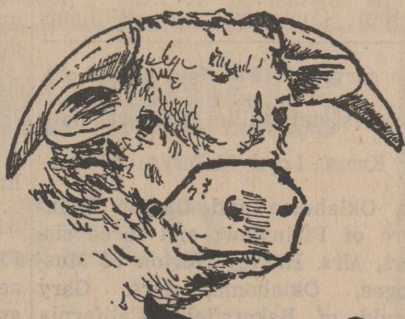

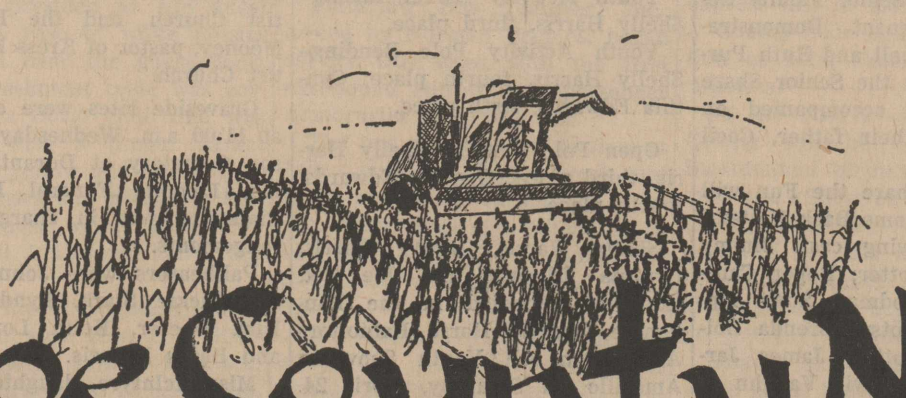

## Voters Must Bring Blue Registration Slip

It is very important that you bring your blue voter registration certificate with you when you come to vote Saturday, May 1, in the Democratic and Republican Primaries. If you do not bring your registration certificate with you to your voting place, it will be necessary for you to fill out an affidavit before you can vote.

Voting places in the Democratic Primary will be: Precinct One at the City Hall in Silverton; Precinct Two at the City Hall in

Quitaque; Precinct Three at the Pioneer Room at First State Bank; Precinct Four at the PCA community room in Silverton and at the San Jacinto community building.

One Republican voting place will be open in Briscoe County, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Williams, 201 North Loretta in Silverton.

The polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

On both ballots, there will be the matter of the election of Presidential preference candidates. On the Republican ballot, there are four candidates for Gerald Ford and four candidates for Ronald Reagan. Each voter has four votes to cast for these candidates, and any combination of votes may be cast.

On the ballot in the Democratic Primary, there are three delegates each for George Wallace, Jimmy Carter and Lloyd Bentsen. Each voter has three votes to cast in any combination for these candidates.

The Republican ballot also contains several public opinion questions.

Races of local interest include the race for Sheriff of Briscoe County, in which three Silverton residents have actively campaigned for the seat which will be vacated by Sheriff Vinson Smith on January 1, 1977. The candidates are Bill Boling, Willard Vardell and J. L. Williams.

There are also two Commissioner races in Briscoe County. In Precinct One, Incumbent Commissioner Shafe Weaver is being challenged by Glen Lindsey. In Precinct Three, Wayland Fitzgerald and Beryl Long are running for the Commissioner's seat to be vacated January 1, 1977 by Bill Boling, who is a candidate for Sheriff.

A large turnout of voters is expected.

## Precinct Three To Have Convention

The Democratic Convention in Briscoe County Precinct Three will be held at 3:00 p.m. Saturday, May 1, in the Pioneer Room at First State Bank for the purpose of electing 12 delegates from the Precinct to the Briscoe County Convention to be held the following Saturday.

You must have voted before you are eligible to attend your Precinct Convention.

There is a write-in election for Precinct Chairman in Precinct Three, and a group of citizens interested in making the job of tabulating the votes a little easier have suggested Jack Sutton as a candidate for this office. Sutton has agreed to serve if elected.

## IMMUNIZATION CLINIC TO BE HELD HERE MAY 7

An immunization clinic offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases will be held from 1:00 until 3:00 p.m. Friday, May 7, in the Silverton Schools.

Protection is against polio, lock jaw, diphtheria, whooping cough, measles and rubella. There will be no charge because this is held under the sponsorship of the Texas Department of Health Resources.

## Silverton Scheduled For DDD May 15

Installation of central office equipment is going so well that General Telephone Company's Division Manager, J. H. Davis of Memphis, announced this week that the cutover to Direct Distance Dialing would be at 1:00 p.m. Saturday, May 15, rather than on June 5, as previously announced.

"We have been able to move up the cut-over date because of unusually good delivery service on the equipment and supplies we were needing," Davis said.

An underground toll cable is being placed between Silverton and Quitaque where it will inter-

connect with the Quitaque-Turkey-Memphis underground toll network. The open-wire pole line between Silverton and Ralls where it interconnects with the Ralls-Lubbock toll network will be removed after conversion to DDD operation on May 15.

DDD and operator service will then be provided from General Telephone's Memphis office.

Toll service reliability should be greatly enhanced since all long distance calls will be via underground facilities through Memphis and Amarillo to world-wide points after conversion to DDD, Davis said.

## Recreation Facilities Open Saturday At Lake Mackenzie

Recreation facilities at Lake Mackenzie will open Saturday, May 1, for fishing from the banks, hiking and camping, according to directors of the Mackenzie Water Authority.

Plenty of good camping sites will be available, some with tables and canopies. More tables, covers and grills are to be built as soon as funds become available.

Twenty-eight electric hookups for motor homes and travel trailers have been provided. Rest rooms are available on each side of the lake; also trash barrels are located at convenient points.

Entrance to the lake is at the northeast corner, off FM 207 between Silverton and Claude. All permits will be available at the new ticket office at the gate entrance.

At the last board meeting, the following charges for permits were established: daily permits good Sunday through Thursday, per person over 12 years of age, \$1.00; 12 years old and under, no charge. Season permits for Friday and Saturday, \$1.50.

For camping, an additional charge of \$1.00 per family for either a tent or pickup with top cover will be made. For travel trailers or motor homes without refrigerated air conditioning, a daily charge of \$3.00 will be made for hookups; with refrigerated air conditioning, \$5.00 per day.

No water supply is available at present at the lake. Drinking and camp water must be brought to the lake. Also, all food must be brought from the outside since there are no concessions on the grounds.

Recent rains have caused an 8-inch increase in the water level, which stood at 42 feet at the dam until Monday night when heavy rains were received in the area. As of Tuesday, the water was still coming into the lake.

No boats or other floating devices will be allowed at this time because the water level was not up to the boat ramp at the time the Mackenzie Board met and drew up the rules under which the lake will be operated.

Fishing will be restricted to bank fishing with only one rod or pole per person, no throw lines or trot lines allowed. Fishing should be good since a number of channel cat, trout, black bass and crappie have been stocked during the past two and one-half years.

Last sampling of the fish by the wardens included a 5-pound black bass. This spring 300,000 small walleyes were stocked in the lake.

Fees collected will be used for recreation and improvements at the lake. No tax or bond money is available for recreational purposes.

In conjunction with the opening of the lake, the Silverton Volunteer Fire Department and the Silverton Merchants Association will sponsor a Fishing Rodeo. Individuals entering the rodeo will be required to register at the City Hall in Silverton prior to weighing in their fish. Registration time will be from 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Friday, and the deadline Saturday for registration will be 10:00 a.m.

When you register for the contest, remember that you will be asked your name, age and fishing license number.

Prizes will be awarded in three categories: catfish (all varieties), bass and trout. These prizes will be awarded for the largest in each class, by weight. Prizes awarded will be \$75.00, first place; \$50.00, second place; \$25.00, third place.

There will also be three prizes awarded for children twelve and under. These will be for any type fish caught by the children, by weight, and will be \$25.00 for first place; \$15.00 for second place, and \$10.00 for third place.

Weigh-in for each contestant will be at the same location as the registration. The contest will be for one day only, Saturday, May 1, and will end at 9:00 o'clock that evening.

## Mayfield To Represent SHS At Regional Meet

Dayne Mayfield, a junior in Silverton High School and son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wayne Mayfield, was the only Owl to qualify for Regional competition at the District 2-A track meet held at Shamrock last Thursday.

Mayfield won first place in the Discus with a throw of 141'10" and second in the Shot with a put of 47'7 1/2". He is eligible to compete in Lubbock this weekend in both events.

The Shot will be put beginning at 12:30 p.m. Friday, and the Discus throw will begin at 9:30 a.m. Saturday.

The honor student who was recently elected to serve next year as president of the Student Council, has not competed in the Shot this year because during football he suffered a broken bone in his right hand which went undetected and did not heal properly. His doctor advised the athlete not to compete this year. Instead, he has concentrated his efforts in the Discus throw and has won first place in all of the meets he entered with the exception of the Springlake-Earth meet where he did less than his best due to being ill that day.

His best distance ever in competition in the Discus was a throw of 170'7" in a meet in Amarillo several weeks ago. The only time he has put the Shot in competition this year earned him second place in the District.

Last season, Mayfield earned seven first places and a second place in the Discus, and three firsts, three seconds and a fourth in the Shot. He won the District 2-A title with 149'10" in the Discus and 51'4 3/4" in the Shot. He earned first in the Discus at Regional and fourth in the Shot, and threw the Discus 156'4" to win the State Discus title in Austin. His best distance in the Discus prior to the State Meet had been a throw of 154'10" in competition that season.

Mayfield is a two-sport letterman, having earned a berth on the All-District 2-A football team this year. He is serving as president of the FFA this year also.

Protecting the currency of the United States from counterfeiting is the responsibility of the U. S. Treasury Department. Its agents must be constantly vigilant, because any successful counterfeiting operation could seriously hinder commerce of the country.  
 Often the trail to a counterfeiter begins with an alert bank teller, or others in the bank who daily handle currency. Some experienced bank personnel can immediately tell by the "feel" of a bank note that it is counterfeit, no matter how good the engraving or printing job.  
 Once alerted by the bank that counterfeit bills are being circulated, trained Treasury agents have been amazingly successful tracking down counterfeiters. As a result, the country's currency has never been placed in serious jeopardy by bogus bills.  
 The U. S. has never taken kindly to those who would counterfeit its money. At one time, counterfeiting, or passing counterfeits, was declared "a felony punishable without benefit of clergy" . . . a legal maldiction reserved for only the more heinous crimes.

a dead litter of forage sorghum or grain sorghum. Shred the crop prior to frost to a height of six to ten inches. Leave all the cut stubble on the land. The dead litter crop should be protected from grazing. Mulching may be used in the place of a dead litter. If mulch material is used it should be applied at a rate of 2½ tons per acre for residues and three tons per acre for cotton burrs.

The seeding of the grass should be drilled or broadcast into the existing stubble by any feasible method to insure good distribution of the seed. All seeding rates should be met or exceeded using good viable seed. The grass should be seeded at the appropriate time recommended.

Newly seeded areas will be deferred the first growing season following planting and into subsequent years as needed to insure stand establishment.

For best results weeds should be controlled by shredding or by an approved chemical.

For recommended seeding rates and time of planting contact the Soil Conservation Service.

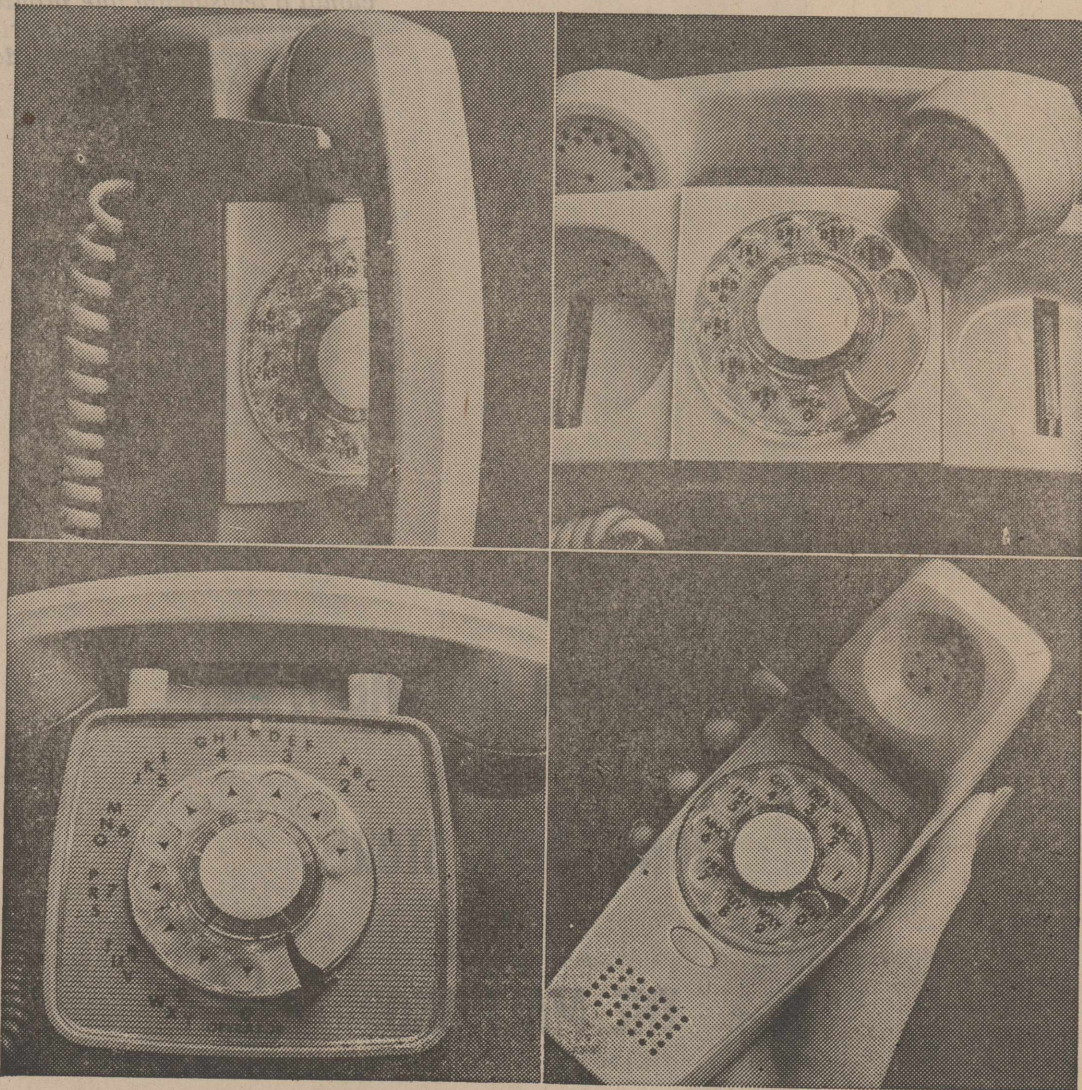

### Applications Still Being Taken For Transportation Assn.

Applications for Federal grants providing transportation assistance for elderly and handicapped citizens are still being taken by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT) reported Lewis H. White, district engineer in Childress.

The grants are extended by the Federal Government in the form of capital assistance grants for buying transportation vehicles such as small buses and do not include funds to cover operating costs.

"These grants were created to fill the transportation needs of this particular group of citizens because they have no dependable way of getting around to take care of their needs," said White.

The Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended, contains provisions for 80-20 matching grants to private non-profit organizations and public bodies.

"These 80-20 matching grants require that the local organization pay 20 percent of the cost of the buses with the Federal Government paying the other 80 percent," explained White.

One requirement of the Act is that the transportation service must carry the elderly or handicapped to or from a city of 5,000 population or greater.

"An organization such as a local civic club might organize this transportation service in a rural area and serve one or more counties," said White, "but the service would have to take this group of citizens to and from a city of 5,000 population or larger."

White stated that the organization or public agency could also operate in a town of 5,000 or over population and also serve rural citizens likewise, transporting citizens to and from that city.

The DHT has been designated by Governor Dolph Briscoe as the contracting and managing agency for the program.

The filing deadline for applications filed with the DHT is July 1, 1976.

Texas' Federal allocation for fiscal year 1976 is \$1,046,000.

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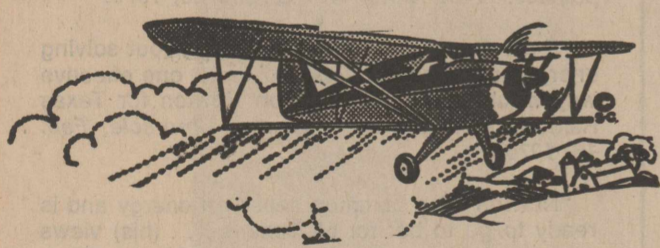

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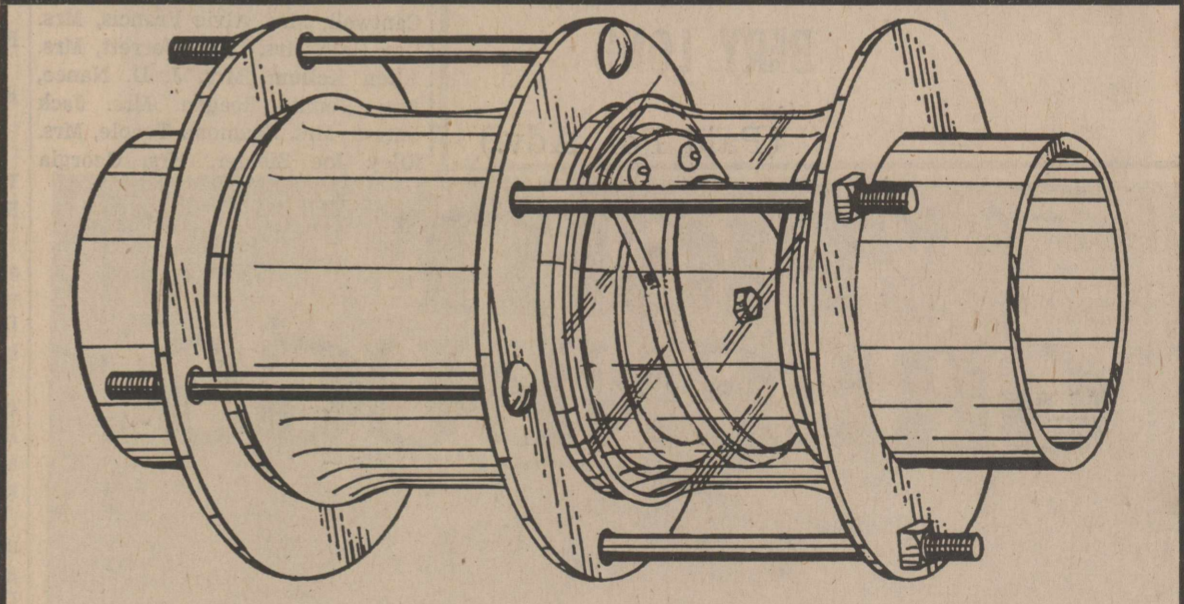
