## Information Given On School Meals Program

The Silverton School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 75 cents, breakfast for 35 cents and extra milk for 10 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the scale below are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Banana, Peanutbutter and Jelly If the children are eligible for free meals they are also eligible for free extra milk. If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.
