states have, such as doctors on strike due to malpractice insurance rates, etc. Senator Farabee summarized
