**SCREWORMS
EXPLODE IN TEXAS**

"The Texas screwworm situation broke wide open with astonishing speed during the second half of May," laments Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows, jr., who was hoping for better.

The director of the USDA Screwworm Eradication Program says the surprises started May 15 with confirmation of a case in west central Texas' Coleman County, followed promptly by another in that county and others in Mitchell and Stonewall counties. Along with these came six more in three south Texas counties—four in Live Oak and one each in Hidalgo and Willacy.

The Big Bend area was strongly represented with two cases in El Paso County, another in Presidio and one each in Culberson and Brewster. After starting May with only one outbreak, suddenly there were 17 at month's end, compared to 22 at the same time last year.

The earlier case, collected in Hudspeth County, ended a record 25-week screwworm-free hiatus in Texas. It was the first infestation for Texas since last October 24 when a case was reported from El Paso County.

Meadows said the sample was collected by Dr. Wiley C. Heath, El Paso veterinarian, from "a cut behind the heel" of a horse.

The longest previous screwworm dry spell was 17 weeks in 1969-70.

Records at the Screwworm Lab showed 559 Arizona cases through May, 44 in New Mexico and 19 in California. Exceptionally good grazing conditions in far western desert areas have created an ideal environment for screwworms as thousands of cattle from dry areas of Texas are shipped west for grazing, Meadows notes.

As of June 1, the Texas Animal Health Commission began requiring inspection and spraying or dipping of all animals entering Texas from Arizona and New Mexico. They must be inspected and determined free of the parasite within 72 hours prior to movement by a state or federal animal health official or an accredited veterinarian.

Meadows says the growing volume of cases in west central Texas are being treated with sterile flies from a temporary distribution center at San Angelo by APHIS planes based at Mission. A second temporary center to be established at Alpine will permit local treatment of cases in the Big Bend region.

Although taken aback by the rapidity of the population buildup, Meadows sticks by an earlier prediction that 1978 will not be as bad in Arizona as 1973 when 4,736 infestations were reported.

**BIRTH CONTROL PILL,
SMOKING SAID TO BE
DANGEROUS COMBINATION**

Women who smoke and take oral contraceptives increase their risk of heart attacks and other circulatory diseases, warns a health education specialist.

The chances of a heart attack will double even for healthy women who do not smoke but who are taking birth control pills, Carla Shearer, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, says.

Women who smoke—especially if they smoke 15 or more cigarettes a day—and take birth control pills are 10 times more likely to suffer a heart attack or circulatory disease than those who neither smoke nor take the pill.

This risk increases with the amount of smoking, advancing age and the existence of other conditions such as obesity, high blood pressure and diabetes.

As many as 10 million women in the United States take oral contraceptive pills and about four million of them smoke.

In view of this, the Food and Drug Administration now requires that information about the risks of smoking and taking birth control pills must be included in a brochure distributed at the time a prescription for the pill is filled.

The informational brochure also contains information of other side effects and risks of taking oral contraceptive pills.
