Funeral services for Johnny Cagle, 58, were conducted Sunday, June 5, at 3:00 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church in Silverton, with the pastor, Rev. Jesse Dea, and Rev. Olin Cosby, pastor of the Kress Methodist Church, officiating.

Mr. Cagle was stricken with an apparent heart attack June 3, at the Kress School, where he worked as an auto mechanic, and was taken to Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tullia where he was pronounced dead by justice of the peace S. G. Hooper.

Born in Childress County, he was a former resident of Silverton and had lived in Kress for seven years. He had worked in the shipyards in California for several years during World War II. He lived in Quitaque before moving to Silverton, and was employed by Ford Motor Company and the Chrysler dealership in Tullia.

He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Cagle of Childress and married the former Pauline Curtis July 4, 1939 at Clarendon. She preceded him in death December 22, 1976.

He was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Kress. Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Ronda Orr of Olton; two brothers, H. A. Cagle of Silverton and Roscoe Cagle of Childress; a sister, Mrs. W. T. Veale of Yuba City, California; and three grandchildren.

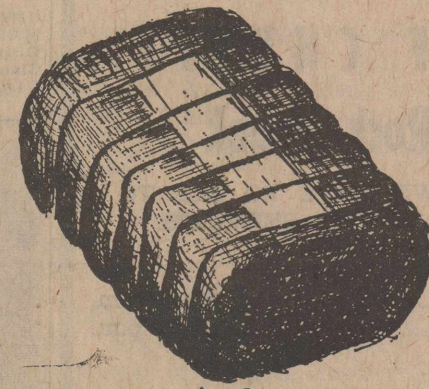
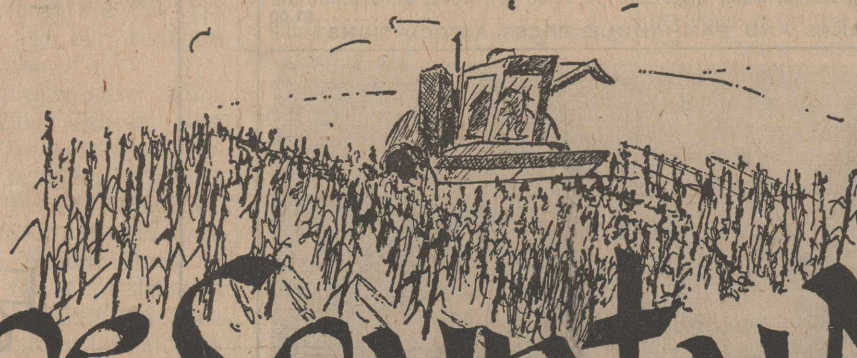
Southwestern Home Demonstration Club will have a luncheon for the Senior Citizens on Friday, June 17 at the First Baptist Church.

"Boycott Plainview" Meeting Planned For Tonight at Bank

Briscoe County Citizens for Natural Weather will be tonight, Thursday, June 16, at 8:00 p.m. in the Pioneer Room of the First State Bank in Silverton.

Plans will be made for a "Boycott Plainview" campaign and a petition will be available to sign. This is in protest to the hail suppression and weather modification which Plainview Councilmen, Hale County Commissioners and some

Plainview merchants support. All merchants, housewives, and general public are urged to attend.

Water Development Board members recently took the easy way out of making a controversial decision on bitterly opposed license renewal applications for two South Plains weather modification companies.

At the urging of Lubbock board

member George McCleskey, the six-man panel unanimously approved a motion by Glen Roney of McAllen to grant permits to the companies, a concession to them, but only through October 31 and only for the target area and operational areas within eight miles of the target area—a concession to more than 4,000 protesting farmers.

The board's decision, called

"a livable compromise" by attorneys for the companies and the farmers who've fought their operations since 1970, also encouraged calling elections across the South Plains to determine voter preferences for modification activities, but did not commit the board to changing the permit area or term after those elections.

Under legislation passed by the just concluded 65th Legislature, such elections would be possible upon petition by area residents. Governor Dophl Briscoe is expected to sign the legislation, which was carried in the Senate by Senator Kent Hance and in the House by Representative Jim Rudd.

The board's action received applause from modification supporters in the crowd of about 100 the old Supreme Court Room of the Capitol in Austin.

After the meeting, though, both supporters of the two companies

and representatives of the farmers, many dryland farmers of the South Plains, declined comment on the decision until the formal order is drawn up later this week by board General Counsel Bruce Bigelow.

Apparent confusion over whether the board was actually ordering the elections or merely suggesting them with a promise they would be considered spawned the reluctance to speak.

Board members heard nearly two hours of discussion on the applications, mainly by attorneys for the companies, Jerome Kirby of Littlefield, and for the farmers, Harrell Feldt of Midland.

Kirby argued that testimony continued in more than 640 pages of transcript from hearings in Lubbock confirmed that "We the old Supreme Court Room of the Capitol in Austin."

Kirby claimed the two hail suppression companies have "eliminated at least 50 per cent of the hailfall" in the area and denied charges the companies had also reduced rainfall over the same period.

Feldt claimed it was Kirby's job to prove the applicants had not injured anyone or their lands and that he had not done so. He contended that the testimony made it "absolutely and completely clear" that seeded clouds produce more precipitation than unseeded clouds, but that it is less intense and thus less beneficial than natural rainfall.

Following their arguments, board members tried to unravel legal complications posed by approving a permit with the stipulation that elections called in the affected areas could change the outcome. Final approval came of Roney's motion to approve the permits for shorter periods and for a less expansive region than the companies had requested.

Both firms had sought four-year permits to fly cloud-seeding missions.

Last Week To Register In Beef Referendum

The USDA has set July 5-15 as the dates to vote in the national Beef Referendum. Cattleman all over the country are being urged to register and vote in the referendum and help decide whether or not the cattle industry will be able to establish a self-help program aimed at stabilizing and improving the market for beef in the U. S.

Registration for the voting will be held in all local ASC offices June 6-17 and those who register must certify that they have owned cattle some time during the past 12 months. Then, after waiting for a two-week period, they will have to return to the ASC office to vote. Absentee forms will be available for those who prefer to register and vote by mail.

Cattle industry leaders have been working the past three years to organize the referendum. The program, which is known as the Beef Research and Information Act, was drawn up by industry leaders and approved by Congress last year. If the program is approved by two-thirds of the voting cattlemen, it will authorize a uniform collection of 3/10 of one per cent of the value on each animal sold.

The collection is expected to raise \$30 to \$40 million a year for beef research, promotion, consumer education and foreign market development. The funds will be administered by a 68 member Beef Board comprised of cattlemen nominated by existing cattlemen's organizations.

Texas cattlemen will be represented by a 60-member Texas Beef Development Taskforce, which will be made up of members of beef and dairy organizations throughout the state, and a county Taskforce headquartered in each of Texas' 254 counties.

Everyone connected with the program has been working to explain the merits of the program to cattlemen and encourage them to register and vote. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and other cattlemen's organizations and general farm organizations are spearheading the educational effort in the state.
