Fishing Improving At Lake Mackenzie

Fishing is improving at Lake Mackenzie, according to Acting Manager John McCammon. Crappie fishing is fair, bass fishing is good, with 1 1/2 pound large-mouth bass being taken. Walleye up to 2 1/2 pounds are being caught, and Bud Roberts of Tulia took five and six pound channel catfish on trotline. Cam Forbes caught two rainbow trout while bank fishing with minnows in Tule Creek on the east end of the beach. Donations of trees are still being sought for the park at Lake Mackenzie. E-Kay Supply in Tulia has received a shipment of red-bud trees to supplement the supply of junipers which are being set out at the lake. BRENDA CANTWELL RECEIVES SCHOLARSHIP

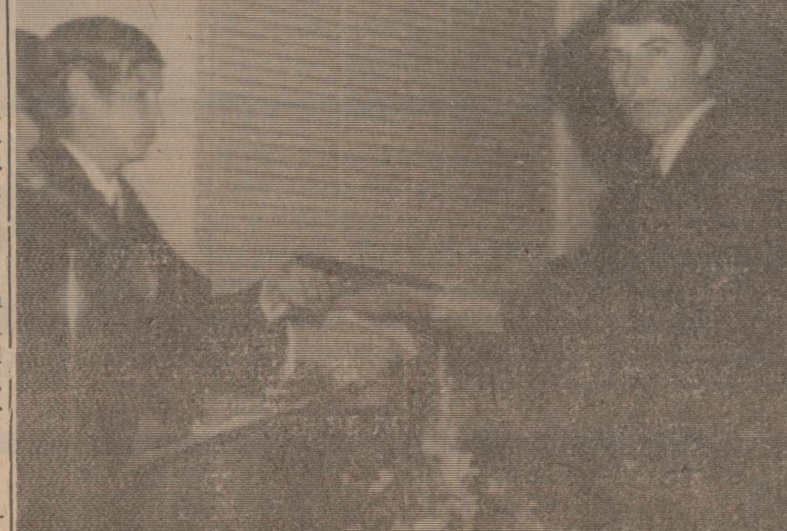

Sign-Up Deadline Extended For Farmers

Public Service Company Files For General Rate Increase Here

Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that it has filed for a general retail rate increase in the cities and counties served by the company in Texas. The request was made with the cities and the Public Utility Commission of Texas on or about May 12, 1978 and the company is requesting that the increase become effective 35 days after the filing date. It is expected that the proposed new rates will result in an increase of approximately 10 percent for residential, commercial, industrial and school customers. This would result in an increase of about 8.8 percent in the company's total revenues from Texas, or about \$22 million annually. Rates to wholesale customers and for retail service to municipal customers would not be affected. The last base rate increase in Southwestern's rates for residential, commercial and industrial service was granted in 1974 and amounted to about 10 percent. Increased costs of building new power plants, as well as the increased costs of labor, materials, money and taxes were cited by the company as the major reasons for the proposed increase. In 1972, SPS made the commitment to switch from gas to coal as the primary fuel for their generating plants. This decision was made due to a long-range forecast which indicated increases in the cost of gas and diminishing availability. The present cost of new gas is about 70 percent higher than the cost of coal. Government regulations have restricted the use of gas as a boiler fuel. Southwestern's first coal plant, a \$100 million, 356.7 megawatt facility located in the north part of the company's system, went on the line in 1976. The total cost of this plant was almost three times more than a gas-fired plant of the same size. The second 356.7 mw coal unit is scheduled to go on the line in June of this year. This new unit will also help stabilize fuel costs.

Screening Clinic Planned Here May 25

The Texas Department of Health Region I will conduct a screening clinic Thursday, May 25 from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon at the Silvertown Senior Citizens Center. Blood Pressure Screening and Diabetes Screening will be offered to those wishing to participate. The clinic is open to citizens of all ages and it is free of charge. The Texas Department of Health Regional Office is located in Canyon. The Region is dedicated to improving the level of health care for all region residents and makes public health services available to 23 counties in the Texas Panhandle not served by a local public health department. There are six field offices in operation, located in Hereford, Dumas, Perryton, Pampa, Memphis and Claude. These offices are staffed with a registered nurse who is guided by the physician in the regional office. Each nurse serves surrounding counties of her respective area, and provides several nursing services. Clients served are of all ages, races and creeds regardless of monetary worth. The public health nurse from Memphis and Claude will be conducting the screening in Silvertown May 25.

KIKER'S KORNER

Now is the time for homeowners to start inspecting their trees for bagworms.

Bagworms feed on the foliage of many trees, especially the evergreen varieties. Several trees in the Briscoe County area were

badly damaged by these pests last year. Small bagworms hatch in late spring or early summer from old bags left on the tree during the winter. Young worms spin silken sacs and attach small bits of leaves or twigs to the outside. The bagworm carries this sac wherever it goes. Later in the year, full grown larva attach to the tree and pupate within the bag. After some time male bagworm moths emerge and mate with females which remain inside the bag. The female then lays

eggs inside the bag to start the cycle over again.

Application of insecticides should be made when small worms are first observed. Chemical controls are not effective on the older and larger bagworms. A few insecticides are available locally for use on bagworms. The homeowner should read the label to insure proper application rates and to be certain that the tree being treated will not be damaged by the insecticide.

A training workshop for certification of commercial and noncommercial agricultural applicators of pesticides has been scheduled for May 24 at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Boulevard West, Amarillo, Texas.

The educational workshop, though not a part of the official certification process, is being conducted by the Extension Service to train commercial and noncommercial applicators in categories of farm storage pest control and seed treatment.

The first session of the workshop will include general subject matter applicable to all categories of commercial and noncommercial categories. Sessions that follow will deal with category specific subject matter.

Certification examinations will be conducted the same day by the Texas Department of Agriculture at the same location.
