

## Young Woman Injured In Accident

Mrs. Martha Ann Tompkins, 24, was injured in a one-car rollover on Highway 207 just south of the entrance to Lake Mackenzie about 3:15 p.m. Tuesday. She apparently lost control of the car, in which she was driving alone, and it rolled about three times, landing upside down against the shoulder bluff.

Lake Manager and Mrs. Jim Green discovered the accident as they were enroute to Silverton, after having seen the little yellow Vega pass the lake entrance.

Mrs. Tompkins, the former Ann Rucker, a former resident of both Silverton and Quitaque, was enroute, to Quitaque to visit her grandmother. She received head and neck injuries in the accident, and was taken by the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview and transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. She was placed in surgical intensive care prior to undergoing surgery for a broken neck. Her father, Bill Rucker of Canyon, who was working at Tahoka at the time of the accident, arrived at the hospital soon after she was placed in intensive care.

The report from Methodist Hospital Wednesday about noon was that the girl was in semi-conscious condition, that she might possibly have to have some further surgery in the area of her neck, and that doctors now believe she was not as seriously injured as it was first suspected.

Mrs. Tompkins is also the daughter of the late Estelle Rucker Kitchens. She is a niece of Mrs. Glenn Jones of Silverton and the granddaughter of Mrs. C. T. Rucker of Quitaque.

## Mrs. Turner Injured In Accident Last Week

Mrs. Billy (Juanell) Turner was injured about 12:45 p.m. Wednesday, November 10, when she reportedly attempted to open the door of a cotton stripper being operated by her husband to tell him that the basket, which was being dumped into a trailer, was about to come in contact with highline wires.

The basket touched the electrical line, and Mrs. Turner was knocked to the ground by the electrical shock she received.

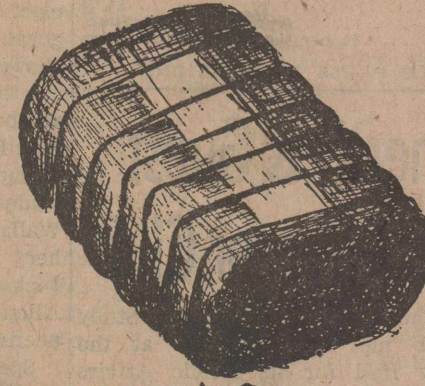
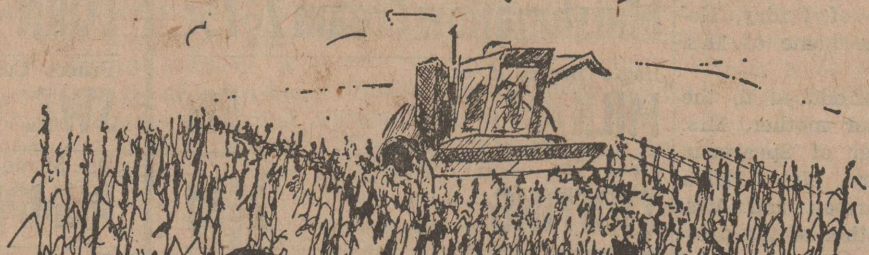
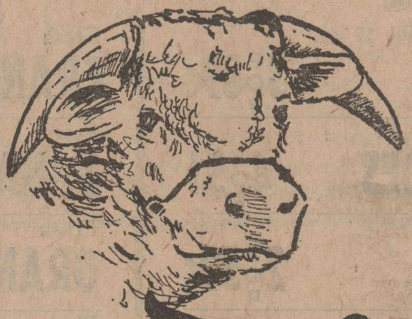
A fire was knocked off the stripper and set ablaze.

Mrs. Turner underwent surgery Monday. She is reported to be recovering as well as possible from the effects of the electric shock and resulting burns.

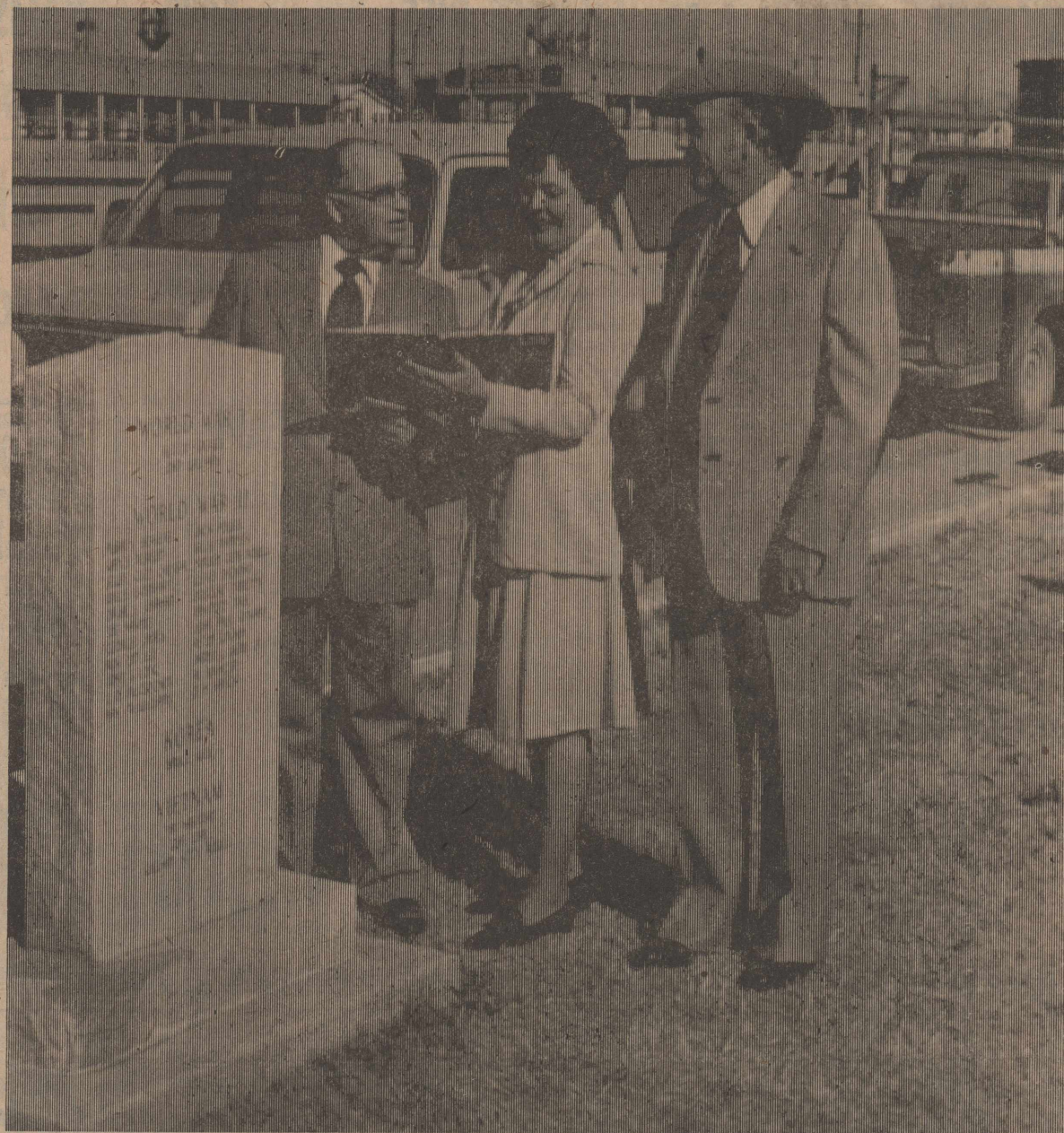

## Memorial Dedicated on Eve of Veterans Day

The north lawn of the Briscoe County court house was crowded with area residents and students Wednesday afternoon, November 10, for the dedication of a monument in memory of Briscoe County men who served their country and those who gave their lives for it.

The marker, made possible through efforts of the Century of Progress Study Club and by the donations to the Flag Wavers' Page, is a marble replica of Arlington National Cemetery markers, bearing the names of the county's war dead.

The ceremony was brief, with Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ, acting as master of ceremonies. Silverton Mayor Fred W. Mercer welcomed those present and complimented the club on this project. Earl Cantwell offered a prayer, and introduced Mrs. Charles Wayne Mayfield, club president, who made the dedication speech and presented a wreath to Veterans of Foreign Wars Post Commander Fred Strange, who placed it on the monument and saluted. The Silverton High School choir sang "This Is My Country."



Arthritis is often called "everybody's disease." It affects every one of us in some way, directly or

indirectly, physically or economically. Yet most people have only hazy ideas—and often incorrect ideas—of what it's all about.

The result is that people become crippled unnecessarily, and stay crippled unnecessarily. They don't understand that arthritis is never hopeless. They don't seek and follow the treatment which

can prevent disability in the first place or reduce it after it has happened.

The total impact of arthritis is truly calamitous.

Arthritis is many diseases, some mild, some are devastating. It can and does occur at all ages, from infancy on. Almost everyone if he lives long enough, will develop some arthritis. 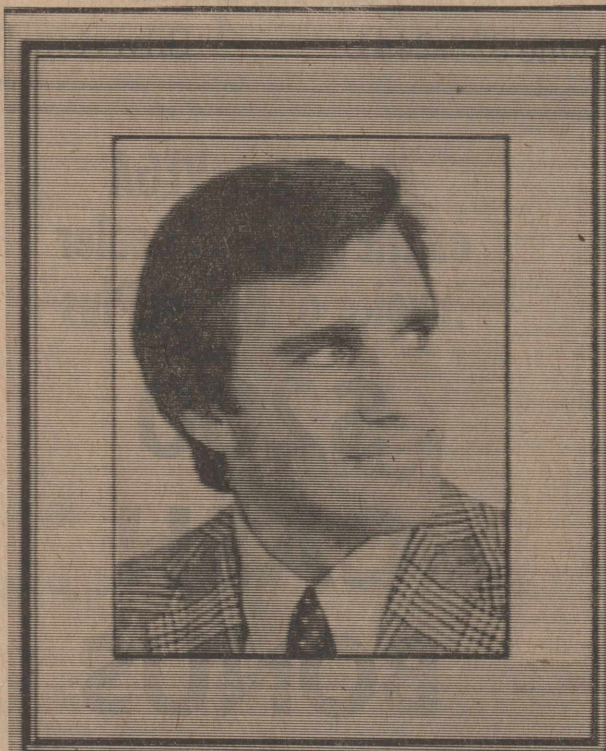

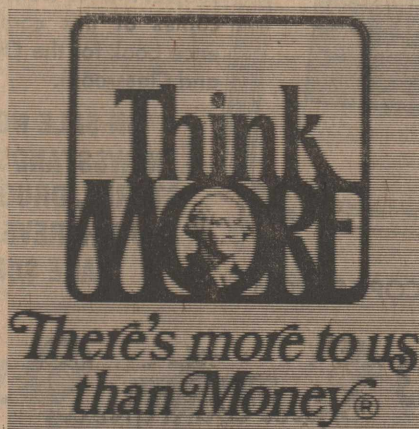

Mains, Parks - Playgrounds, Code Enforcement, Clearance and Demolition, Public Services and other work. This meeting is to provide citizens an adequate opportunity to participate in the development of the application. The Housing Assistance Plan shall be discussed as it pertains to this area.

Another public hearing on the same subject and for the same purpose will be held at the City Hall in Silverton on Tuesday, November 30, 1976.
