Lightening causes concern at Indians' game

Early voting ends Friday for special election

Governor Rick Perry has called for a special election to fill the unexpired seat of Senator Robert Duncan, who earlier resigned his position to serve as Chancellor of

the Texas Tech University System.

The special election, set for September 9, is designed to give District 28, encompassing some forty-six counties, senate

representation at the beginning of the 2015 legislative session.

County Clerk Belia Abila announced that early voting for Haskell County continues through Friday, September

5. Early voting will be from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon, and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. in room 9 on the west end of the Haskell County Courthouse.

On Tuesday, September 9, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. registered voters will cast their ballots at the polling place designated for the precinct in which they live. These include Precinct 1, St. George's Catholic Church; Precinct 2, Assembly of God Church; Precinct 3, Extension Office; and Precinct 4, Experienced Citizens' Center.

Six candidates filed to

run for the remainder of Senator Duncan's term, which expires in 2017. Placing their names on the ballot are republicans Jodey Arrington, former Tech Vice Chancellor; Wolforth resident E.M. Garza; former state representative Dalwin Jones; and state representative Charles Perry. Also seeking the senate seat are former Sweetwater mayor and democrat Gregg Wortham, as well as Libertarian party candidate Kerry McKennon.

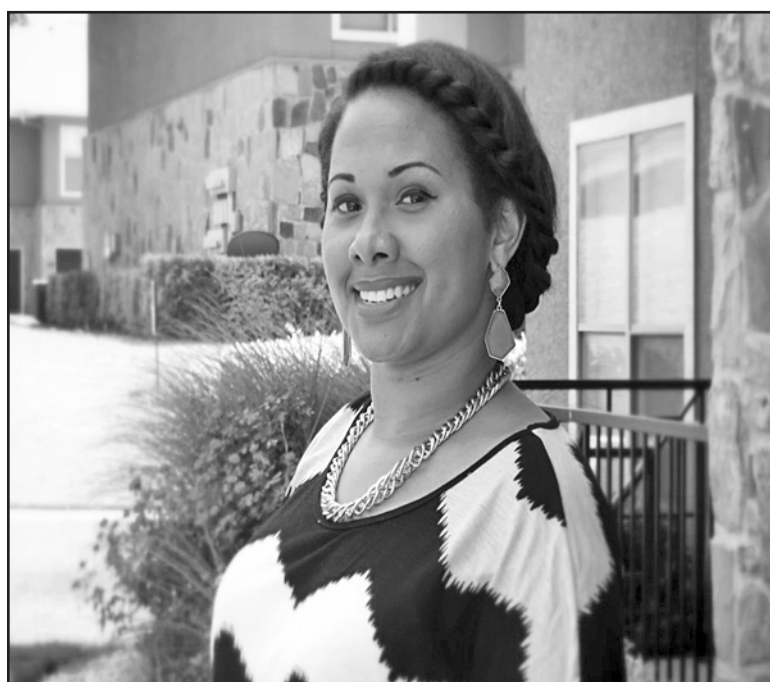

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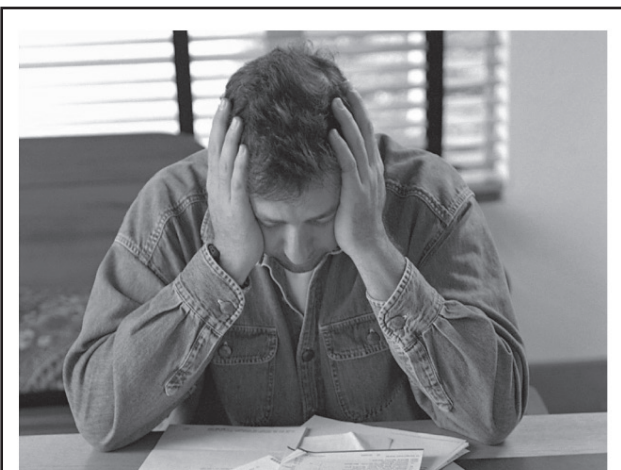

Court rules school finance system unconstitutional

AUSTIN—When the Texas Legislature convenes on Jan. 13, 2015, lawmakers will have the job of revising the state's school finance system, again.

This task was made necessary on Aug. 28, when state District Judge John Dietz ruled the current finance system violates these four state constitutional standards: the state property tax prohibition and the education clause requirements of adequacy, suitability, and financial efficiency.

In his 400-page ruling, Dietz pointed out that the Legislature is constitutionally required to "structure, operate and fund" a public school system that achieves a "general diffusion of knowledge" and that "children who live in poor districts and children who live in rich districts must have a substantially equal opportunity to have access to educational funds."

The case was brought in October 2012. Plaintiffs, to whom the court granted relief, are: The Texas Taxpayer & Student Fairness Coalition, et al.; Calhoun County ISD, et al.; Edgewood ISD, et al.; Fort Bend ISD et al.; and Texas Charter School Association, et al.; and Intervenor Joyce Coleman, et al. Defendants are Michael Williams, Commissioner of Education, in his official capacity; Susan Combs, Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts, in her official capacity; and Texas Board of Education.

Education Commissioner Williams reacted, saying, "Regardless of the ruling at the district court level, all sides have known this is an issue that will again be resolved by the Texas Supreme Court."

Dismissal order is sought

Gov. Rick Perry's legal team on Aug. 26 submitted a 60-page document seeking dismissal of a Travis County grand jury's Aug. 15 two-count indictment of the governor on felony charges of abuse of office and coercion of a public servant.

The document, an application to the 390th Travis County Judicial Court for a pre-trial writ of habeas corpus, contains arguments in support of the governor's veto of the 2014-2015 budget of the state's Public Integrity Unit, a division of the Travis County District Attorney's Office. Perry said he would veto the division's budget unless District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg, a Democrat, resigned from office after she was arrested for drunken driving in April 2013. Lehmberg refused to resign and Perry carried out the veto, prompting the grand jury indictment.

The conclusion portion of the application for a pre-trial writ of habeas corpus asserts,

"continued prosecution of Governor Perry on the current indictment is unprecedented, insupportable, and simply impermissible" and suggests the court "should not hesitate to dismiss both counts of the indictment and bar the prosecution immediately, if not sooner." Also, the conclusion portion states "it is not fault of the court that it has been asked to intrude on a political dispute."

Panel to study ethics laws

Texas House Speaker Joe Straus and Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst on Aug. 22 announced appointees to a new Select Interim Committee to Study Ethics Laws, in accordance with Senate Bill 1773 passed by the Legislature in 2013.

The committee will study "the effectiveness of laws and regulations related to ethics, including campaign finance, lobby laws and personal financial disclosure laws," Dewhurst said.

Straus said, "Sound ethics laws can help build and maintain public confidence in government. I trust the members of this committee to give those laws a thorough review and recommend ways to make our system more transparent and accountable to citizens."

Sen. Joan Huffman and Rep. Sarah Davis, both Houston Republicans, will co-chair the committee.

Lowest-yet interest rate

State Comptroller Susan Combs on Aug. 26 announced the sale of \$5.4 billion in one-year Texas Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes, and those notes received a record-low interest rate of 0.1326 percent. The previous low was 0.2008 percent in 2013.

"The best ratings from Wall Street ratings firms and strong demand for Texas notes helped drive down the borrowing cost," Combs explained. Money from TRAN sales is used to help fund expenditures such as public school payments early in the fiscal year and manage cash flow between the start of the fiscal year and the arrival of tax revenues later in the year.

Extra caution is advised

Texas Department of Public Safety on Aug. 22 reminded drivers to watch out for children walking to and from school or waiting for school buses. Also, drivers who illegally pass school buses face fines up to \$1,250 for a first offense. A ticket for illegally passing a school bus cannot be dismissed through defensive driving.

Judge David Davis attends conference

Haskell County Judge David Davis was one of hundreds of county officials who gathered in Austin Aug. 27-29 at the Texas Association of Counties (TAC) 2014 Legislative Conference to discuss common concerns shared by Texas local governments, learn about the biggest issues facing counties and local taxpayers heading into the 84th Legislature and discover the resources available to those who wish to advocate the needs of their local communities to legislators.

"The Legislative Conference is the one time each year county officials from across the state can gather together as colleagues and as community leaders to discuss common issues and potential solutions to our shared problems and challenges, and to prepare together for the upcoming legislative session, the workings of which will undoubtedly affect counties in many ways," said TAC Executive Director Gene Terry. "County government is the working arm of the

state, and counties shoulder many responsibilities that affect citizens in their day-to-day lives. Any and all of those responsibilities can be affected by the Legislature. County officials must be dedicated to ensuring that legislators are aware of all pros and cons of any legislation that may affect local control, counties and Texans."

During their three days in Austin, county officials heard from their peers, experts and legislators on a number of current and expected hot topics affecting counties, including:

- An update on the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, including how counties can prepare for the excise tax in 2018;
- Compliance with the Supreme Court of Texas' statewide e-filing mandate;
- Water and drought issues, including how the State Water Plan project prioritization is progressing and how local entities are responding to changing water needs;
- Rising indigent defense costs and best practices;

•How the state budget is written, how legislators use dedicated funds to balance the budget and the effect that practice has on Texans and important services; and

•An update on the Mental Health Advisory Panel and how counties are working to improve mental health crisis services across the state.

In addition, the conference's General Sessions included presentations by author David Houle, a business consultant and one of the nation's top futurists; University of Texas communications professor John Daly, who discussed best practices for advocating to legislators; Chet Garner, the creator of the Emmy-award winning television show The Daytripper, who gave his perspective on how important diversity is to Texas and what it means to be a Texan; and Steven Murdock, the first official State Demographer of Texas and former director of the U.S. Bureau of the Census.

Other notable speakers included

Sen. Robert Nichols (R-Jacksonville), the chair of the Senate Committee on Transportation, who discussed possible funding solutions to help build and maintain the state's road system, and Rep. Joe Farias (D-San Antonio), who spoke about services and resources available for Texas veterans.

Several county officials and department heads also led discussions and helped educate their colleagues on a number of topics. Those county officials included Limestone County Judge Daniel Burkeen, Limestone County Sheriff Dennis Wilson, Angelina County Judge Wes Suiter, Travis County Court-at-Law Judge Mike Denton, Fort Bend County Clerk Dianne Wilson and Tom Green County District Clerk Sheri Woodfin.

TAC works to unite Texas counties together in search of solutions for challenges faced by all counties and to provide services to support county officials in the vital work they do for their local communities.

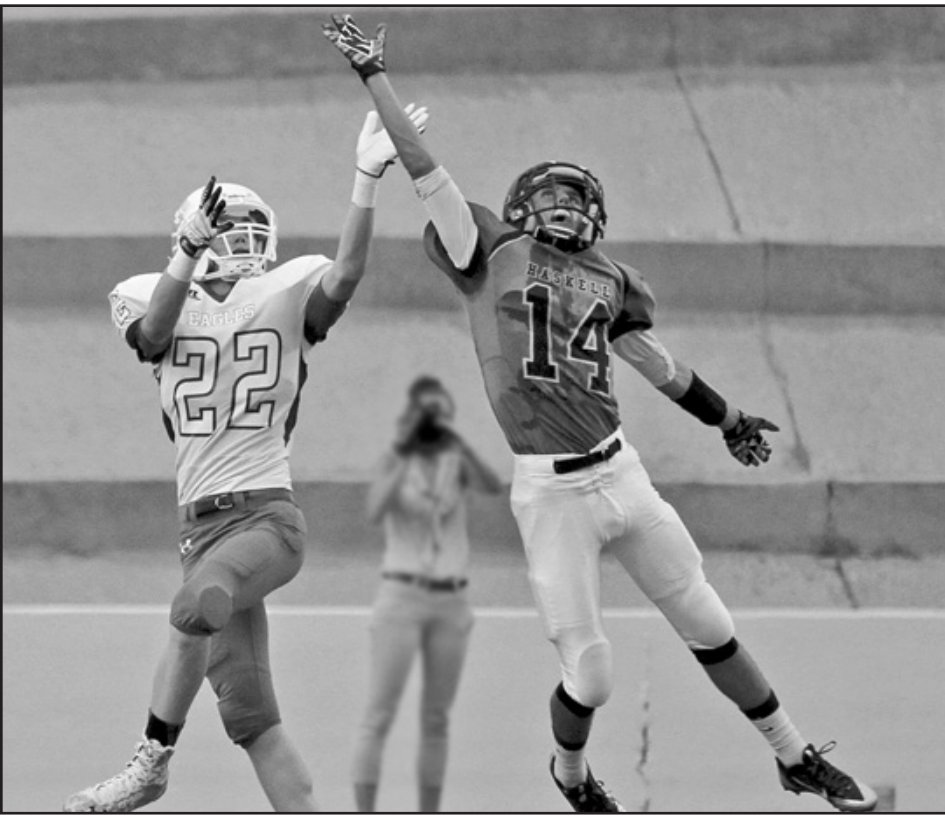

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Types of child care licensing responsibilities are listed

Child Care Licensing responsibilities include:

- Regulates all child-care operations and child-placing agencies to protect the health, safety, and well-being of children in care, largely by reducing the risk of injury, abuse, and communicable disease.

- Establishes and monitors operations and agencies for compliance with licensing standards, rules, and law.

- Informs parents and the public about child care and about the histories of specific homes, child-care operations, and child-placing agencies in complying with minimum standards of care.

- Provides technical assistance to providers on meeting licensing standards, rules, and law.

What kind of child care is available?

In Texas, child care can be broken down into the following types of operations:

Licensed Child-Care Centers: Licensed Child-Care Centers provide care for seven or more children under 14 years old for less than 24 hours per day at a location other than the permit holder's home. All types of licensed facilities have published standards they are required to follow and are routinely monitored and inspected. The application process requires that the licensed operation provider receive orientation and background checks are conducted. A license is issued after licensing staff completes on-site inspection(s) to ensure minimum standards are met. Licensed facilities are inspected at least once every 12 months and to investigate reports alleging violations of standards or child abuse/neglect.

Listed Family Homes: People who must list with day care and 24 hour residential care. Licensed Child Care Homes: Licensed Child Care Homes provide care for less than 24 hours per day for 7-12 children under 14 years old in the permit holder's own home. All types of licensed facilities have published standards they are required to follow and are routinely monitored and inspected. The application process requires that the licensed operation provider receive orientation and background checks are conducted. A license is issued after licensing staff completes on-site inspection to ensure minimum standards are met. Registered homes are inspected every 1-2 years and to investigate reports alleging violations of standards or child abuse/neglect.

Registered Child Care Homes: Registered Child Care Homes provide care for up to six children under age 14; they may also take in up to six more school-age children. The number of children allowed in a home is determined by the ages of the children. No more than 12 children can be in care at any time, including children of the caregiver. The application process requires that a registered child care home provider complete an orientation class and receive clearances on background checks. A registration certificate is issued after licensing staff completes an on-site inspection to ensure minimum standards are met. Registered homes are inspected every 1-2 years and to investigate reports alleging violations of standards or child abuse/neglect.

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Listed Family Homes: People who must list with

the division are those who are compensated to provide regular child care (at least four hours per day, three or more days a week, for three or more consecutive weeks or four hours a day for 40 or more days in a 12 month period) in their own homes for 1-3 unrelated children. After receipt of an application and licensing background check clearances, an Issuance Letter is issued. The listed family home caregiver must be at least 18 years old. However, there are no minimum standards, orientation or training requirements for listed homes. They are not inspected unless a report is received alleging child abuse/neglect, an immediate risk of danger to the health or safety of a child, and/or if providing child care subject to regulation.

•General Residential Operations provide 24-hour care for 13 or more children under 18 years old and may offer programmatic services such as transitional living or emergency care or may offer treatment services such as for emotional disorders or primary medical needs.

Residential Treatment Centers are a subset of General Residential Operations that serve only children needing treatment services for emotional disorders.

•Child Placing Agencies are persons or organizations other than a child's natural parent or guardian who plan for placement of a child or place a child in a child care operation, foster home or adoptive home.

•Foster Family Homes provide 24-hour care for 6 or fewer children under 18 years old.

•Foster Group Homes provide 24-hour care for 7 to 12 children under 18 years old.
