Services were held Sunday at 2:30 at the First Baptist Church in Lockney with Rev. John Jenkins, officiating.

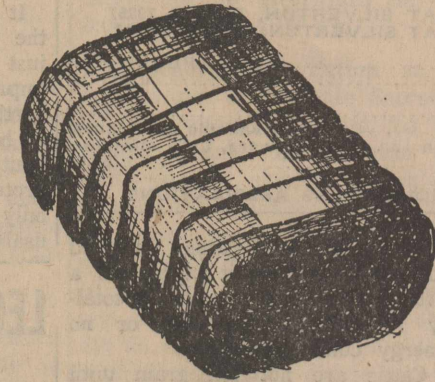
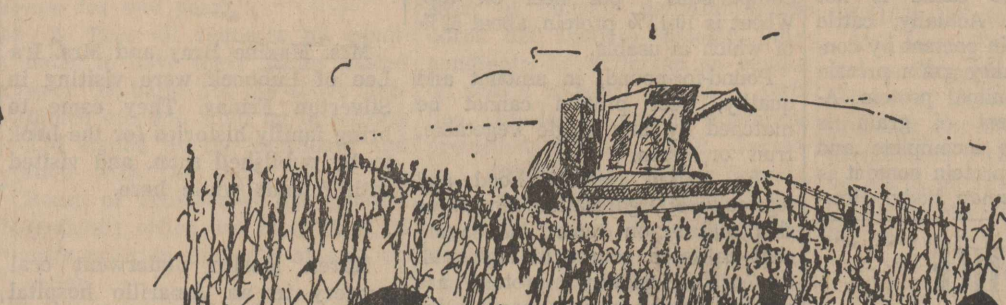
Born in Lone Oak February 1, 1909, Payne had lived in Lockney for the past 15 years.

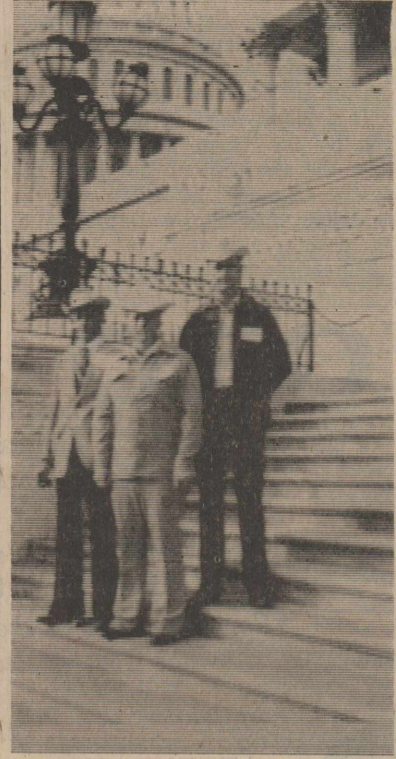

Two From Silverton Were Part Of Washington Fly-In

The Texas Farmers Union today announced that a group of Texas farmers and ranchers were part of a National Farmers Union Fly-In to lobby Congress and the U. S. Department of Agriculture for major action to improve farm prices February 23-26.

Jimmy Myers and Calvin Shelton, both of Silverton, were among the group in the nation's capital in Washington, D. C.

According to Farmers Union President Jay Naman, the Texans were part of about 200 farmers from three states who asked for a meeting with Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz.

"These rural lobbyists were seeking a firm positive commitment from Secretary Butz on U. S. agricultural export policy and the outlook for farm policies and prices for the remainder of 1976," Naman said.

The state farm leader also noted that the Farmers Union members were on the Hill lobbying Congress for legislation to increase the estate tax exemption and for the Young Farmer Homestead Act...

Naman pointed out that farmers are "deeply concerned with the disastrous decline in farm prices we have been experiencing; wheat for example, has slipped to 71 percent of parity which is far below the farmer's production costs."

The Texans left Monday morning by plane and returned Thursday. They were joined in the Nation's capital by Farmers Union delegations from South Dakota and Indiana.

While in Washington, they visited with numerous congressmen from around the Nation in addition to the Texas Congressional delegation.

"Nobody can tell the farmer's story better than farmers themselves. We hope that this group was able to convince Congress and Secretary Butz that immediate action is necessary to avoid a disastrous collapse in farm income," Naman concluded.

Beef's Role In Feeding A Hungry World

With lives at stake, decisions had better be based on facts... not slogans. Its a sad fact... but there are today hundreds of millions of people in the world whose food intake is at the starvation level. These people must be fed.

However, faulty information, misleading statistics and simplistic slogans have convinced some people that eating and producing less beef in this country will somehow mean more food for the rest of the world. At the center of this controversy is grain — principally corn and sorghum — which is used to feed cattle.

OVERLOOKED FACTS

Critics of beef production overlook the fact that 75% of all feed consumed by cattle is inedible by humans. Cattle are ruminants (animals with four stomachs). That means they can produce high quality protein for human consumption from otherwise unusable resources such as grass, straw, husks, and other fibrous and pulpy materials. In fact, the ruminant is a walking protein factory.

The majority of a steer's life is spent on land that cannot grow food for humans — nearly 900 million acres in the United States alone. Were it not for ruminants like cattle, millions of acres of land might not be useful for producing any sort of food. That is a luxury we cannot afford. In a sense,

because this land cannot be used for anything else, it represents a "found" resource. One that is totally renewable with little or no energy consumption.

Cattle are not fed grain until they have achieved more than 3/4 of their final market weight. And despite what you may have heard, over their entire lifespan cattle consume no more than three lbs. of grain for each pound of live weight. Not 8 — Not 15 — Not 21 — THREE. Also, not all cattle are fed grain. In 1974 more than 33% of slaughtered cattle were "grass-fed" and this percentage will probably increase in years to come.

WHY GRAIN?

Beef can be produced without the use of any grain and without lessening the nutritional value of the product. Then why use grain at all?

Grain feeding speeds up production thereby increasing the quality of beef available. And consumer demand has been for grain-fed beef because it is more flavorful and palatable than non-grain beef.

Economics is also an important factor here. For many years there was a surplus of feed grains in this country enabling cattle to be grain-fed profitably. But as grain prices have increased dramatically over the past year or so, the cattle feeder finds it difficult to break even let alone make a profit.

Therefore, like the automobile industry, the cattle industry is being forced by economic conditions to reappraise its production methods. Cattle are being kept on grass longer, coming to feedlots at heavier weights and staying for shorter periods. As this trend continues, total grain usage by the

cattle industry could be reduced by one-third or more.

NOTHING BEATS BEEF

It must be remembered that the grain fed to cattle is not just "consumed". Actually, cattle improve the protein content by converting lower quality grain protein to high quality animal protein. About eight percent of grain is protein, but it is incomplete and only 50% of the protein content is usable by the human body. How-

ever, 17% of the retail weight of beef is protein, of which 80% is usable. Even if wheat were grown in place of the feedgrain, protein comparisons put beef on top. Wheat is 10-12% protein, about 52% of which is usable.

Pound-for-pound, in amount and quality, beef protein cannot be matched by any single vegetable, fruit or grain.

The United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization recognizes this and is on record as saying that cattle, a source of high-quality, assured-quantity protein, are needed by the world's peoples for adequate nutrition as well as maximum land usage. This is true for both industrialized and developing nations.

THE GOAL

The world needs more food. That is the goal. That means more beef and other animal proteins as well as grain, vegetables and other foods. Cutting back in any of these areas is counter-productive.

Product research and improved meat handling techniques will increase the efficiency of the distribution system. Shorter feeding periods for cattle will free more grain for human use. Genetic research will result in improved cat-

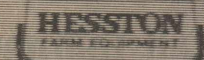

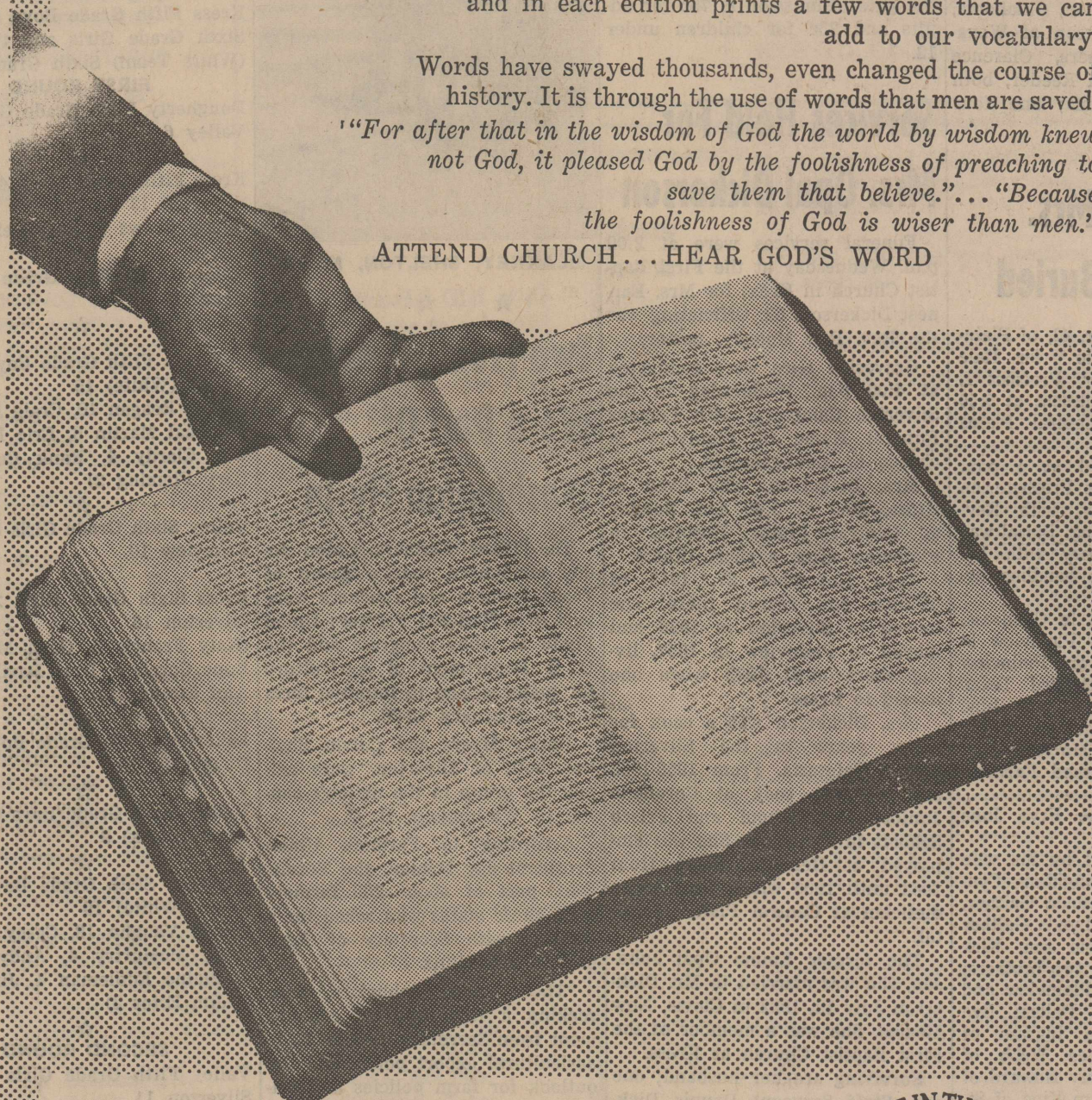


