Body Found In Pasture Is **Identified Here**

The decomposed body of a man found Sunday afternoon in a pasture just above the Tule Canyon rim northwest of Silverton has been identified as that of a Pampa man who had been missing since January 21.

A billfold found on the body, which was lying face down in a clump of high grass in the pasture, contained the name of Manuel Parras Davila, 31, of Pampa. It also contained family pictures and the name of his wife. There was no money in the billfold.

The family is satisfied with the identification and has proceeded with funeral arrangements, although formal identification cannot be made until a fingerprint check is made at the Texas Department of Public Safety labora-

Cause of death has not been determined, Briscoe County Justice of the Peace Barbara Pigg said, and a verdict is being withheld pending submission of results

On January 23, Davila's wife reported him missing, and since then officers of the Briscoe County Sheriff's Department and the Texas Rangers have conducted a search, including several helicopter flights to survey the area.

- 1. Such agricultural operation "is customarily and generally recognized as being paid on a piece rate basis in the region in which such individuals would be employ-
- 2. The "industry of such employer has (prior to the 1974 restrictions) traditionally and substantially employed individuals under 12 years of age without displacing substantial job opportunities for individuals over 16 years of age."
- 3. The crop to be harvested is one with a "particularly short harvesting season," normally within a four-week period, in the particular region in which the waiver will be applicable.
- 4. The 12-year minimum age prescribed since 1974 has and would cause "severe economic disruption in the industry of the em-

ployer applying for the waiver." 5. Neither the type of "employment" nor the level and type of pesticides and other chemicals used" would have a harmful effect on the health and well-being of the employed minors.

6. Individuals age 12 and above are not available for such employ-
