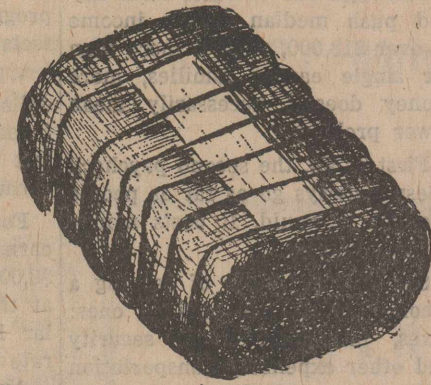
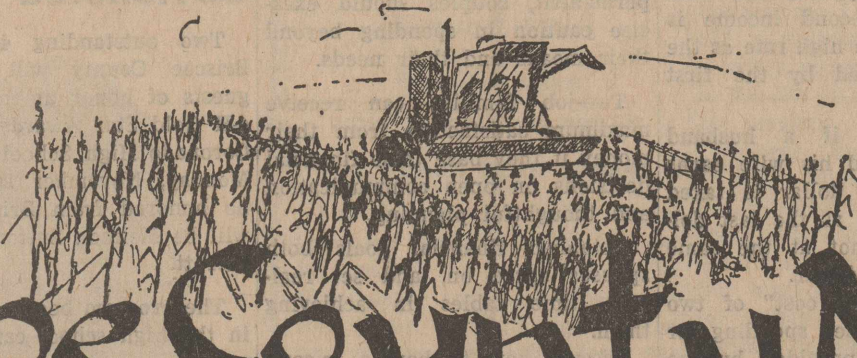

Owls Close Season By Defeating Matadors 13-12

Silvertown's Owls closed their football campaign for 1978 by defeating the Motley County Matadors 13-12. Eight seniors, Kyle Bean, Tommy Perkins, Kirk Durham, Bryan Burson, James Alan Patton, Larry Stephens and Wayne Reed, closed out their high school football careers, and all of them seemed to have dedicated themselves to having their best game of the year Friday night.

The Owls end the season with a record of five wins and five losses, much better than last year's 1-9 record.

The Owls took the opening kickoff on a very cold night on their home field, and marched through four first downs to score on a five-yard run by Kirk Durham. The kick failed, and with 7:28 still showing on the first quarter clock, the Owls had performed a feat that they had not done all season: driven for a touchdown on their first possession of the game.

After kicking off to the Matadors, the Owls allowed only a seven-yard gain and forced a punt. The Owls had their own possession nipped in the bud by a fumble which Motley County recovered on their own 40. This time the Owls held the Matadors to a four-yard gain and forced a punt.

A couple of punts were exchanged, and the Matadors completed a 20-yard pass on the last play of the first quarter. They scored on their next play, failed on their PAT kick, and with 11:55 remaining on the second quarter clock, the score was tied at 6-6.

The teams spent the remainder of the first half exchanging punts and fumbles. Good defense was seen from Jim Estes, Larry Stephens, Kelly Comer, Tommy Perkins and Wayne Reed.

On the first play of the second half, the Matadors completed a 65-yard pass for a score. There was no PAT, and the Matadors led 12-6 with 11:43 remaining to be played in the third quarter. The Owls had a punt blocked on their own 19, and after Motley County was held to a minus three yards, their field goal attempt failed with 8:27 still remaining in the third quarter.

Again the teams exchanged punts, and the Owls mounted another drive which carried over into the fourth quarter. Kyle Bean carried the score from about three yards out, Paul Brannon kicked the extra point, and with 9:34 remaining to be played in the game, the Owls held a 13-12 lead.

Motley's next drive ended when Wayne Reed intercepted a pass on the Silvertown 35 with 7:34 remaining in the game. The Owls drove to the Matadors' 25 before seeing the ball go over on downs. The game ended with the Matadors in possession near midfield.

Silvertown made 14 first downs as compared with 10 for the Matadors.

Fans endured the coldest weather of the season to watch the final game, but most agreed that it was, indeed, time to move indoors for further competition this winter.

Have you ever dreamed of all the things you could buy with a second paycheck? I, too, have had this thought, but we need to weigh the benefits against the problems before we make a decision to add a second paycheck to the family budget.

Families with two money earn-

ers face unique challenges in managing their money.

Although two incomes have helped push median family income to over \$18,000, or 34% more than for single earner families, more money doesn't necessarily mean fewer problems.

First of all, the second paycheck doesn't always go as far as people thought it would. It costs money to earn money.

Some of the costs of earning a second income are obvious ones: taxes, insurance, social security and other expenses, transportation and extra clothing.

But, there are also hidden costs. When there are two earners, the "marriage penalty" of the progressive income tax system affects family income.

When this happens, the first dollar of the second income is taxed at the same high rate as the last dollar earned by the first earner.

For example, if a husband earns \$15,000 and his wife earns \$8,000, her first dollar is taxed at the same rate as the last dollar he earned, not at the same rate as his first dollar.

Another "hidden cost" of two incomes is increased spending for services usually provided by the family for itself.

The growth of fast-food establishments is testimony to the growing number of families who eat many meals away from home because time and energy for meal preparation are limited.

Housekeeping services are also bought by some two-job families.

As more money is spent for services, less money may be left over to meet other expenses or for special purchases.

Having two pay-checks can lead to unrealistic expectations about what money can buy.

Families who know a second income will be only temporary should time any long-term credit purchases carefully.

When the second income stops but installment payments are still due, serious financial problems can arise.

Even if the second income is permanent, couples should exercise caution in spending beyond their means and their needs.

Two-job families can receive maximum satisfaction from their money if they base their financial decisions on open communication and thoughtful planning.

Establish financial goals both spouses agree on, and set realistic time tables in achieving them.

Discuss how to handle incoming money. Should it be "his," "hers" or "ours"?

Some alternatives include:

—pooling all the money into one account and paying everything from a single account with special allowances for each spouse.

—letting each spouse control his/her own income with contributions for household operation or with each responsible for paying specific items each month.

Designate who will take responsibility for paying bills.

Try out the system and be willing to make adjustments in it if things don't work out.

Don't forget, however, that the satisfaction you may get from

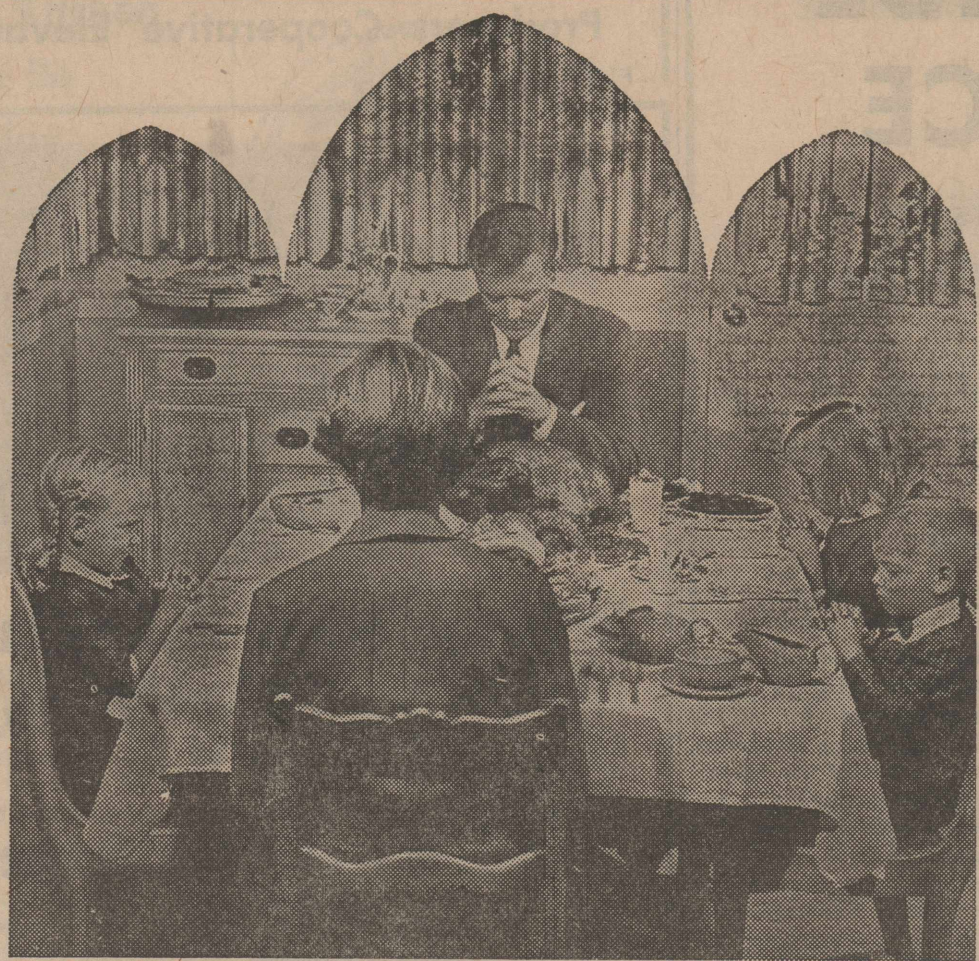

NOW IS TIME TO TREAT FOR PEACH TREE BORERS

For homeowners with peach trees, fall is the best time to treat for one of the most destructive of all peach tree pests, the peach tree borer. A sure sign of the pest is the gum oozing down the trunk or branches of the tree. This insect is mostly a pest of peach but is also found infesting plum, cherry and apricot trees.

Actually, two borers commonly attack peach trees. The larval stage of the peach tree borer feeds within the tree's cambian layer approximately six inches above the soil line to six inches below. The lesser peach tree borer attacks the cambian layer of the upper portion of the tree's trunk and larger branches. The approach to controlling these pests is basically the same, but the method for peach tree borer controls are paradichlorobenzene (PDB) crystals or ethylene dichloride in the liquid form.

Using fumigants around peach trees is a delicate operation and should be done with great care and precision. Over-treatment can damage the tree. The crystals, when applied to warm soil, quickly volatilize into a heavy gas which penetrates through soil crevices into burrows of overwintering borers and kills them. Crystals should only be applied when the soil is dry and the temperature is 55 degrees or above.

When using PDB for peach tree borer control, weeds should be removed from around the base of the tree and the soil leveled one foot from the tree trunk. PCB crystals should be placed in a narrow groove encircling the tree about two inches from the tree trunk. Clean soil should be placed over the crystals to form a cone-shaped pile about six inches high around the base of the tree. This soil should be removed from

Social Security Representative
Question: My next-door neighbor told me I might be eligible for SSI payments, but I think my monthly income is too high. What is the SSI income limit for a single person?

Answer: An individual generally may be eligible for Federal SSI payments with countable income of less than \$189.40 a month. A person may have income above this level and possibly be eligible for a State payment only, but the income levels vary with each State.

the base of the tree in late March or early April.

The amount of PDB to be used is determined by age and size of the tree. In general, one-half ounce of crystals should be used for two-to-three-year-old trees, three-fourths ounce for four-to-five-year-old trees, and one ounce for mature trees.

Both PDB and ethylene dichloride can also be used to treat peach trees infested by the lesser peach tree borer. Affected areas, recognized by masses of gum mixed with frass and sawdust running down the surface of the trunk and branches, should be treated after the leaves fall from the peach tree. A mixture of four ounces PDB in one pint of miscible oil diluted in two pints of water or a smaller amount at the same proportions should be prepared. The mixture should be painted on the wounds and damaged areas, without encircling the trunk or limb. When using ethylene dichloride for either peach tree borer or lesser peach tree borer control, proper rates and application instructions will be found on the product label.

For the homeowner with peach trees infested with either the peach tree borer or the lesser peach tree borer, control measures can greatly lengthen the life of the trees.

Further information on control of the peach tree borer is available at the County Extension Agent's office.
